#### **Comanche Ranch Fee to Trust**

I am happy to report on the current status of the Fee to Trust Acquisition by the United States of America of the Pueblo of Isleta Comanche Ranch and Corridor Property. This long time process is in the final stages for approval and transfer.

At the request of the BIA/SPA Realty Officer, information was provided to complete a supplemental package required for issuance of the Solicitor's Final Title Opinion.

Efforts were undertaken to account for and confirm payment of all property taxes for Tax Year 2015 (approximately \$2,100) for the parcels in Valencia and Socorro County. The Realty Officer and Solicitor's Office have indicated that the information provided was sufficient to satisfy that request.

The form of Warranty Deed and an updated title commitment has been provided to both the BIA/ SPA and Regional Solicitor's Office. Minor technical revisions to the legal description have been requested by the BIA Surveyor, and a revised title commitment is being prepared, along with a revised legal description to attach to the Warranty Deed.

The requisite 30-day public notice of the United States' decision to take the property into trust is being published today in the Valencia County Bulletin and the El Defensor-Chieftain in Socorro County. This was undertaken at the instruction of the Solicitor's office, and the affidavits of publication will be forwarded to both BIA/SPA and Solicitor's Office as soon as we receive them.

• Once we receive formal instruction from BIA that the transfer has been approved, we will ask the Title Company to record the Warranty Deed (in both counties) and then return it to us to deliver to the BIA for filing in its Lands Records.

We anticipate that the property will be formally transferred into trust by the end of January.

In summary is a listing of some of our project accomplishments to date, pending projects and future projects the tribe will continue and pursue.

The site inspection with the SWRO Environmental Specialist revealed several remediation tasks to be undertaken by the Pueblo, including containment of fuel tanks and minor cleanup of noted violations. It is our understanding that the Pueblo must proceed with these tasks, but that the actual fee-to-trust acquisition will not be delayed if they are not completed by the time the formal fee-to-trust paperwork has been processed. A subsequent site visit will likely be required, however, to assure compliance with federal regulations.

Veterans' Center Site Development

Scope and establish Lead Agency for Coordination of the NEPA Process. IPHA has agreed to pay for the EA. Procurement and Attorney are working on the Design/Build RFP. Space programming needs are finalized; however, we will not be able to establish a final bid schedule until the bid documents are ready. Priorities for November/December/January are to get the EA process under way and finalize the boundary survey for the Admin/ Yard as well as the extended ROW that will be needed for the improved access road (TR 97).

November 13, 2015 to discuss the Environmental Assessment

Proposed classroom to be built like an old adobe home at Elementary School. No schedule yet and scope needs to be finalized.

Building has been purchased and anticipated delivery is November 17th. IHS is assisting POI with the Septic System Design. The addition grant funds will be used to cover the septic system, site work, landscaping, and outdoor lighting.

#### ANIMAL CONTROL

Pet owners, now that the weather is colder, please keep your pets warm and safe from the freezing weather. Animals that are kept outside should be provided with a shelter to get out of the elements. Old bales of hay are great for making a shelter for your pet in the winter. Straw or similar hay can be used as bedding in dog houses. Blankets are also good but once they become wet, they do not insulate very well. Animals also need more calories to keep warm. A small increase in food intake will help your outside pet stay warm. Animals kept indoors should not need extra food. Dehydration is also a concern during winter months. Water easily freezes in water bowls limiting water consumption. So always remove ice from water bowls and replace with fresh water.

The January 2016 Spay and Neuter clinic has been filled, if you still would like to have your pet Spayed and Neutered there will be more clinics scheduled for 2016. We are looking for volunteers to help with the Spay and Neuter clinics, if you would like to volunteer for a couple hours or for the day contact Isleta Animal Control at (505) 869-7564.

Isleta Animal Control would like to remind pet owners of the Pueblo of Isleta Animal Ordinance. Here are a few sections of the Pueblo of Isleta Animal Control Ordinance and some of the violations that are being seen and reported. Please remember these ordinances are in place to protect visitors, family, friends and pets. They read as follows:

Sec.3E: Proper Care and Maintenance- It is the responsibility of the owner to provide adequate shelter, fresh food, and water to their animals at all times and a clean living environment. Clean water must be available and accessible at all times. Owners are also responsible to provide adequate veterinary care for an injured or sick animal. Depending on the severity or condition of an animal, could lead to criminal charges being filed for Animal Neglect and or Cruelty under this ordinance.

Sec.3F: Running at Large- No animal is allowed to run at large, roam or create a nuisance on another person's property or public areas of the Pueblo. All animals must be within the control of their owner, confined or physically restrained in a manner that it cannot escape. First offense for an animal running at large will result in a \$25.00 fine. Second offense will result in a \$50.00 fine. Third offense will result in a \$100.00 fine. Four or more violations will result in being cited for "Nuisance Animals" as well as a petition will be filed in court to have the animal removed from its owner.

Sec.3G: Animals Must be on a Leash: All animals accompanying/following their owners off their property must remain on a leash at all times. The leash must be affixed to the animal by a properly fitted collar or body harness. It must in control of their owner at all times. The first violation will result in a warning. A fine of \$50.00 will be assessed for a second violation. A \$100.00 fine will be assessed for third violation. Subsequent violations will result in criminal charges under Section 8B of this Ordinance.
