Governor's Report

The New Mexico State Legislative 30-Day Regular Session ended on February 23, 2010. The New Mexico State Legislators failed to deliver a budget, which means that Governor Bill Richardson will call for a special legislative session. The special session was scheduled for February 24, 2010 but has been moved to March 1, 2010. This session will mainly focus on the state budget and hopefully the legislatures will come to an agreement on cuts and increases.

The Legislature failed to pass House Bill (HB) 112, the severance tax bond (STB) package, which includes \$2.5 million for the tribal infrastructure fund and HB 113, the general obligations bond (GOB), which includes \$1.75 million for the tribal libraries and \$14,000 for the Isleta Senior Center. However, a number of bills important to tribes passed, including HB 162 the Severance Tax Bond, which will take 5% of the state's senior severance tax bonding capacity and dedicate it into the tribal infrastructure. The bill passed 42-24 in the House and 40-0 in the Senate; HB 56, NMFA Water Fund Projects, which include authorization for the Pueblo to receive Water Board Funds this next session; and HB 90, Native American Schools Dual Credit Programs, which will allow students attending federal BIE schools to receive dual credit at state and tribal colleges.

The proposed cigarette tax bill increase is still in question, and this issue will most likely be discussed during the special session as to whether or not a tax to cigarettes will be added. Issues such as the proposed cigarette tax increase affect our tribal businesses, and therefore it is important for tribal leaders to be present during the legislative sessions. Although tribes have been exempt from taxation of consumer products sold on reservations in NM, some states have taxed these items before they reach the reservations. Although we have a contingent of legislators who support the tribes, the state of the budget deficit is threatening the tribes' tax exemptions. Tribal leaders have met with Governor Richardson and State Legislators in hopes of allowing tribes to keep the tax increases if they pass. This will require each tribe to regulate and enforce all taxable products such as cigarette and gas sales. These taxes which will go into the general fund of each tribe. We thank our State Legislators for their support, and we thank Senator Michael Sanchez for carrying HB 162 to the Senate floor which was unanimously passed.

If you have visited the pueblo lately you have probably noticed the Old Courthouse Renovation. Work is on schedule with hopes that Catholic masses will begin being served during the latter part of March, at which time the renovation of the Saint Augustine Church will begin. The water project which will replace the old water lines in the Pueblo will also begin in March.

On Friday, February 26, 2010, Tribal Treasurer, Andrew Teller and I met with US Senator Tom Udall Staffer, Michael Lopez, and had an on site visit of the Judicial Complex. During this time we requested for appropriations to fund this and other projects for Isleta. We have also requested for funding from Congressmen Harry Teague and Ben Lujan.

To the Community of Isleta Pueblo,

I am proud to announce the recent collaboration between the Isleta Truancy Department and Project Venture in the first ever PhotoVoice (www.photovoice. org) pilot activity. Both agencies are working together to assist our youth in obtaining important life skills through the use of photography. We have recruited 3 professional photographers, one of whom is from Isleta, who are willing to volunteer their expertise to 6 Isleta youth. Participants will learn about the field of photography and the art of taking pictures in order to express themselves and bring awareness of who they are to the Pueblo.

Our kickoff date was February 27, 2010 and included a fieldtrip to several Santa Fe, NM museums introducing several areas of art to our youth in hopes to get them excited to create artistic ideas of their own. An additional fieldtrip to the University of New Mexico library will provide our students with the history of Native American photographers and how art, in general, has negatively and positively affected Native Americans.

We will be meeting every Tuesday and Saturday for 8 weeks and will facilitate several leadership activities to our participants touching on the areas of learning about SELF, EACH OTHER and the COMMUNITY of ISLETA. By learning about these areas it is less likely our youth will make unhealthy decisions when it comes to substance use/abuse or other social issues.

In order for use to understand the pressures our youth are facing in today's world I have included some statistical data regarding young Native American people:

Challenges for All Indians and Native Americans

Cultural

- Perceived discrimination
- Stereotypes, negative attitudes, and prejudices
- Dealing with their identity as Indians
- Conflict between traditions and new opportunities

Educational

- 51% graduation rate (versus 68% for all Americans)
- 17% of those aged 16-19 not in school and no high school diploma or equivalent (versus 9% for all Americans)
- 18% aged 16-19 not in school and not working (versus 10% for all Americans)

Health

• Alcohol and drug abuse (twice

national average)

- 75% of Native American youth deaths are alcohol-related
- Substance use at early age
- Health issues
- Mental illness
- Post-traumatic stress (history of oppression and present circumstances mean that risk of trauma is comparatively high)
- Lower than average life expectancy
- High suicide rate (2.5 times national average)

Criminal

- High rate of gang participation
- Involvement in juvenile justice system 2.5 times the national rate

Social

- Single parent household
- Overrepresentation in foster care
- Unlikely to take advantage of transitional living services as they age out of foster care

Personal

- Above average poverty (twice national average)
- Homelessness
- Low self-esteem
- Unclear self-image

Truancy and Project Venture are hopeful photography will allow our youth an expression avenue helping them better understand who they are and to utilize what skills they possess in order to live the gift of life to the best of their ability. As mentioned this is the first time we are doing this type of photography program and are confident we will reach more Isleta youth in the future. Of course, we need the support of our community — we encourage you to contact us to know more about the services we offer and how to help us grow and it doesn't help to talk to others about our unique services.

Other youth activities include attending the OMG! Girls Conference provided by the New Mexico Girls Institute (www.nmgirlsinstitute.orq) - The NM Girls Institute is a program of the NM Commission on the Status of Women. The Commission is charged "to increase the knowledge of the rights, responsibilities and interests of women and girls in New Mexico and to preserve women's history and contributions to our state".

All Tribal members who own irrigated farm land in the Chical area.

By order of the Ditch Mayordomos, each spring, ditch work is called for each member of the Pueblo who has an assignment of irrigated land. If you are a member of the Chical Ditch Association (active or exempt) you are required to pay an assessment fee of \$10.00 per year. A penalty fee of \$15.00 is assessed for each year of ditch work that you miss. Chical Ditch members who owe fees to the association for this upcoming year and for prior years are requested to make arrangements for payment as soon as possible.

Pueblo of Isleta Johnson-O'Malley Program

The school year is definitely flying by, and here at the JOM program we are working diligently to provide the best academic supportive services to your student. We believe that our Native American students have the opportunity and support to be successful in school reaching the highest levels of academic achievement possible. We held our parent meeting in collaboration with Jeanette D. Garcia, Coordinator of Special Programs (Indian Education) from the Los Lunas Public School District on February 20, 2010.

JOM Budget

During the meeting we provided information regarding the JOM budget which allocates funds to JOM planned and operated youth activities such as the Chaco Canyon, Carlsbad and visit to the Albuquerque Museum trips that were held. Educational material takes up a large sum of our Federal funding. Educational material includes basic school supplies for the beginning of the school year and funds to purchase TI-83, TI-84 and scientific calculators. This also includes money to purchase materials required for the K-12th grade tutoring program. The next allocation of funds is distributed to educational support, which provides money for the Outdoor Science Program held during the summer, reimbursement for SAT/ACT test fees(receipt required), and our pilot project titled, Bridging the Gap: Bringing Technology Home. Please keep in mind the Johnson-O'Malley Program is a federally funded program; JOM does not receive supplemental funding for activities from the Pueblo of Isleta at this time.

IEC Member Election

We also held elections for two vacant positions on our Indian Education Committee. We would like to welcome Leander Muskett, a parent representing Los Lunas, and Odessa Montoya. Odessa is representing Albuquerque. We would like to thank the parents and students that attended this meeting. They passionately demonstrated their ability to make positive choices for their peers, the students and the JOM program. Students have the opportunity and the right to voice concern and ideas regarding the support they receive. We strongly encourage parents and students to attend our monthly meetings. Your voices are the driving forces for our program. This is also the opportunity for you voice any comments, concerns or issues you may have about the Indian Education programs provided by the Los Lunas Public Schools under Jeanette Garcia.

Los Lunas: NO more Block Schedule?

Jeanette Garcia informed us that the School Board approved a change in next year's high school schedule. The students will no longer be on a block schedule. The number of credits required for graduation may change. This change may have little impact students that are expected to graduate in 2011. JOM Oklahoma Conference

We are hoping to attend the Johnson-O'Malley conference in Tulsa, Oklahoma during the week of March 22-25, 2010. There are several important workshops being offered. We believe it is important to have knowledge and information regarding these specific educational areas. Topics include learning styles/multiple intelligence, student/parent rights, roles and responsibilities of Title VII, elders/parents as teachers. Other workshop topics include early childhood programs, special education, gifted/talented programs, summer programs, and alternative education.



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Elementary School

Greetings from the Isleta Elementary School! I am honored to introduce myself to everyone in the community as the new Isleta Elementary School Principal. My name is Gweneth Torivio and I am from the Pueblo of Acoma. I began my work on December 15th at our fabulous school. I come to you with almost 20 years of teaching experience and 17 of those years were dedicated to teaching at Sky City Community School. I am state certified and licensed as a K-12 Administrator, a Level III Instructional Leader and a Level III Elementary Teacher.

I have been very excited to meet all the children and parents at the start of the New Year. I look forward to working with our dedicated teaching staff in accomplishing great academic strides. I know our children have the potential to make academic gains with the support of our parents, community members, and tribal leaders.

I would like to extend an invitation to you to stop by and visit, to learn more about all the wonderful changes that have been implemented to assure that our children continue to have many positive learning experiences.

We are mandated by the Bureau of Indian Education to test our students throughout the year using various assessment tools in Reading, Math and English to determine proficiency and growth.

Recently, all newly enrolled students and students who have not scored as proficient in the English language were tested using the ACCESS assessment (Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State to State). Our students are assessed with the DIBELS (Dynamic Indicator of Basic Early Literacy Skills) test which measures reading fluency and comprehension. Our students were recently tested using MAPS (Measures of Academic Progress) which measures proficiency levels in reading and math. We will administer the Standards Based Assessment for third through sixth grade students in April. The student results from the Standards Based Assessment determine our Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Students who are in the "intensive"

group may be tested more frequently throughout the school year. Student test results that are below grade level quite often have frequent absences, tardies or early check-outs.

It is critical that each student is present on-time and every day. Once again, our day begins at 8:05 a.m. and ends at 3:15 p.m. on a regular day and 12:45 p.m. on an early release day. Students who are tardy and/or absent miss out on quality reading instruction and comprehension. Students who are tardy also disrupt the entire class. Students who are checked out early are losing instruction in math, science and social studies, which are equally important. If your child will be absent, please notify the school by phone call or in writing.

In the past, we accepted phone calls requesting changes for afterschool arrangements. This practice will no longer be acceptable. There have been numerous requests which interfere with instructional time and unnecessary confusion for students and staff. We are requesting that all parents send a note with their child in the morning so that appropriate staff members are notified and parent requests are addressed in a timely manner.

Let us work together to ensure that your child is reaching his/her full potential. Thank you for your cooperation!

Health Beat- Hospitalizations for Coronary Heart Disease, Heart Attack and Stroke are DOWN, but Hospitalizations for Pneumonia and Irregular Heart Beats are UP

According to the US Department of Health and Human Services November 2009 Research Activities issue, Americans are not being hospitalized for treatment of coronary artery disease (CAD) as often. The number of hospitalizations has declined by 31 % between 1997 and 2007. Fatty deposits clog heart arteries, which restricts the flow of blood to the heart and increases the risk of a heart attack in people with CAD. With this decline, coronary heart disease no longer ranks as a leading disease treated in hospitals. It is now ranked #3. Heart attacks hospitalizations have declined by 15%. Heart attacks went from being the 4th leading disease people are hospitalized for, to being number 10 on the list. Hospitalizations for stroke is also down in rankings from number 6 to number 15, falling to 14%. Two issues that rose were hospitalizations for irregular heartbeat, rising 28%, and hospitalizations for congestive heart failure, which rose by 3%. Congestive heart failure moved from being number 3 to number 2, right behind pneumonia for the most common disease treated in hospitals in 2007.

We should all continue bringing down the number of people being hospitalized for Coronary Heart Disease, Heart attack, and Stroke, but also work on bringing down the number of hospitalizations for Pneumonia and irregular heart beat.

To lower your risk of Coronary Heart Disease, Heart Attack, Stroke, Congestive Heart Failure you should:

- Not Smoking/Stopping Smoking-Smokers are 2-4 times more likely to have coronary heart disease than that of a non-smoker. After quitting, your risk of heart problems drops by 15 % and after 15 years of not smoking, your risk is the same as a non-smoker. Sign up for Freedom From Smoking at the Isleta Health Center to help you stop smoking (869-4479).
- Be physically active-Raise your heart rate at least 3 times a week for 30 minutes at a time—5 times a week is even better!! Increase your steps, by parking farther out in a parking lot, window shopping at the mall, take the stairs instead of the elevator and take a easy walk around your neighborhood.

- Know your family history-Children of parents with heart disease are more likely to develop it themselves. Native Americans have more severe high blood pressure than Caucasians and a higher risk of heart disease.
- Maintain a normal Blood Pressure and Blood Cholesterol
- · Loose Excess Weight
- Eat a Healthy Diet
- Decrease or Discontinue Alcohol Consumption

To lower your risk of Pneumonia, you should:

- Stop smoking-Smoking makes it more likely you will get pneumonia. 869-4479
- Stay away from people with respiratory infections
- If you have not had measles or chickenpox or gotten vaccines against these diseases, avoid contact with people who have these infections. Pneumonia can be a complication of measles or chickenpox, so getting these infections can put you at risk for getting pneumonia.
- Wash your hands often. This helps prevent the spread of viruses and bacteria that may cause pneumonia.

To lower your risk of irregular heart beats, you should:

- If you notice that your irregular heart beat occurs more often with certain activities, you should avoid them.
- Stop or don't start smoking
- Limit or stop your caffeine intake. Some people are more sensitive to caffeine and may notice more symptoms when using caffeine products (teas, coffee, cola)
- If you smoke, stop.
- · Limit your intake of alcohol.
- Limit or stop using caffeine. Some people are sensitive to caffeine and may notice more symptoms when using caffeine products, etc
- Stay away from stimulants used in cough and cold medications. Some such medications contain ingredients that promote irregular heart rhythms. Read the label and ask your doctor or pharmacist what medication would be best for you.

NATIONAL NATIVE HIV/AIDS AWARENESS DAY

AMERICAN INDIANS, ALASKA NATIVES, NATIVE HAWAIIANS

National Native HIV/AIDS Awareness Day is March 20, 2010. This is a Saturday that the Isleta Community should be aware of. Get tested for HIV on 3-10-2010. Health disparities have historically been higher among Native Americans. One of these disparities is HIV/AIDS, which has been a growing problem among Native Americans. Although the numbers may seem low, Native Americans represent less than 1% of the total number of HIV/AIDS Cases, however the population size should be taken into account, showing that in 2005 Native and Alaskan Natives ranked 3rd in rate of HIV/AIDS diagnosis, just behind Hispanics and African Americans.

Getting tested is the best way to ensure that you and you partners remain as safe and healthy as possible. If you wait until you have symptoms, it can be much harder to treat with medication. With the medication available today, it is entirely possible to live a long and healthy life with an HIV diagnosis, but getting rested early is the KEY!!! New Mexico AIDS Services provides FREE and ANONYMOUS HIV testing, that doesn't even require a needle stick. The HIV tests are saliva based and completely painless and bloodless. Come into the New Mexico AIDS Services (NMAS) on Mondays from 5pm -7pm or Wednesdays from noon to 5pm for free and confidential screening.

To get to NMAS, take I25 South into Albuquerque, Take exit 226A to merge onto I40 East towards Santa Rosa. Take exit 161A for San Mateo Blvd South and turn right onto San Mateo. Then turn on Marble ave and take the 1st left into Truman st NE. NMAS is on the right, at 625 Truman St NE Albuquerque, NM 87110

WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Corner

Breastfeeding May Reduce Diabetes risk says a current study.

Conclusions from a recent study published in the February 2010 issue of Diabetes, a Journal of the American Diabetes Association, found that women who breastfeed their children have a lower risk of diabetes, even years after they have weaned. Breastfeeding for longer than nine months was associated with a 56% decreased risk for developing metabolic syndrome. For women who developed gestational diabetes during pregnancy, the study found that their risk of developing metabolic syndrome later in life was decreased by 86%. The researchers followed over 700 women for a twenty year period to determine the association between breastfeeding and metabolic syndrome. Metabolic Syndrome describes a group of risk factors that increase a person's risk for developing coronary heart disease. Risk factors for metabolic syndrome include abdominal obesity, high blood pressure, insulin resistance, and high cholesterol levels. It is estimated that over 50 million Americans have metabolic syndrome.

QUICK CARE is an URGENT CARE Service and should not be used for routine medical needs; it is not an emergency room. If the Nurse Advice Line recommends you go to an emergency room, then do so and report it to Contract Health within 72 hours. Individuals with insurance coverage should follow the rules of their coverage and may not be eligible for this Quick Care service.

Prevention is the Key to Staying Healthy

- 1. Wash Hands Often with Soap and Warm Water.
- 2. Cough into your hand, elbow, or tissue, not toward another person.
- 3. If you have flu-like symptoms, stay home until at least 24 hours after your fever is gone (without fever-reducing medicines).
- 4. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth.
- 5. Avoid contact with sick people






Basketball

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Hello everyone! The Department of Natural Resources would like to inform you all, in the community, of Household Hazardous Waste, also known as HHW.



So what is HHW?

HHW as defined by the U.S Environmental Protection Agency, is "Leftover household products containing corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients." For example, any of the following would be considered HHW:

Paint Thinners-Paint Strippers-Paint Removers

Cleaners: Spot Removers-Toilet Bowl Cleaners-Window Cleaners-Floor Cleaners-Oven Cleaners-Drain Cleaners



Automotive oil-Fuel Additives-Gasoline

Batteries: All sizes

Household Pesticides: Insect Repellent-Roach Killer-Rat and Mouse Bait

Agricultural Pesticides

Adhesives

Why Should I be Concerned?

Some HHW can pose risk to people and the environment if it is not used, or stored carefully, and disposed of properly.

Improper Disposal of HHW

Improper disposal of household hazardous waste can include pouring them down the drain, on the ground, into storm sewers, or throwing them out with the trash.

Consequences of Improper Disposal



Improper disposal of household hazardous waste can be a threat to the environment and human health in many ways. For example, the sweet smell of antifreeze attracts pets, especially cats and dogs. If you drain antifreeze on the ground, cats, dogs, and wild animals may drink it and get sick or die. Some All-Purpose Cleaners contain ammonia or chlorine bleach. Heavy-duty cleaners may be corrosive and can damage skin and eyes. Improper disposal of a household hazardous waste product can expose people to chemicals leading to possible short-term and long-term health problems such as lung and throat irritation, liver and kidney damage, and cancer.

"NUTRITION FROM THE GROUND UP"

NATIONAL NUTRITION MONTH is a nutrition education & information campaign created yearly in March by the American Dietetic Association. It focuses attention on the importance of making informed food choices & developing sound eating & physical activity habits. During National Nutrition month & beyond, the key to a healthful diet is improving your "nutrition from the ground up", this year's theme.

It's common knowledge that a healthful diet is an important part of a healthy lifestyle, but most people have trouble figuring out what to do when planning a complete diet overhaul. An easy way to focus on eating better is to start with the basics: build your nutritional health from the ground up. By starting slowly and giving yourself a good foundation, you can work towards a healthier life. Change doesn't have to be dramatic to make a difference! Try some of these suggestions

- ▶ Focus on fruits & veggies: When you take a good look at your current diet, you'll probably realize you're not eating enough fruits or vegetables. Add a serving each day to one meal & increase it every few weeks.
- ▶ Make calories count: Too often, people think of foods as good or bad & that only those on the "good foods" list are okay to eat. When you're choosing between options, focus instead on the ones with more vitamins & nutrients that you need.
- ► Test your taste buds: A healthy eating plan emphasizes fruits, veggies, lean meats, poultry, fish, beans, nuts & whole grains. Those are the basics but you can expand your horizons by trying new recipes or modifying your favorite traditional ones.
- ▶ Trick yourself with treats: A healthful diet doesn't mean deprivation! Make fruit a treat by cutting up a colorful variety into a fruit salad with a little cinnamon & toasted sliced almonds on top. Try a healthy low-fat fruit crisp or yogurt/ fruit parfait. For a non-sweet snack, sample homemade baked tortilla chips with salsa!


The younger children were not able to say Grandma so they called her "Amo" instead.
