Governor's Report

Ma gu wum,

September 7, 2017, the first Principals' meeting was held since the signing of the Isleta Diversion Dam Settlement on October 21, 2016. The Principals' meeting is attended by leadership and staff from the Pueblo of Isleta, the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District (MRGCD), and the Albuquerque Area Office of the US Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) and gives the parties a chance to discuss the progress of the Settlement Agreement. The Principals have committed to holding this meeting twice per year.

Work has been progressing well in the past several months, including:

- Disposal of 60,871 cubic yards of legacy spoil material off of the Belen Highline Canal.
- Routing of the first funds to the Pueblo by Reclamation via a PL 93-638 contract to begin to evaluate dam and irrigation infrastructure modifications, and bosque and riverine restoration options.
- Pueblo hiring of the contractor Tetra Tech to support the Pueblo with engineering and technical expertise toward developing a Preliminary Engineering Analysis Report to evaluate sediment management, fish passage, and geomorphic processes as they relate to the dam and irrigation infrastructure, as well as a bosque and riverine restoration plan. These planning-level reports are scheduled to be complete in late 2018.

While work is progressing well in many areas and the members of the Pueblo-MRGCD-Reclamation technical team are working together cooperatively, the Pueblo did bring two topics to the attention of MRGCD and Reclamation: 1) the hiring of a Pueblo Dam Tender/ISO (irrigation system operator) and 2) short-term solution to sedimentation in the Cacique Acequia.

MRGCD will be working with Pueblo administration and staff to develop the Dam Tender/ISO job description. Because the dam tender job requires someone with experience in irrigation system operation, this job will be an apprentice position until sufficient training is concluded. This position will be an employee of MRGCD, but will operate in close coordination with the Pueblo. It is expected this position will be advertised within the next few months. The Governors' office will place an advertisement in this newsletter when the position is posted.

MRGCD, in cooperation with Pueblo and Reclamation staff, will also be evaluating short term solutions to the sedimentation in the Cacique Acequia that can be implemented in the 2017-2018 off-season. Funding may be an obstacle toward immediate solutions in this area, as it is desired by all parties to conserve available funding for the more costly permanent fixes that are expected to

occur in the next several years with dam and irrigation infrastructure modifications aimed at specifically and permanently solving the sedimentation issues in this area. The options for permanent sedimentation solutions will not be known until the completion of the Preliminary Engineering Analysis Report in late 2018.



People whom wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member whom will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents therefore all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24 page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be “bumped” for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

St. Augustine Church Silent Auction
October 1 – November 19, 2017

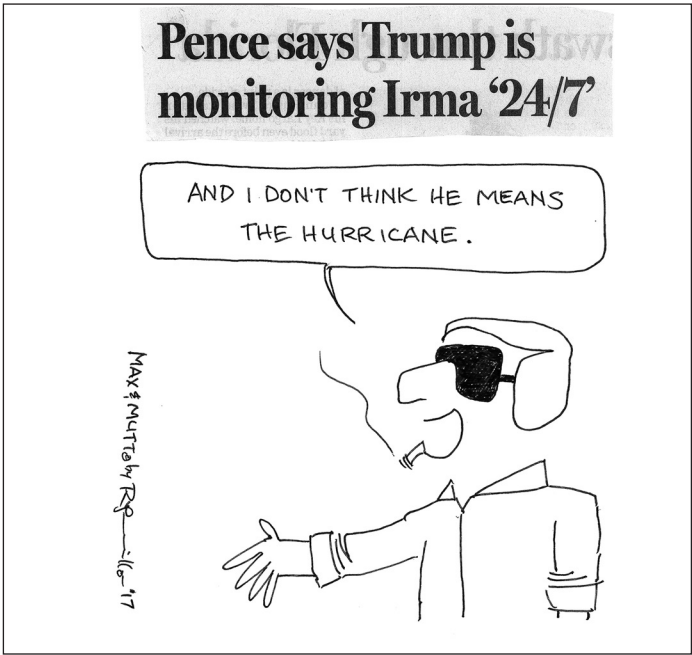
The St. Augustine Church is holding a silent auction for an armoire and two decorative doors October 1st through November 19th. Bidders must be at least 18 years of age and register to participate at the Parish Office during weekday business hours. The auction items will be available to view on October 14 (11am – 1pm) and November 4 (11am – 1pm) at the church’s storage unit: American Self Storage, 8531 Indian School NE, Albuquerque, NM 87112. Armoire (Starting Bid: \$1,000). The armoire was in the old church sacristy for many years and used to store clothing and other religious articles. The shelves are worn and could use refinishing or replacement. (Color: Dark Brown / Overall Dimensions: Height 69 3/4”, Width 102”, Depth 33”)



Decorative Doors (Starting Bid: \$200 per door). Two solid-wood decorative doors (carved design on one side only) might have been installed in the church, old priest's quarters, or old parish office. Doors designed to hang side-by-side & swing open (swivel hinges remain attached); without the swivel hinges, a single door could possibly be installed in a single door frame. Both in good condition. "Draft Integrated General Reevaluation Report and Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement, Middle Rio Grande Flood Protection from Bernalillo to Belen, New Mexico: Mountain View, Isleta and Belen Units" has been scheduled at the Pueblo of Isleta Elder Center - Activity Room Date: Thursday October 5, 2017 Time: 5:00 - 7:00 PM

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) announces the availability of a General Reevaluation Report and Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (GRR/SEIS) for Public Review. The GRR/SEIS evaluates alternatives to replace existing spoil banks with engineered levees to reduce flood risk within the Middle Rio Grande between Bernalillo and Belen, New Mexico. A spoil bank is composed of earthen material taken from an excavation and was constructed without consideration to function as an engineered flood control feature.

The GRR/SEIS also documents existing conditions adjacent to the spoil bank and potential impacts to nearby land, natural resources such as vegetation, and wildlife that could result from implementing the alternatives. The Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District (MRGCD) is the non-Federal cost-share sponsor for the flood protection project.

Public review of the GRR/SEIS will run for 45 days until October 30, 2017. The document will also be available on the Corps web site at <http://www.spa.usace.army.mil/Missions/Environmental/Environmental-Compliance-Documents/Environmental-Impact-Statements-ROD/>. A CD will be sent upon written request.

Animal Control News

Animal control has been faced with the investigation of animals that have been dumped on the range and along the Bosque in the last few months. The cause of death of these animals is unknown. This brings up the question if that animal has died from some kind of disease it has contracted. This is a public health concern as some diseases are communicable to other animals and humans. We think that animals such as coyotes and birds will feast on these discarded animals but often times these dead animals and parts go untouched for days or weeks, only to be a public nuisance in the form of foul odors.

These cases can be considered as animal neglect and or cruelty. If the owner of an animal knowingly disregards seeking veterinary treatment of a pet or livestock it is considered cruelty as per the adopted Isleta Pueblo Animal Ordinance. It states under Section 3.J that “No owner shall willfully or through negligence injury or mistreat an animal or livestock by: physical abuse; **failure to provide food water or veterinary care**; or by other acts of cruel and inhumane treatment”. A violation of this section will result in a fine of up to \$1000.00 and possible incarceration for up to six (6) months. Animal control will now look closely into these matters and take action against those owners.

We as native people pride ourselves with being in connection with nature and animals. As livestock producers and pet owners we need to have some respect for our animals. They provide companionship, food and income for their owners. This is very sad to see these animals dumped like trash. If any one witnesses or knows of anyone who may be responsible for illegal dumping of animals, call the Isleta Animal Control or Isleta Police department.

Let us keep our community clean and safe for everyone. Please contact Isleta Animal Control for instruction on properly disposing of pets and/or livestock. The following photos are some of the animals found on the range and Bosque areas over the past two years.

LEAD AND COPPER SAMPLING UPDATE

The public has heard a lot about the damage caused by Hurricane Harvey in Houston, Texas. The Pueblo of Isleta is required to obtain Lead & Copper samples from our various water systems on a routine basis every three years; and this time our sampling efforts were hampered due to the hurricane in Houston.

The Pueblo began the sampling process by dropping off containers and the necessary paperwork on Wednesday, August 23, 2017. A total of 12 containers were delivered to various residences in the Subdivision area and another set of 12 containers were taken to homes in the Eastside water system.

On Thursday, August 24th, Pueblo employees began picking up the various containers at the homes. If a container was not visible outside and ready to be picked up, the employees continued to other locations to pick up the samples that were ready to go. A total of 10 samples MUST be submitted from each water system in order to be compliant with EPA regulations. The first 10 containers picked up with the associated paperwork properly filled out are shipped off to the EPA lab for analysis.

Friday, August 25th the Pueblo had ten water samples from the Subdivision water system area, complete with paperwork, ready to go into the lab for analysis of the Lead and Copper levels in the drinking water. The EPA provided cooler was packed up with the required paperwork and the water sample containers. The cooler was taken to UPS for overnight delivery to Houston, Texas.

The required amount of samples (10) for the Eastside water system had not been obtained from the residences as of Friday morning. The water samples that had been collected so far were being held at the Utility office until the following week when it was hoped the sampling process could be completed and those samples could then be sent on their way to Houston for analysis.

As we know, Hurricane Harvey had other plans for Houston. The EPA Region 6 office, in Dallas, Texas, which oversees this area

of the country, contacted Edwin Jaramillo, the manager for the Utilities Division, on Monday August 28th and advised him that the lab in Houston was “out of business” until further notice. The Pueblo was advised to stop collecting the Lead & Copper water samples until further notice due to the hurricane. Mr. Jaramillo discussed with the EPA the status of our sampling efforts – one batch of samples was already shipped and the other set of samples was not completed as of yet.

The EPA has since advised the Pueblo that the samples sent for the Subdivision water system were delivered safely to the Houston lab and will be analyzed in the future. The samples the Pueblo is required to obtain for the Eastside water system will be obtained at a later date. Due to the conditions in Houston, the EPA is granting extensions to the various water systems that were required to obtain the Lead & Copper samples this year. The EPA will stay in contact with Mr. Jaramillo and advise him of when to schedule a new sampling event for the Eastside water system.

In the future, the Pueblo of Isleta will once again be asking the residents of the Eastside water system for their help in collecting the necessary water samples for the Lead & Copper analysis. Once Mr. Jaramillo is advised by the EPA to begin collecting the water samples, employees of the Utilities Division will be contacting the various homeowners for their assistance. Thank you to those that had already collected their water samples – those samples had to be disposed of and once we hear from the EPA about when to begin collecting samples again, new containers and paperwork will be delivered to each residence.

Thank you to all the folks in the Subdivision water system that participated in the Lead & Copper sampling event. It will be a while until we are advised of the results of the testing so please be patient.

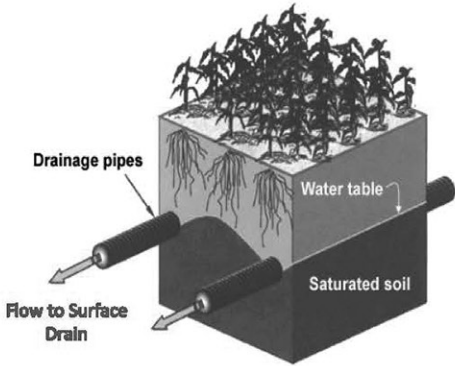

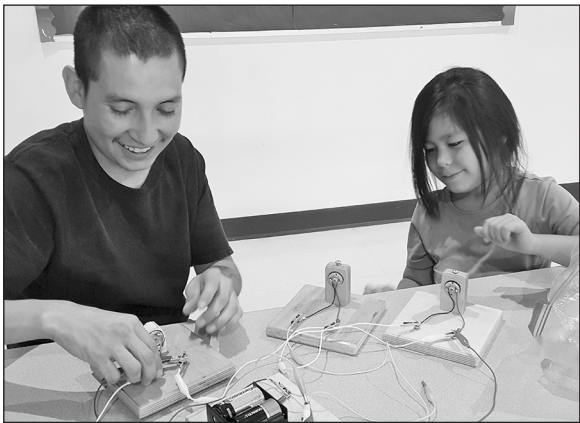
Pueblo of Isleta Elementary School

Following a Picnic Dinner, The Albuquerque Astrological Society (TAAS), presented four visual tours of the well-known constellations and explained their mythology. Explora hosted Mad Science Experiments in the Cafeteria. Participants were able to get hands-on experience with science.



On September 27th the Wonders on Wheels (WoW) mobile museum cruised to Isleta showcasing a fascinating dinosaur exhibit. It made a morning stop at the elementary school before it headed towards its next destination.

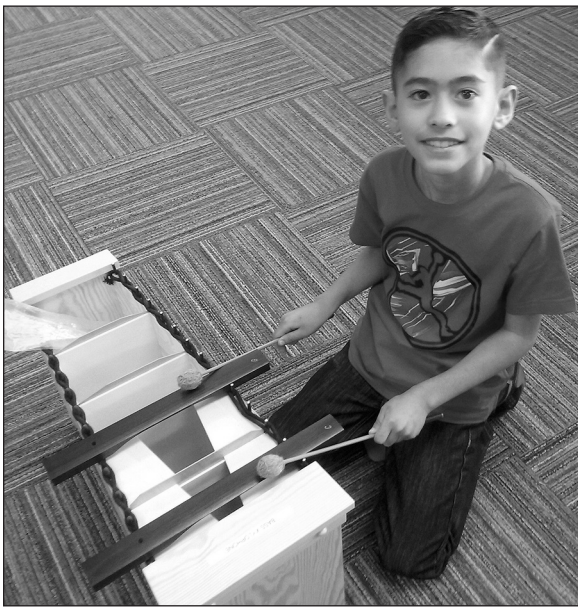


WoW is a 38-foot RV featuring 300 square feet of arts, culture, history, science exhibits and curriculum based programming on wheels from the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs. The free program travels to schools and libraries statewide. The exhibit this year featured authentic dinosaur and fish fossils from millions of years ago from the internationally renowned New Mexico Museum of Natural History and Science (NMMNHS) in Albuquerque.



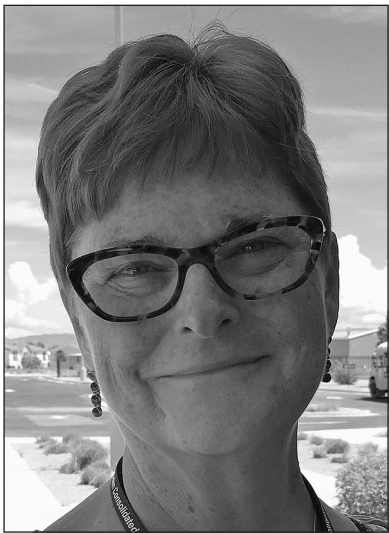
WoW Program Director Jamie Brytowski brought fossils and other educational artifacts which students were encouraged to visit and learn. "Some of them were authentic fossils and some of them were lighter weight copies," Brytowski said. Students had other authentic touchable items which was passed around, and various information specifically on New Mexico dinosaurs and discoveries was shared.

The WoW exhibit and curriculum offered a glimpse into the life of the Seismosaurus and the Coelophysis, the state dinosaur of New Mexico. In the exhibit, children learned how fossils were formed, what paleontologists do, what dinosaurs ate, how they lived and their habitat, combined with an educational curriculum that meets statewide and national standards.



Students were engaged with the interactive displays, and a table of projects and touchable artifacts. There were dinosaur specific activities involving science, technology, engineering, arts, math, and language arts.

There is exciting news from the music room at Pueblo of Isleta Elementary School. Since the beginning of September, we have been using Gameplan, a sequenced music curriculum that is built around students making and creating music. Students must learn and master the basics to do so. In the lower grades we are working on developing rhythm patterns, learning short songs and chants, and using an appropriate singing voice. We are learning about instruments and are learning how to keep a steady beat. In the upper grades, we are reading music, moving to music and creating accompaniments to songs. 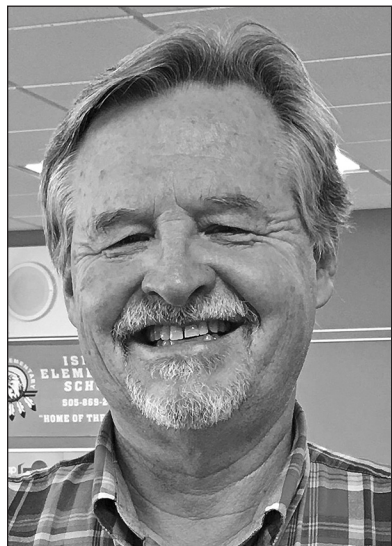

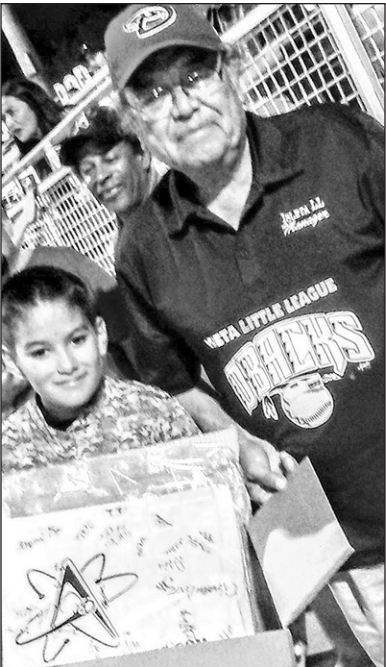

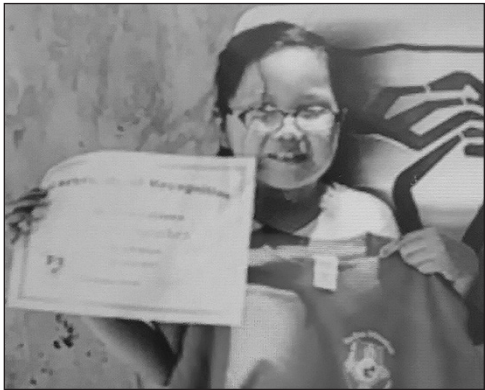

Flu Season Is Here!

WHAT IS THE FLU?

AND WHO NEEDS THAT FLU SHOT?

The flu is an illness, also called influenza, which many people get during November to April. It can cause fever, chills, body aches, and a cough. It usually lasts about 2-3 weeks, but for some people it could last longer and make them very sick. The people at high risk for complications are:

- Babies and kids under 5
- People older than 65
- Adults and kids who have health problems, such as diabetes or asthma

These individuals definitely need a flu shot, but it is also important for everyone else to get a flu shot so they are less likely to get the flu and less likely to transfer it to someone who is more at risk.

DO I NEED A FLU SHOT EVERY YEAR?

Yes, even if you got a flu shot last flu season, you will need to get a new shot this season because every year the flu virus changes and a new vaccine will be helpful in fighting the new strain.

WHAT IF I GET THE FLU?

If you start to feel the symptoms of the flu (fever, chills, body aches, cough), and are in a high risk category, then you may want to go to the Isleta Health Center. You can also start taking these steps to feel better:

- Get a lot of rest
- Drink lots of liquids (water, chicken broth, and other clear fluids)
- Take medicine your doctor may have prescribed you, or just take certain over the counter drugs to help ease your fever, aches, and pains
- You may need to see a doctor if you have trouble breathing, your muscles hurt, or you feel confused

Quick Facts:

- Cigarette butts are toxic to our ocean animals and to us.
 - Cigarette filters are made of cellulose-acetate, which is not biodegradable.
 - According to San Diego State University Public Health Professor Tom Novotny, “Even one butt in a liter of water can kill the fish in a period of 96 hours.”
 - Ocean animals like crabs and salmon can then filter toxins into their systems and transmit the toxins to humans when the animals are eaten.
 - Over time these toxins can affect human health.
- It is time to stop the “Butt Cycle.” There needs to be a shift in individual and collective thinking to classify cigarette butts as toxic waste and they should be disposed of in a way that does not hurt our environment.

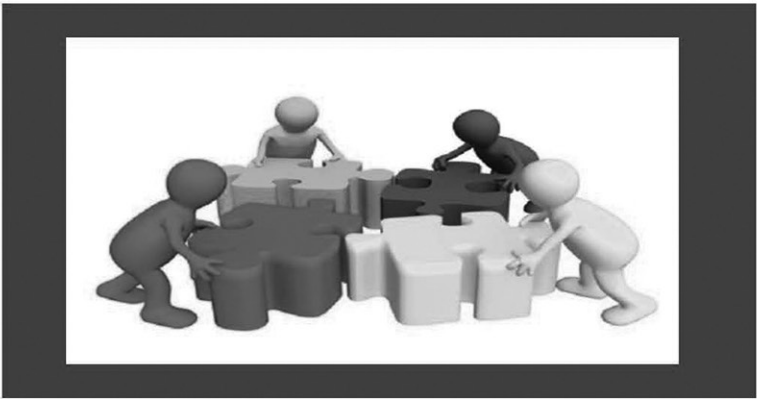

General Responsibilities: The Sales Associate is responsible for conducting all individual sales transactions for, both, internal and external customers. Additional responsibilities include conducting inventory, stocking, and performing general upkeep of the Isleta Travel Center and Isleta One Stop store(s).

Retail Operations Core Competencies: *To perform this job successfully, an individual must be able to perform each essential duty satisfactorily. The requirements listed below are representative of the knowledge, skills and ability required. Core competencies are those demonstrated competencies required for all inside positions. Position grades are based on demonstrated expertise and experience.*

- **Greet:** Smile when greeting customer(s) both in person and on the phone and use age-appropriate greetings, avoiding slang terms. Be proactive and ask how you may be of service.
- **Sell:** Inform customers of specials and "ask" every customer for another sale during the checkout process.
- **Cashier:** Use excellent cash handling techniques, and maintain 98% scan rates, avoid voids. Confirm purchases prior to ringing items etc.to minimize voids and refunds.
- **Stock:** All sales associates are responsible for stocking assigned areas on a rotational basis.
- **Clean (Inside - Outside):** Everyone in the store is responsible for keeping every area of the store (inside and outside) clean. This includes all parking areas, gas pumps, bathrooms, and common areas.

Walk Safely

1. Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.
2. Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.
3. Put electronic devices down and keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
4. Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
5. Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk going with traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.
6. Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

Trick or Treat With an Adult

1. Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, they should stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.

Keep Costumes Both Creative and Safe

1. Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.
2. Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision.
3. Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.
4. When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

Drive Extra Safely on Halloween

1. Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods. Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.
2. Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
3. Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
4. Eliminate any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.
5. Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.
6. Popular trick-or-treating hours are 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. so be especially alert for kids during those hours.

WIC NOTES

Cavity Keep Away

Dental health is important for everyone, including pregnant women and infants. **Did you know you can catch a cavity?** Cavities are made by germs in our mouth that feed on the sugar we eat. The germs can pass from person to person through spit. Keep the mouth germs away and you’ll keep the cavities away!

Here are a few ideas to keep those cavity causing germs away.

- ✓ Visit your dentist *during* pregnancy. Dental treatment is safe.
- ✓ Wipe baby’s gums *twice a day*, in the morning and right before bed.
- ✓ Clean pacifier and bottle with soap and water, *not spit*.
- ✓ Give only water in the bottle at bedtime.
- ✓ First tooth-> baby gets her own toothbrush.
- ✓ Only use a dab (the size of a *grain of rice*) of fluoride toothpaste every time you brush your baby’s teeth.
- ✓ Take baby to dentist *before* his first birthday.
- ✓ Each family member uses his or her own toothbrush, spoon, fork and cup.
- ✓ Choose gum or mints that have Xylitol (Zy-lih-tall) in them.
- ✓ Health foods help keep cavities away.

Mission: To develop the whole child in all comprehensive areas reflecting the traditional Isleta culture and language. A safe, positive, healthy, and family-centered environment is supported with: a highly competent staff; parental enrichment and enhancement of their child's education; a structured developmentally appropriate learning environment; strengthened community collaboration; & sustained stakeholder communications.

Options for you and your child:

Head Start – 3 to 5 years old

Transit Services Coming Soon to the Pueblo of Isleta

The Pueblo of Isleta and the Rio Metro Regional Transit District are pleased to announce two new transit services coming to the Pueblo beginning Monday, December 4, 2017. Bus Route 208 will connect the Pueblo of Isleta and Valencia County communities to the Alvarado Transportation Center in Downtown Albuquerque, where riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes to reach destinations like UNM, CNM and employment/shopping centers. Route 208 will feature three northbound and three southbound trips during the morning/midday when the Rail Runner does not operate. On the Pueblo of Isleta, Route 208 will serve a bus stop just east of the Rio Grande bridge on NM 147, as well as the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station. The Isleta Resort and Casino's shuttle is also anticipated to meet Route 208 at the Rail Runner Station.

Rio Metro, again in partnership with the Pueblo of Isleta, will also be bringing its "Dial-a-Ride" service to the Pueblo. This service will operate on weekdays from approximately 9:00am-2:00pm and provide trips within the Pueblo, and, potentially, to other desired destinations just outside the Pueblo. To use the Dial-a-Ride service, residents will be required to call Rio Metro dispatch and schedule their trip at least one day in advance. An accessible van will then arrive within 15 minutes of the rider's scheduled pickup time on the day of their trip.

A Public Meeting will be scheduled in November and additional information will be provided in the November newsletter after the details for both services are finalized. Look for updates in future newsletters, flyers posted at various locations on the Pueblo, and on Rio Metro's website, riometro.org

Disposing Used Sharps & Needles

Sharps are hazardous instruments like needles, syringes, and lancets. It is important to throw away your sharps safely to help prevent injury or illness. If improperly discarded, they can cause injury to family members or to the people who pick up your trash. They can also be re-used by others, which can spread disease.

Q: Where should I properly throw away my used sharps?

A: After securing sharps in one of the recommended containers listed below, you may **throw the container in the trash or take them to a drop off location listed here.**

It is recommended to use an FDA approved sharps container. If you cannot obtain one, then using this alternative method is acceptable.

We are sorry, but the Isleta Health Center does not accept used sharps or needles.

- Store sharps in a closed container with a cap.
- Do not place loose needles in the trash.
- Dispose sharps with needle facing down.
- Discard containers more than half full.

Please follow these safe disposal guidelines:

DO USE a puncture-proof, hard plastic container with a narrow screw-on lid, such as:

- Detergent bottle
- Fabric softener bottle
- Bleach bottle

DO NOT USE:

- Aluminum soda cans
- Glass containers
- Coffee cans
- Thin plastic containers

DO NOT clip or break your needles; this may cause injury.

Tape all lids with duct or masking tape before placing container in the garbage.

Put a small pinhole in the container to allow air to flow through.

DO NOT USE THESE TYPES OF CONTAINERS:

Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October is Domestic Violence Awareness month. Domestic violence can happen to anyone of any race, age, sexual orientation, religion or gender. It can happen to couples who are married, living together or who are dating. Domestic violence affects people of all socioeconomic backgrounds and education levels. Many people whom think and hear the word Domestic Violence refer to a scenario where the victim is physically abused. What is domestic violence? Domestic violence can be defined as a pattern of assaultive and coercive behaviors that include physical, sexual, verbal and psychological attacks, as well as economic coercion, that adults or adolescents use against their intimate partners.

Abuse: are any physical, sexual, emotional, economic or psychological actions or threats to diminish or dehumanize a person. This includes any behaviors that frighten, intimidate, terrorize, manipulate, hurt, humiliate, blame, injure or wound someone.

Battering: A pattern of intimidation, coercion, and threats of or actual violence used by an individual to establish and maintain control over his or her partner.

Men’s Batterer’s Intervention Program

The Belief Systems and How Change is Necessary for Healthy Relationships

Currently the Isleta Behavioral Health Services Program provides a Men’s Group, which meets weekly to address the ongoing issues of Domestic Violence. As a general society, the views are continued to be held in the perspective of domestic violence being predominantly men’s violence against women, rooted in a cultural and historical entitlement that requires a response centered on changing belief systems and requiring accountability by the individual and the community. The program works with individuals on those belief systems that are held; either from learned personal experiences within families, experiences of dominance within a culture, or entitlement which ultimately men use to justify the use of certain abusive tactics to control their partners. Although the men have violent and abusive upbringing, or learned experiences, the men within these programs need to step away from justifying his battering tactics and use this excuse to continue his violence with his partners, past, present or future. The men in the group who hold belief systems to have power and control, must acknowledge the nature he presents to his partners, his family and the community. With their destructive present behaviors, the men cannot blame anyone, any factors, and has to accept responsibility for their actions.

The group looks at their own personal belief systems, and challenges the belief systems they hold. To ensure they accept responsibility for actions and behaviors they have committed, the men engage in discussions about: the beliefs, their actions and intents behind battering behaviors.

Summary to date: we have had 25 total referrals-- 3 successful completions, 8 on going, 4 DNS (Did not schedule), 1 DNSt (Did not start), 9 Non Compliant, 1 opt for services in Valencia Co.


