Governor's Report

On September 4, 2008, the Pueblo of transfers upstream, the pumping of Isleta honored Saint Augustinito with a feast. Visitors from the surrounding Pueblos visited Isleta, along with other Native Americans from different parts of the country. I want to say thank you to the Mayordomos, Mark Jojola and Sandra Eastman and their families, to Alfred Herrera and the Acoya family for preparing and serving food to all tribal members. The food and everything was great! We also want to thank the Jicarilla Apache Tribe for their donation of two elk that were prepared by the Casino Chefs. Thank you to the chefs for expertly preparing the elk for a wonderful meal.

The history of the Saint Augustinito Feast is to honor and thank him by performing traditional dances and preparing food and feeding all people who attend the feast. Farmers prayed to Saint Augustinito for rain and vowed to hold a feast if their pravers were answered, and their pravers were answered, ending a long drought that brought prosperity back to our community. Sometimes we forget about important people who are a part of this history, the Elders who are appointed for life, we thank them and their families for their roles and commitment to the promise we made to Saint Augustinito.

September was a busy month as the administration staff attended many meetings. On September 18, 2008 Isleta hosted the New Mexico Legislative Committee for Water, and Natural Resources. As the host tribe, Isleta was allowed one hour to present its White Paper on water and natural resources, and the impact on Isleta due to water

water, and the purchase of water rights by developers. I reported the importance of water to the Pueblo of Isleta, and talked about the history and the impact water has had on our customs, religion and farming. Following the meeting, we toured the Rio Grande, where legislators got a look at the impacts Isleta is suffering due to the mentioned subject matter. Legislators were also taken to the diversion dam to see the devastation from the silt buildup and the poor maintenance of the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy. MRGCD has failed to remove the silt sediment pulled from the canals and river. A lot of this silt, which is fine gravel material, ends up in our yards whenever we have a wind storm.

Rodney Ferguson, General Manager for Isleta Casino and Resort turned in his resignation, effective October 7, 2008. Rodney has accepted a position as the CEO Director for the Spirit Mountain Confederate Tribes of Grand Ronde, Oregon. We wish Rodney all the success in his new position, and thank him for his dedication to the Pueblo of Isleta during his employment.

Official Public Notices have been mailed to your residence, tribal members who may be planning on entering the race for Governor or Tribal Council that Declaration for Candidacy for the year 2009-2010 term are now being accepted at the Tribal Council office. Get involved, register and vote, not only for tribal elections but for federal and state elections. Your vote is important!

This year, new changes have been implemented to help and support Native American students. The Title VII Indian Education staff will be working more closely with all school administrators, counselors, teachers, Isleta Tribal Administration, Department of Education and Truancy Programs to provide more and better services to our Native American students. One of the most important areas is making students aware of the services available, both in and out of school, to all Native American students. Some of the services available are after-school tutoring, access to school supplies, reimbursement for ACT/ SAT fees, and graduation cap and gown expenses.

Mr. Ben Analla, Los Lunas Title VII Liaison, is available to provide individual assistance for any Native American student. Students are encouraged to visit with Mr. Analla regarding any concerns regarding academic or other school related issues. This includes problems with failing grades and attendance issues!

Mr. Analla will be at Valencia High School on Thursdays to meet with students and staff.

Important Message to all Students and Parents

NM State Law requires students to pass the New Mexico High School Competency Exam in order to receive a high school diploma. The examination is taken during the sophomore year. Students who do not pass the examination in the sophomore year must take it again the following year.

The Office of the Special Trustee (OST) for American Indians in conjunction with the Isleta Tribal Enrollment/Census Office is attempting to locate Isleta Pueblo tribal members with an Individual Indian Money (IIM) account or for whom per capita judgment funds are held.

There are two lists; one contains the names of adults whose whereabouts are unknown and their per capita share is held in a tribal trust holding account, the other is a list of individuals with an IIM account whose current address is unknown.

Minors with an IIM account may access their funds upon reaching 18 years of age, provided they are able to manage their financial affairs on their own. Individuals not able to manage their financial affairs, as defined in 25 CFR 115.002, should be reported to the BIA Social Services, Southern Pueblos Agency, at (505) 563-3748 at least 120 days prior to their 18th birthday. The social worker will need to assess whether the individual's account should be supervised as an adult.

The Tribal Enrollment Office has the form OST 01-004/6 to give to any minors who reach the age of 18 to complete for access to their account. The account holder will need to sign and date the form on

or after their 18th birthday. The account holder may request all of their IIM funds and the account will be closed or they may request a voluntary hold. Under the voluntary hold option, the account holder may request funds for a one time disbursement, indicating the amount to be disbursed, or they may schedule payments of their IIM account funds. The frequency for the scheduled payments may be disbursed monthly, quarterly, weekly or bi-weekly, indicating the exact dollar amounts. The payments may also be made to a third party.

The account holder may also choose a method of payment in the form of direct deposit or by check, which will be mailed to the address indicated on the statements that were mailed to the account holder by the OST.

When calling the OST, it is important that the account holder knows that several security questions will be asked to verify the identity of the account holder.

ISLETA BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES SPONSORS 17TH ANNUAL RED RIBBON RELAY RUN

Isleta Pueblo Nation, along with many Native American Nations of New Mexico, sponsored the United We Run to be "Drug Free" multicultural Red Ribbon Relay Run.

The Red Ribbon Relay Run began in 1985 to commemorate Enrique (Kiki) Camarena, who was assassinated in Tijuana, Mexico by Mexican drug traffickers. Enrique was a Mexican / American law enforcement officer, with a university degree in Criminal Justice, who joined the Drug Enforcement Agency. Mr. Camarena's dangerous life was depicted in the academy award winning film entitled, "Traffic". Mr. Benicio Del Torres portrayed Enrique Camarena.

New Mexico is a gateway border state for illicit drug trafficking, coming from Mexico, Central and South America. Drugs have eroded and in some cases destroyed the fabric of American families nationwide. Native American communities are affected by the illegal drug culture. Families are impacted by drug addicted family members; children; meth labs on reservations posing serious bio health concerns and the threat of chemical explosions. These are a few of the many ways our community is impacted by the existence of the illegal drug culture in America.

Isleta Behavioral Health Services (IBHS) provides drug / alcohol addiction recovery services and behavioral mental health services to Isleta tribal members and Native Americans. IBHS staff consist of: Program Manager — Sue Sanchez; Clinical Supervisor — Frazier Wilson; Counselors - B.J. 



National Dental Hygiene Month Health Beat

October is National Dental Hygiene (Health) Month.

There are a few IMPORTANT THINGS to REMEMBER when thinking about your Dental Health:

- 1. Brush your teeth at least 2 times a day (morning and night), but 3 times a day is better!!
- 2. Eat healthy foods with little sugar.
- 3. Go to the Isleta Dental Clinic at least 2 times a year for your regular check up. (869-4872)
- 4. Use fluoride toothpaste to help protect your teeth from cavities.

What do you do when you or your child has a toothache? First of all, what is a Toothache? Pain in the tooth, usually from tooth decay (Cavities). Usually, if you or your child had a toothache, you will notice a white or brown spot on the teeth, small red bumps on the gum near the tooth, possibly a swollen cheek and pus coming out of the gum. You or your child may even have a fever.

What can you do at home to help relieve a toothache?

- To remove any possible food stuck in the tooth, it is good to floss on both sides of it.
- o Give Tylenol for pain (read the label to find out how much medicine to give)


What can I do to prevent cavities?

- o Brush your teeth at least 3 times a day.
- o Don't put child to bed with a bottle or sippy cup.
- o Mainly drink water from the tap, rather than bottled water. Most tap water has fluoride, which fights cavities, but

bottled water does not. You can also ask your dentist if you or your child needs more fluoride.

- As soon as your child's teeth appear, you should start cleaning them, either with a soft tooth brush or a wet cloth (you do not need tooth paste).
- o Begin to teach your child to brush at 2 years old, however you will still need to help your child brush until 5 years old.
- Make an appointment with the dentist when your child gets his first tooth and no later than 1 year old.
- o Floss your teeth.
- o Buy a new tooth brush every 3-4 months. Everyone in the family should have their own tooth brush, it should not be shared!!

When should I call the clinic?

- o If you see a brown or black spot in the mouth,
- o If you or your child has a tooth pain,
- o If you or your child has a fever or swelling in the cheek, jaw or chin.

Other things to know about teeth and a toothache:

- You only get 2 sets of teeth, so when your permanent ones grow in, it is VERY important to take good care of them!!
- o All tooth cavities should be seen by the DENTIST!!
- o Tooth Sealant is a clear cover put on teeth to stop cavities.

Talk to your dentist about it.

o SPIT out toothpaste when you are brushing your teeth. It is not healthy to swallow it.



WIC NOTES

Baby Health Care Basics

You do not want to have to rush out to the pharmacy every time your baby starts to sniffle. Keep these health-care basics on hand so you can address your child's symptoms as soon as they appear. You can store them together in a basket or plastic drawer divider.

- \Box Rectal thermometer for infants under 4 months
- Digital thermometer for infants over 4 months
- □ Tweezers (for splinters)
- □ Nasal aspirator
- □ Medicine dropper
- □ Baby nail scissors or clippers
- □ Cotton balls and swabs
- □ Self-adhesive bandages
- \Box Cold pack (keep in freezer)

- KY jelly
- Saline nose drops
- Infant acetaminophen drops
- □ Infant ibuprofen drops (for infants over 6 months only)
- Oral rehydration solutions (such as Pedialyte)
- Diaper rash ointment
- Antibiotic ointment
- \Box Topical tether gel
- \Box Rubbing alcohol.

When to Take Your Baby to the Doctor

Here are some of the reasons why you should take your baby to see the doctor, however, always call the

doctor's office if you are ever in doubt.

- □ Fever over 100 degrees F in a baby younger than 4 months
- Fever over 101 degrees F in a baby 4-6 months of age
- □ Fever over 103 degrees F in a baby over 6 months of age
- Your baby is unresponsive or sleeping excessively
- □ She refused to eat two or three meals in a row
- □ She is wetting fewer than four diapers a day
- □ She has persistent vomiting and /or diarrhea for more than 24 hours
- \Box She has blood in her vomit, stool, or urine

How to Take Your Baby's Temperature

It may seem hard to do at first but taking your baby's temperature with a rectal thermometer is no big deal.

When you call the doctor about a fever, she'll want to know your baby's exact temperature. In infants **under 4 months of age** rectal thermometers provide the most accurate readings.

- 1. Apply petroleum or KY jelly to a digital rectal thermometer tip. Never use a mercury thermometer.
- 2. Lay your baby on the changing table on her back (not on her belly, which is an uncomfortable position for newborns) and lift her legs in the air like you are going to change her.
- 3. Gently slide the thermometer about a half-inch into the rectum, and then hold it in place for two minutes or until the thermometer signals that it is done.

A rectal thermometer can stimulate your baby's bowels, so have paper towel or wipes on hand.

A Better Brain for Baby

Could you give your child a more important gift than a better brain? The brain is only 1/3 formed at birth. Breastmilk is designed to continue to build your baby's brain after she is born and up until 2 yrs of age. Wow!

Cow's milk (which is what standard infant formulas are made from) cannot build your child's brain the way mother's milk can.


