### Governor's Report

I want to wish the entire community a nice month of health and safety. I have been in office for two months and I want to thank you for your support and encouragement. Also, thank you for continuing to practice safety protocols and keeping our COVID numbers low

In January, my entire administration and Tribal Council attended the Traditional All Pueblo Council of Governors meeting that was held in Santo Domingo to welcome all incoming Pueblo leadership. This annual meeting has been occurring in Santo Domingo for over 500 years. I want to thank all the Pueblo Governors who attended and give a special thank you to the Pueblo of Santo Domingo and especially the women that cooked and provided us with a delicious lunch.

My administration and Tribal Council attended the annual Indian Day at the State Capitol on February 3. We met with several leaders from different tribes to coordinate lobbying support on issues regarding tribal concerns. We also met with State Representatives Benny Shendo, Derrick Lente and Harry Garcia, to lobby issues that impact the Pueblo of Isleta such as education, tribal law enforcement, and capital outlay requests. We have monitored bills and tribal priorities closely through the New Mexico legislative session (pg.2-3). We look forward to growing collaborative relationships with the state departments to ensure our tribal needs are met through the state. Through our relationships with state agencies, my administration has already secured an additional \$280,000 in previously tied-up law enforcement funding. I want to thank the New Mexico Governor Lujan Grisham for acknowledging the excellence in Isleta's tribal programs, especially for commending our Assisted Living Facility and Elder Center and their critical role in serving our community. I also want to congratulate former San Ildefonso Governor James Mountain for being selected by Governor Lujan Grisham as the Secretary of Indian Affairs Department.

On February 11, a meeting was held to select new Mayordomos for the 2023 farming season. I want to thank all tribal members who attended and those that were selected and offered to serve in this capacity. My administration is working on securing grant funding to repair and provide maintenance on Pueblo irrigation ditches. I wish all the farmers a plentiful year.

We held our first Community Meeting on January 21, 2023 and it was attended by approximately 200 tribal members. At the Meeting, tribal members identified several priority issues that they hope to see my administration address. As promised, I would like to follow up on those concerns. The first issue was the hiring of tribal members and

the HR process. To address hiring concerns, I had HR present at my first Director's Meeting the hiring procedures and gathered ideas of how to streamline the hiring process. The second priority issue raised by tribal members was concerns about housing in our community. In response, my administration and Tribal Council have met with the IPHA Board to redress housing concerns. The next community meeting is tentatively planned for April, where we plan to give department updates regarding the issues that were raised previously.

The Tribal Council has been conducting business for the benefit of the Tribe in various areas. First, they have authorized a tribal distribution for Tribal Members who were not initially eligible to receive a distribution in November of 2022 because they resided outside of the seventy-five mile radius. Tribal members were notified to update their address on or before February 10 with checks to be mailed by March 10, 2023. Tribal members

who received the November 2022 distribution or were born after November 12, 2022 will not be eligible to receive this distribution.

Second, my administration and Tribal Council are working on several major infrastructure projects. The first project is to upgrade the Pueblo's broadband infrastructure with fiber optics to provide the fastest internet service to the community. Once the project takes flight, it will take a couple of years to complete. My administration and the Tribal Council are also working on drilling and constructing several new wells for the community. These wells are an emergency project and we hope that they will be completed within my term.

Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during the month of February.

# PUEBLO OF ISLETA, RESIDENTS, CONTINUE TO FIGHT AGAINST ASPHALT PLANT DEVELOPMENT IN ALBUQUERQUE'S SOUTH VALLEY

The Pueblo of Isleta, together with the Mountain View Coalition, filed on Tuesday, February 14, 2023, an *Amicus Curiae* brief in the Second Judicial District Court matter *Randy Sena v. Board of County Commissioners*. The Pueblo of Isleta and neighborhood residents continue to oppose the landowners' proposal to develop an asphalt plant in Albuquerque's South Valley.

In September 2022, the Bernalillo County Commissioners upheld the County's administrative determination to maintain the land's rural-agricultural zoning and to restrict any manufacturing uses, including for a continuous asphalt plant, to those specifically authorized through a prior special use permit and site development plans from the 1980s and 1990s. The Pueblo and the Mountain View Coalition, which includes the Mountain View Neighborhood Association, Mountain View Community Action, and Friends of Valle de Oro National Wildlife Refuge, have opposed the plant's development throughout the County's zoning review process, arguing that the development would worsen the region's air quality and increase industrial noise and traffic for neighboring residents. The Pueblo also opposed the proposal through the City of Albuquerque's air quality permitting process.

Now, proponents of the asphalt plant have appealed the Bernalillo County Commissioners' decision, hoping to obtain permission for their proposed development through the state judicial system. The "Friend of the Court" brief filed today by the Pueblo of Isleta and Mountain View Coalition draws the Court's attention to the likely environmental impacts of the proposed landuse, which community members have largely opposed. A reversal by the State District Court, argues the *Amicus* brief, would amount to a significant shift in land-use policy for a region zoned rural-agricultural, without first providing an opportunity for public participation, which is typically required prior to a zone-change.

"Isleta Tribal Members and South Valley residents deserve access to clean air and water. We should not be required to bear the brunt of expanding polluting industries — especially when we have been excluded from any public participation process related to the development proposal," said Max Zuni, Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta.

"The Mountain View Community and our sister community, Pueblo of Isleta, have suffered for decades from disproportionate industrial development and the pollution that industry generates. The protection that zoning regulations have provided to our communities has been limited due to inequitable zoning regulations imposed on our neighborhood in the 1970s. The zoning protections that we do have are essential to limit the cumulative impacts of unharnessed polluting businesses in our communities. Any challenge to the zoning laws in place now is also a challenge to the rights of every person to live in a safe, healthy environment that respects the well-being of everyone, not just the wealthy and privileged," said Marla Painter of Mountain View Community Action and member of the Mountain View Coalition.

### PUEBLO OF ISLETA - STATE BILL LIST

The New Mexico legislative session is underway. The Pueblo of Isleta has been actively engaged this year, tracking the 1,000+ bills to ensure that the Pueblo's interests are advanced through State legislation, while also protected from State overreach. The Governor's Office and Isleta program directors have been busy testifying in legislative committees, drafting and proposing amendments, and advocating for a state budget that properly funds the Pueblo's programs. The Tribal Council and Governor met with state legislators at the Capitol on February 3, 2023. The Governor also met with NM Governor Lujan Grisham on February 17, 2023, to discuss shared legislative priorities.

We encourage your individual advocacy in support of the bills that would benefit the Pueblo and in opposition of those that are to the Pueblo's detriment. The below list provides the position of Isleta leadership on the bills that have been deemed most critical to the Pueblo. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

**PROBATES** need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture June be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.



### ISLETA DIVERSION DAM – PUBLIC MEETING NOTICE

The Bureau of Reclamation has prepared an environmental assessment (EA) to analyze potential impacts associated with modifying the Isleta Diversion Dam (IDD) in the Rio Grande on the Pueblo of Isleta in Valencia County, New Mexico. This notice announces the availability of the EA for public review and comment. The EA was prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (40 CFR:1500–1508).

We analyzed two alternatives in the EA, the No Action and the Proposed Action alternatives.

### Alternative A: No Action Alternative

The IDD would not be modified, and a fish passage would not be constructed at the IDD. In addition, there would be no changes to the IDD river, sluiceway, or headworks gates and these gates would continue to be manually operated to maintain head pressure for irrigation demands. This alternative would not meet the project objectives or requirements under the 2016 Agreement of Settlement and Compromise Regarding the Isleta Diversion Dam or the 2016 Middle Rio Grande Biological Opinion for water operation and river maintenance activities.

### Alternative B: Proposed Action Alternative

The Proposed Action would improve sediment management and fish passage at the IDD by the following actions:

- > East Bank Realignment: The east bank upstream of the dam would be realigned to reduce erosion and entrained sediment entering the Peralta sluiceway.
- > Peralta Sluiceway Modification: The Peralta sluiceway, along the east bank, would be modified by adding an upstream step and a slope to further reduce the sediment load diverted from the Peralta sluiceway into the canal headworks.
- > Fish Passage: A baffled fishway would be constructed through an IDD gate to provide silvery minnow passage during the irrigation season and periods of low river flows.

The public is invited to attend a public meeting and provide written comments. The public meeting will follow an open house style format and consist of exhibits with different aspects of the project. The meeting will provide an opportunity for the public to learn more about the EA, have discussions with Reclamation staff, and provide input.

### Health Beat Glaucoma

Glaucoma is a very common disease that affects more than 3 million people a year by damaging the optic nerve, which is the nerve that provides information to the brain. If left untreated it can cause gradual vision loss. There usually are no symptoms for Glaucoma, which is why it is so important to get regular vision exams to detect problems early and get them treated. In most types of glaucoma, the eye's drainage system becomes clogged so that intraocular fluid cannot drain. This can cause pressure inside the eye, which if the pressure becomes too high, can damage the sensitive optic nerve and result in vison loss.

### WHAT PUTS YOU AT RISK FOR GLAUCOMA?

- Over 60 years old
- Relatives of glaucoma patients
- Those that are very nearsighted (myopic)
- Hispanics in older age groups
- Those that are very nearsighted (myopic)
- African American or Asians
- People with thin central cornea

### WHEN SHOULD YOU GET YOUR EYES CHECKED FOR GLAUCOMA?

- Before age 40, every 2-4 years.
- From age 55-64, every 1-2 years
- From age 40-54, every 1-3 years
- After age 65, every 6-12 months

### ARE THERE SYMPTOMS FOR GLAUCOMA?

- Often there are no uncomfortable or painful symptoms
- In less common kinds of glaucoma, symptoms can be more severe, which include:
  - Hazy vision
  - The appearance of rainbow colored circles around bright lights
  - Eye and head pain
  - Sudden sight loss
    - Nausea or vomiting
- People of all ages are affected by this, from babies to elders
- Sight loss from glaucoma cannot be reversed; however, early detection and careful, lifelong treatment with medication or surgery can maintain vision

# WHAT ARE THE MOST COMMON TYPES OF GLAUCOMA?

- Open-Angle Glaucoma
  - •Slow clogging of the drainage canals, resulting in increased eye pressure
  - •Has symptoms and damage that are not noticed
  - Develops slowly and is a lifelong condition
  - •Most common form of glaucoma
- Angle-Closure Glaucoma (AKA: Acute or Angle Narrowed Glaucoma)
  - •Caused by blocked drainage canals, resulting in a sudden rise in intraocular pressure
  - Develops very quickly
  - •Has very noticeable symptoms and damage usually
  - •Needs immediate medical attention

### **HOW DO YOU TREAT GLAUCOMA?**

- Medications usually are used to treat glaucoma to either help the fluid drain better or to decrease the amount of fluid
- Surgery is another way to treat glaucoma:
  - · Laser Surgery, done in an outpatient setting
  - Microsurgery (AKA: conventional surgery), done in a hospital or surgery center





History: The AT&SF Tie Treater site is in Albuquerque near Rio Grande State Park. The site operated as a railroad tie treating plant from 1908 to 1972. The use of wood treatment products led to the release of hazardous substances, which injured groundwater and wildlife habitat resources. The second South Valley Superfund site is also in Albuquerque and spans approximately two square miles in the South Valley area. This site was used for industrial operations beginning in the 1950s. Hazardous substance releases led to the contamination of soil and groundwater resources.

Meeting Details: The State Office of Natural Resources Trustee (ONRT) will present a public meeting on closing out two Superfund sites in the South Broadway Area / Mountain View community. The ONRT has proposed a project that has been challenged by community members including the Pueblo of Isleta. The proposed project has yet to be finalized and community input on this project is important. You are encouraged to attend this meeting; your presence would be welcome.

### Advice from a Doctorate student

"The first piece of advice that I would give to an incoming high school student would be to buckle down and work hard through high school and develop good study habits. It's really hard on some students when they graduate high school and go to college because they don't have parents or teachers hovering over them to make sure the student gets their work done. The best way to help the transition from high school to college is to have good study habits and be responsible. In college most of the professors aren't going to be very understanding of missed or late assignments and they certainly don't like excuses. They've heard them all. To me, grades are the most important part of high school because of how much value those little numbers and letters hold. These will be the start to your college career. Knowing this very early in high school is the biggest advantage you can have compared to your peers. my first year as a freshman I did not really care about my grades. I was never really told that my grades were important and I had the mindset that my grades would not matter this early on. A horrible mistake I wish I could take back, but around my second year as a sophomore I came to realize how important my grades are and how much they mattered. Even if it was super early into my high school life. I changed how I acted and focused mostly on my grades, studying for tests and doing homework. If I had the advantage of a high school senior telling me how much my grades mean even if I was to be an incoming freshmen would have scared me straight. ### Our Commitment to You

Greetings Isleta families and friends! We were happy to hear that many our families wanted to know more about the happenings of our school. We want to honor our commitment to keeping you informed. You can expect regular newsletters with school updates as well as text message and email notifications. If you have not been receiving our text message or email notifications, contact the Front Office to get signed up.

### What's going on with the bus?

First of all, we want to thank all of our wonderful families for dropping off and picking up their children while our transportation services were out of operation from February 6-9th. We understand that this creates an inconvenience, and we appreciate you working together with us.

Our program consists of one bus and driver. When there is an issue or concern, we must reach out for your assistance. Our **immediate response** is to:

- 1. Notify all parents/guardians using the text message system to pick up or drop of their children.
- 2. Request support from the Recreation Center to transport children participating in the afterschool program.
- Utilize a Government vehicle to pick up and drop off children if parents/guardians are not able to come to the school.
- Offer extended school hours afterschool to allow for parents/guardians to pick up children after 3:15 pm.

As of February 10, we have a substitute bus driver that will complete the morning and afternoon routes. This will continue until March 17. Our goal is to have two operating buses and two bus drivers. ### Did You Know?

### The Hubbell Crash Site

In 1946, there was a crash on the Pueblo of Isleta involving a U.S. Navy twin engine air transport plane. The plane had 11 military personnel on board, and all 11 were killed in the crash.



There was over 1,800 pounds of debris that was recovered, consisting of over 8,500 pieces of the plane.





The aircraft involved in the crash was a cargo transport counterpart for the Douglas C-47 'Skytrain'. Shown above is the 'Skytrain'.

### The Season of Assessments

### What type of standardized test does my child take?

- NWEA MAP During the month of February, all students in grades K-6 participated in NWEA MAP assessments. This is a computer-based assessment that is administered during the fall, winter, and spring.
- ACCESS Students in English language learner (ELL) program take the ACCESS for ELLs language proficiency test in February. The test measures academic English language proficiency for students learning English in our school and throughout our state.
- ❖ BIE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS (ELA) & BIE MATH All students in grades 3-6 take the BIE ELA and BIE Math tests during the Spring. These computer-based tests measure academic proficiency in English language arts and mathematics.
- ❖ BIE SCIENCE This computer-based test is only administered to students in grades 5 during the Spring and measures academic proficiency in Science.
- ❖ BIE ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT This assessment is designed for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. The decision for a student to be administered the alternate assessment is left to the discretion of the individualized education program (IEP) team.

### Why is it important for my child to participate?

Teachers in our school use this information to help them make decisions about instruction for your child. Teachers also use these test scores to monitor the progress your child makes toward proficiency of the state standards. It helps students, parents, and teachers understand the student's level of performance and areas for improvement.

### Can I get a copy of my child's test results?

Yes! NWEA MAP assessments reports are available after each testing period (fall, winter, spring). All other test reports are not available until June 2023. We will plan to distribute these reports at the start of the SY23-24 school year. We also maintain a copy of these reports in your child's records.

### What can my child do to prepare?

Students can prepare by getting a good night's rest the night before the test day, arrive to school on time, eat breakfast, and do their best.







### Recap





### **Upcoming Projects**

The Public Works Department will be busy with new projects the next few months and through the year, we ask to please be careful when traveling in these areas and watch out for the construction crew and equipment.

- Installation of water main line along the Westside shoulder of NM 314 in the area between TR 90 and TR 82 starting in late March 2023
  - o This project will eliminate an existing dead-end water line, installation of a fire hydrant and stubouts for additional water main lines to be installed in the future.
- Construction will be started for a new well that will be drilled near TR 82 and Hwy 314, with an elevated 200,000-gallon water storage tank to be constructed on the same property.
  - o The elevated water storage tank will provide consistent water pressures throughout the area which is a much needed improvement.
  - o Once the well and elevated tank are completed, the old well located on TR 90 will be properly abandoned.
- Installation of new water main lines from TR 90 and Hwy 314 along TR 90 to Hwy 45, then along Hwy 45 to TR 76
  - o This project will replace existing 2" and 4" water main lines with new 6" water main lines, fire hydrants, and valves along these roads.
  - o Residences will be connected to the new water lines and the old main lines will be abandoned.
  - o More information will be shared once a Contractor has been selected and the time frame for construction will be announced.
- Eastside Sewer Systems Improvements Project
  - o Is in the very beginning stages of design
  - o All residences and buildings on the Eastside of the Rio Grande and South of the Tribal Complex, to the Bosque Farms and Peralta reservation lines will be connected to a sewage collection system



- o The sewage collection lines will connect to the existing Eastside treatment facility, which has enough capacity to handle the expected sewage. Preliminary design includes an E-1 pump system to be installed at each building, with piping connecting the E-1 unit to the main collection line; lift stations as needed to pump the sewage to the treatment facility, abandonment of existing septic systems at each residence and electrical upgrades as necessary.
- o Public Works will hold a public
- meeting to Tribal Members as the project moves forward, no date has been set yet, so be on the lookout for that information.
- Progress on drilling two new water wells on the Eastside water system continues.
  - o One well is to be located in the Lobumtee area and the other well in the Chical area
  - o Potential locations for well drilling have been chosen and survey work is underway.

With heavy hearts, our thoughts and prayers go out to the Zuni family during this difficult time due to the loss of our brother, Eddie Zuni. We value the commitment and dedication Eddie gave as he served his community; both as an employee of Pueblo of Isleta and as a tribal member.



# Public Works Department SEPTIC SYSTEM INFORMATION – PROTECT YOUR INVESTMENT

Your septic system consists of a service line, cleanouts, septic tank and leach field. The service line brings the sewage from your home to the septic tank. From the tank, the treated liquid will either gravity flow or be pumped to a leach field that disperses the liquid into the soil for further treatment and disposal. Any solids that enter the tank will fall to the bottom of the septic tank. These solids are necessary to help treat the incoming sewage. Pumping out the tank too frequently removes these solids and has an impact on the efficiency of the treatment process occurring inside the tank.

The Public Works Department has several systems that are currently failing. Some of the systems have leach fields that are over-saturated with water. Once the leach field is saturated, the soil cannot absorb any more liquid, resulting in over-flowing septic tanks and back-ups into the home.

One cause of this is plumbing fixtures inside the home that leak – sending clean water into the system. Constant flows from toilets can fill up a septic tank in a matter of days. Over time, so much water is wasted into the tank and leach field that the entire system fails. Once the system fails, the septic tank has to be emptied on a routine basis to prevent over-flowing. Each time the septic tanker has to empty the tank, a cost is incurred to the Pueblo.


All Tribal members need to be aware of any leaking fixtures in their homes. A lot of water is wasted from leaking fixtures and can quickly ruin a septic system or send higher flows into the treatment facilities. The cost to produce the drinking water and the cost to treat the wastewater goes up as water is utilized. If every resident takes the time to look for and repair the leaks in their homes, the Pueblo could save thousands of gallons of water each month, lowering the cost to provide you with drinking water and the cost to treat the wastewater.

There are approximately 50 septic tanks that are currently being pumped out on a routine basis. Problems with the systems are due to the age of the leach field or tank, some leach lines are packed with tree roots and some systems have been damaged by being repeatedly run over, equipment parked on top of them, and buildings built on top of the tank and/or leach fields.

Homeowners need to know where their septic tank is at, where the leach field is and avoid building anything on top of, or close to, any of these structures. Do not park on top of your tank (you can crush the tank), do not drive over the service line, tank or leach field as this causes damage to the system that can cost thousands of dollars in repair work.

Take care of your system to prevent damage. Do not plant trees anywhere near your septic system. Tree roots grow inside the pipes, creating blockages; the roots spread throughout your septic tank, growing and damaging your tank. Roots grow inside the piping that is part of your leach field, growing quickly and blocking the pipe or breaking the pipe, rendering the leach field in-operable.

### **TRUANCY**

Greetings!

The Truancy Department has been busy this second semester of school. We have been working closely with Los Lunas Public Schools to monitor student's daily attendance. While some of our students continue to attend daily, others still struggle; these are the "after effects" of COVID.

Our department has sent out over 180 1st notification letters and approximately 120 2nd notification letters to some of the students. In accordance to our Steps of Enforcement, we are obligated to notify families and start working with them to address the unexcused absences. Below is a reminder of these steps:

Steps of Enforcement

### **Third Absence**

First notification letter will be sent to the address on file with the student's school. It is responsibility of the parent/guardian to contact the Truancy Department to discuss the three (3) unverified / unexcused absences *after* contacting the school.

### Fifth Absence

A Second Notification letter will be sent to the address on file. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to contact the Truancy Department to discuss the five (5) unverified/unexcused absences after contacting the school. The student and their parent/guardian will enter into a <u>Truancy Attendance Contract</u>.

### Seventh Absence

Third notification letter will be sent to the address on file with the student's school; continued interventions and preventions will be offered at this time. Parent and student will be *mandated* to attend the Truancy Office Prevention Program (TOPP Presentation).

### **Tenth Absence**

Final notification letter is sent to address on file with student's school. Attendance Contract modification will take place.

### Peacemakers Program

Once both the parent and student agree upon utilizing the Peacemakers Program, the referral will be submitted to Tribal Court and a date will be set.

•After all interventions have been exhausted, a Truancy Petition will be filed in Tribal Court; all Truancy Petitions are filed on a case by case basis.

We continue to work with the Isleta Department of Education in offering support services to our students and their families. Although it seems repetitive, the students are receiving the support they need and are more willing to move forward with their education.

The Truancy Department continues to monitor those students with perfect attendance. Students attending Los Lunas Public Schools, Isleta Elementary School, the Native American Community Academy, Albuquerque Public Schools and School of Dreams Academy have the opportunity to receive perfect attendance incentives. Parents can call our office to let us know if their child has perfect attendance and we will confirm the information with the school their child attends. In order to do this, we will need to have a *Student Release of Information* on file with our office.

### Eye Health for Adults Over 60

### See your eye doctor regularly!

First and most important, it is recommended that you have your eyes examined by an optometrist or ophthalmologist at least once per year. You will be screened for eye diseases such as glaucoma or macular degeneration. If these are identified early, you can work with your eye doctor to preserve your vision for many years to come.

### Maintain a healthy lifestyle!

Conditions such as Diabetes and High Blood Pressure can affect your eyes. It is very important to work with your Primary Care Doctor to maintain healthy blood sugar and blood pressure. A healthy lifestyle not only helps the body, but also helps the eyes.

### Use the right eye drops!

Dryness of the eyes is very common with age. It is recommended that you use eye drops for lubrication, also known as "artificial tears". Avoid drops that say, "get the red out" as these can actually make the eyes feel more dry. Instead, look for drops that say "lubricating" or "moisturizing". If you are not getting sufficient relief, talk to your eye doctor about other options.

### Be aware of normal aging changes to your vision! The eyes change with time. Driving at night and

moving from dimly lit to well-lit areas become more difficult. Be extra cautious while driving, especially at night. You may also find that good quality lighting will improve your ability to read and do other near tasks.

### Wear Sunglasses!

Good sunglasses with UVA/UVB protection will help to slow the progression of cataracts and other eye damage that can be caused by UV light. Wide-brimmed hats can also help to decrease the UV light that enters the eyes.



### Health Beat: Colorectal Cancer

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. This is a month to spread awareness of this disease in which cells in the colon or rectum grow out of control. The colon is the large intestine/bowel and the rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus. Abnormal growths, called polyps, sometimes grow in this area. Over time, they can turn into cancer, which is why it is important to get screened to find and remove the polyps before they become cancer, or, if cancer has already formed, it is important to catch it early, as treatment works best in the early stages of cancer.



Are you at risk to get Colorectal Cancer? There are some risk factors

that make it more likely for you to get colorectal cancer that you cannot do anything about, such as:

- · Age (as you age the risk increases)
- Inflammatory bowel disease such as Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis.
- A personal or family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps.
- A genetic syndrome such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP), external icon or hereditary non-polyposis colorectal cancer (Lynch syndrome).

However, there are also some lifestyle factors that put you more at risk for this disease and these lifestyle factors you can change, to bring down your risk. These factors are:

RISK: Eat a diet low in fruit & veggies.	WHAT TO DO: Eat more Fruits and Vegetables.

Many cancers affect both men and women and of these cancers colorectal cancer is the <u>3rd leading cancer killer</u> in the United States, according to the American Cancer Society. The sad thing is, <u>it does not have to be</u>, because as mentioned above, there is a screening you can get to catch the abnormal growths, known as, polyps, before they become cancer. According to the CDC, about nine out of every 10 people whose colorectal cancers are found early and treated appropriately are still alive five years later. This is why it is so important to get screened!

The exciting new news is that that recently the US Preventive Services Taskforce began recommending screening for colorectal cancer in adults aged 45 to 75 years. Previously it was age 50-75, which is great to hear because the earlier you catch it the better. So, if you are 45 years old or older, **get screened now**. If you think you may be at increased risk for colorectal cancer, speak with your provider about when to begin screening, which test is right for you, and how often to get tested.





### **Helping Your Adult Family Member**

### Who Has an Addiction

Although you may be tempted to rescue, bribe, pamper, scold, or threaten your adult family member who continues to use and abuse alcohol and/or drugs, this is not a helpful approach.

Families share experience, strength, and hope at Al-non meetings. These meetings teach you how to stop "enabling". The word enabling means "allowing, permitting, or aiding" the alcoholic/addict to stay in their sickness and enabling keeps you, the family, trapped in the problem. Enabling can make you physically and emotionally sick and cause increased stress with you and your home environment. Addiction is not something that affects just the alcoholic/addict but has a negative impact on the entire family and the community.

No one wants their adult family member to suffer with an addiction and your intentions to help are out of love and concern. When enabling turns into an intervention, things begin to change. It is time to take your focus off the adult family member's addiction and place it onto yourself and your family. You regain power to make meaningful choices about what you will do and what you won't do. Enabling does not teach responsibility.

### WHAT IS GRIEF?

Grief is the natural reaction to loss. While everyone experiences some form of grief and loss, it is also an intensely personal experience. It is the emotional suffering we feel when we lose something or someone we love. The pain of the loss can feel overwhelming and we may suddenly experience unexpected emotions from shock or anger to disbelief, guilt, and deep sadness. The pain of grief is not limited to our emotional suffering but our physical health can also suffer, making it difficult to sleep, eat, or even think straight. These are common reactions to loss—and the more significant the loss, the more intense our grief will be.

Many are enduring losses during this challenging time of the Pandemic. While we usually associate grief with the death of a loved one, any loss can cause grief, including:

- Divorce or relationship breakup
- Loss of health
- Loss of a job
- Loss of financial stability
- A miscarriage
- Retirement
- · Death of a pet
- Loss of a cherished dream
- Serious illness of a loved one
- Loss of a friendship
- Loss of safety after a trauma
- Selling or moving away from the family home

Whatever the cause of the grief, there are healthy ways to cope with the pain that, in time, can ease our sadness and help us come to terms with our loss, find new meaning, and eventually move on with our lives.

### Seek help if you:

- 1. Feel like life isn't worth living
- 2 Wish you had died with your loved one
- 3. Blame yourself for the loss or for failing to prevent it
- 4. Feel numb and disconnected from others for more than a few weeks
- 5. Are having difficulty trusting others since your loss
- 6. Are unable to perform your regular daily activities
