# Governor's Report

Maguwam,

I want to continue to wish the entire community a nice safe and healthy month as we approach into Summer! We would like to remind the community to continue to practice the safety protocols and continuing to keep our COVID numbers low.

I would like to take this time to thank our families, St. Augustine church, our community, POI departments and volunteers who came together to make Governor's feast day happen. We could not have done this without you and your help! We pray that St. Augustine will continue to bless us with strong crops and a good harvest this year.

As we approach into July and in celebration of July 4th, we would like to inform everyone to be safe and to abide by all orders in place for firework users.

I am excited to mention that the Chical Little Leagues field on Tribal Road 10, continue to make progress. We are currently waiting for a light fixture, and we expec the lights will be running in a couple of weeks. The next phase has begun with the concession building with a kitchen, restrooms and a storage unit. This projection is 20% complete for the Chical field. We are going to be starting with laying dirt in 2-3 weeks by the Minor and Major softball fields. Once the dirt is set, they will start with the concession building with kitchen, restrooms, and storage units. We ask you are careful around these areas as the facilities are undergoing these improvements.

I am aware of the current situation with the increase of the mosquitos in the surrounding areas. The pueblo does intend to provide mosquito control in the parks and recreation areas only. We are currently waiting on bids from outside vendors. Keep in mind there is not a possibility we are able to kill all mosquitos, we strongly encourage you to continue with utilizing insect repellent when outdoors.

Moonlight Drive Extension Project – This project has been awarded and is scheduled to start construction July 10, 2023. The construction project will involve the extension of existing Moonlight Drive to a new intersection of Moonlight Drive with NM314. This project will include two roundabouts, curb & gutter, sidewalk, a multiuse trail asphalt surfacing, waterline, sewer lines and storm drains. The project will be new roadway construction and there will be a traffic control plan for the access of Palace West Casino that will reopen in the beginning of July. Construction is expected to last 6 months. The area will be restricted access and we ask that when construction starts to please avoid driving, biking, walking and jogging in the area under construction for your safety and the safety of the construction workers.

Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during the month of June.

- Dash in data table indicates sample not collected. "MPN" is a unit of measure that stands for most probable number. MPN is equivalent to colony forming units ("CFU").

The Pueblo of Isleta's most stringent surface water quality standard for E. coli bacteria is 88 MPN/100 ml at all times and at all flow rates.

By Order of the Governor, the Rio Grande is closed for fishing. The reason for closure is for the safety of our community. We have been blessed with a good spring runoff. Be aware that bacteria concentrations in the Rio Grande typically spike or rise to unsafe levels following storm events and high water levels in tributaries upstream. Please watch signage at the NM 147 bridge. Governor will lift the closure order when the Rio Grande is safe.

Notes regarding surface water quality sampling:

On September 30, 2022 one sampling event was conducted to measure the concentration of pesticides and herbicides at 4 sample locations: the drain near NM 45 and Interstate 25, Atrisco Riverside Drain, NM 147 and the Albuquerque Riverside Drain near the Northern Boundary. All results were non-detect.

Irrigation waters on the west side were shut off around March 22, 2023 for flushing.

# FIREWORKS NOTIFICATION

The intent and purpose of this information is to protect the peace, safety, property, health and general welfare of the members of the Pueblo of Isleta. Currently the pueblo is experiencing some drought conditions, hotter than normal weather with increasing weather advisories.

## **Items Prohibited:**

All Fireworks within the rangelands, Bosque, and Mountain areas (East, West Range, and River).

Detonation or ignition of Fireworks from a moving or stationary vehicle. Sale of Fireworks within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo.

All Fireworks expelling 10 feet into the air or higher.

## Permitted devices

Ground and hand-held sparkling and smoke devices;

Cone fountains;

Crackling devices:

Cylindrical fountains;

Flitter sparklers;

Ground spinners;

Illuminating torches;

Toy smoke devices;

Wheels;

Firecrackers.

**Reminder,** a parent or guardian shall supervise all persons under the age of 16. All persons using fireworks of any kind shall be liable for any personal injury or any loss of property resulting from the use of fireworks.

**Reminder;** fireworks may be discharged within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo of Isleta Reservation between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.; with the exception of the actual holiday, when hours are extended until 12:00 midnight.

**Reminder,** pursuant to the Tribal Council Resolution the Isleta Police Department shall have the authority to issue citations imposing civil fines of \$300.00 per violation and confiscate all fireworks in possession.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

**PROBATES** need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

**CLASSIFIED ADS:** The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture June be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

# Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

# Who Is Eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs:
- Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program or School Breakfast Program, including at U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community Eligibility Provision schools.
- SNAP
- Medicaid
- Federal Housing Assistance, including:
- Housing Choice Voucher (HCV)
   Program (Section 8 Vouchers)
- Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)/ Section 202/ Section 811
- Public Housing
- Affordable Housing Programs for American Indians, Alaska Natives or Native Hawaiians
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- WIC
- Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits

# PNM - Proposed BF Tap Line Project

Project Location: Tribal Road 30, Chical

Under the National Environmental Policy Act, the Pueblo of Isleta is given an opportunity to identify any comments, concerns, and suggestions our community might have regarding Public Service New Mexico's (PNM's) Proposed BF Tap Line Project. The proposed project is a rebuild of the existing BF Tap Line. Currently, the electric power line is capable of carrying 46-kV and is constructed with wooden monopoles within a 10-foot-wide easement.



Due to the aging of pole structures and the need to increase carrying capacity, the rebuild would be a 115-kV line with weathered steel poles. The new structures would be approximately 89 feet aboveground (existing structures are approximately 56 feet aboveground) within a 50-foot-wide, 0.9-mile-long right-of-way, totaling a maximum 5.3 acres of disturbance. The new line would be constructed 5 to 10 feet from the existing line

The existing distribution line will have minor outages during the reconstruction of the transmission line. All affected households will be provided prior notice. Segments of Tribal Road 30 may be closed; however, all residents will have access. The existing line would be kept in-service until the new line is constructed to prevent outages for the community.

Construction and operation vehicles would access the proposed project area via existing roads. Construction is scheduled to begin in October 2023, and the construction period would be approximately 1 month. Construction activity will take place only during daylight hours

# Public Notice: Proposed Administrative Order issued to Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority for Clean Water Act Violations

Publish Date: June 9, 2023

## Summary

In line with the Pueblo of Isleta's request, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency filed an Administrative Complaint against the Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority (Respondent) relating to the July 2022 sewage spill. The EPA identified three permit violations by the Water Utility Authority and has proposed assessing Class II Civil Penalties of \$281,357

The Pueblo of Isleta is submitting comment on the EPA's administrative action. Additionally, the Pueblo of Isleta is seeking to intervene in the administrative action so that it is treated as a party, rather than as an interested member of the public.

However, the public is also entitled to comment on the EPA's Administrative Complaint and on how the July 2022 sewage spill impacted them, their families, and their businesses.

- (F) Continuing Education: Special interest classes, i.e., career development, etc.
- (G) Adult Education Special Programs: Department of Education hosted programs to include CNM Ingenuity and UNM-VC concurrent courses/classes.

Motivation and success are what drive individuals....in the school setting, it is critically important that we celebrate and recognize the outstanding things that students accomplish, both inside and outside of their school building. Watching students grow and accomplish their goals is one of the main reasons most go into education, including ourselves. The recognition of students fosters strong relationships among students, families, faculty, and the community and helps create a positive school culture where students feel valued. Therefore, by highlighting the students monthly helps our community to do the same thing. This month we are featuring Juan Jojola and Kyle Valdez.

### Juan Jojola 11th Grade at Los Lunas High School



Juan is a Junior this coming school year. He is the oldest child of three. His parents are Lorraine Garcia and Juan Jojola, Sr. He enjoys hunting, fishing, weightlifting, and driving around with friends in his free time.

He enjoys listening to music. Depending on his mood, it sets the genre for the type of music he is listening to. We joked about how we like (Lah fa) Spanish music and how we cannot speak Spanish but can sing the heck out of Spanish songs as if we were Al Hurricane or Selena. Juan does have a great sense of humor to go along with his big smile. He works at the Starlight Movie Theater in Los Lunas. He gets to see all the new movies, eat free popcorn and enjoy all the Icee drinks he wants. Juan has played football since he was in middle school. It was during that time that he recognized that he needed to have good grades in order to play sports.

Juan is a straight A student with a 4.0 GPA. Currently he is ranked #15 out of 336 students in his junior class. He has lettered in academics twice. When asked how he has been able to attain this achievement, he spoke highly of his parents and family support from his stepfather and godfather. His parents have always encouraged Juan to succeed. His mother spoke about defining clear expectations for their children such as getting no letter grade lower than a B. Juan stated that knowing what is expected of him in school and knowing that his parents are there to help develop a correction plan to improve grades that are low has helped him work harder. Juan said he fears getting an F in any subject but his parents consistently check on his grades through the Parent Portal app to make sure they on top of his academics. His mom reminded him of how very proud she is of him.

He noted that he does not have a favorite class or subject area but said that math is a subject that comes easy and naturally to him. His advice to fellow classmates is to always study. Juan stated that he gets nervous before taking tests. He thinks it is due to overthinking the test, but knowing that he has studied helps. His advice to other students is that if he can do it, so can you. Always study. Do not get sad if you fail. Think positively because you never know the outcome of a situation.

### Kyle Valdez 11th Grade at Los Lunas High School



Kyle is a Junior at Los Lunas High School this year. He is the son of Michael "Buzzy" and Michelle "Shelly" Valdez. He is 17 years old and plays football and

baseball for Los Lunas High School. In addition to playing sports, he has a part-time job at Isleta Golf Course. Some of his interests include hunting, fishing, playing golf, or anything sports related. His peers would describe him as the party planner. He likes to plan events and make sure everything is ready. Others would describe him as the "Rock" of the group or a good listener.

Here are some of thoughts about being a student. He has found that he has taken an interest to writing. During the beginning of his English class last year he was introduced to bell work in which he had to do some free writing. Instead of it being work, he found it was something he enjoyed.

Some of his favorite classes include math and chemistry. He talked about his teacher, Mr. Strickland and him not only teaching the subject of chemistry but also making the learning fun and engaging. He did lots of hands-on projects and walking the students through the process of experiments and projects. He was nice and worked with the students to make the in depth information

understandable. He also recognized his English teacher Ms. Baldanado as a good teacher and making his English class fun and where he found his enjoyment in writing. He does not have any classes that he does not enjoy but math, chemistry, and English are among his favorites.

Some of his accomplishments include earning a letter for sports and a bar. Because he enjoys playing sports for high school also means that he has to maintain a 2.0 GPA or higher with no F's. Some of his advice for fellow students is to pay attention in class to learn what is being taught and study. He stated that keeping good grades is hard. He constantly checks Power School. His challenge he sees for himself is trying not to fail a class and keeping on top of work. He has had a few close calls but managed to pass. Knowing that G1 and G2 grades matter significantly, especially if he has to remain eligible for sports. As a heads up, try to get all your work and projects done before school breaks. Not only do you want a break from school but your teachers do as well. They probably do not want to be grading last work over break. Try not to overthink things. That causes him to put pressure on himself. Self-talk helps to get through the pressure.

Lastly, if he could change one thing about himself it would be to change his laziness. When asked why, he stated because he can easily fall behind on tasks and projects or not want to do anything. He recognizes that it is changeable but making the change is the factor.

## WELCOME TO SUMMER!



The summer season officially arrived June 21, 2023 and officially ends September 23, 2023. We have already experienced some rather high temperatures even

before this. Heat emergencies have already been seen in the Pueblo, so the Isleta Police Department would like to remind everyone to take extra measures to avoid unnecessary exposure to the sun and heat. It is particularly important to check on the elders ensuring their home environments are not excessively hot, they are able to stay cool and hydrated. The National Institute of Aging published:



Too much heat is not safe for anyone. It is even riskier if you are older or have health problems. It is important to be cautious and get relief quickly when you are overheated. Otherwise, you might start to feel sick or risk a heat-related illness that could cause serious health issues.

Why can extreme weather be even more dangerous for older adults than for younger people? Hotter days can cause difficulty in the body's ability to regulate its temperature. This can be challenging for older adults who typically do not adjust as well as others to sudden temperature changes. Additionally, older adults are more likely to have chronic medical conditions that affect the body's response to temperature, and to take prescription medicines that alter the body's ability to control temperature or sweat.

- Heat syncope is a sudden dizziness that can happen when you are active in hot weather. If you take a heart medication called a beta blocker or are not acclimated to hot weather, you are even more likely to feel faint. Rest in a cool place, put your legs up, and drink water to make the dizzy feeling go away.
- Heat cramps are the painful tightening or spasms of muscles in your stomach, arms, or legs. Cramps can result from hard work or intense exercise. Though your body temperature and pulse usually stay normal during heat cramps, your skin may feel moist and cool. Stop the physical activity you're doing and rest in the shade or in a cool building. Drink plenty of fluids, such as water and sports drinks containing electrolytes. Do not consume alcohol or caffeinated beverages.
- Heat edema is a swelling in your ankles and feet when you get hot. Put your legs up to help reduce swelling. If that doesn't work fairly quickly, check with your doctor.
- Heat rash is a skin irritation from heavy sweating. It causes red clusters of small blisters that look similar to pimples

on the skin. Your skin may feel itchy or you may feel "prickly" tingling pain. Keep the infected area dry, use powder to sooth the rash, and stay in cool areas.

- Heat exhaustion is a warning that your body can no longer keep itself cool. You might feel thirsty, dizzy, weak, uncoordinated, and nauseated. You may sweat a lot. Your body temperature may stay normal, but your skin may feel cold and clammy. Some people with heat exhaustion have a rapid pulse. Rest in a cool place and get plenty of fluids. If you don't feel better soon, get medical care. Be cautious because heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke.
- Heat stroke is a medical emergency in which the body's temperature rises above 104°F. Signs of heat stroke are fainting; confusion or acting strangely; not sweating even when it's hot; dry, flushed skin; strong, rapid pulse; or a slow, weak pulse. When a person has any of these symptoms, they should seek medical help right away and immediately move to a cooler place, such as under shade or indoors. They should also take action to lower their body temperature with cool clothes, a cool bath or shower, and fans.
- Sun exposure, also known as sunburn, is a sign of skin damage due to extreme or long exposure. Your skin may appear red and tender, develop blisters, start to peel, and be warm to the touch. Severe reactions may cause fever, chills, nausea, or rash. Prevent sunburn by wearing protective clothing that covers your skin and staying out of direct sunlight. Using a broad spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher can also help prevent sunburns, but be sure to reapply often. If you are sunburned, wear lightweight clothing, take cool showers, moisturize affected areas, and stay out of the sun so your skin can heal.

# What raises the risk of heat-related illnesses for older adults?

Older adults are at higher risk for heatrelated illnesses and death. Factors that put older adults at greater risk may include:

- Health problems such as cardiovascular, <u>lung</u>, or <u>kidney disease</u>
- <u>Changes in skin</u> caused by normal aging
- Any illness that causes weakness or results in a fever
- Taking drugs such as diuretics, sedatives, tranquilizers, and some heart and <u>high blood pressure</u> medicines that may make it harder for the body to cool itself
- Being on several prescription drugs at the same time
- Having obesity, overweight, ounderweight
- Drinking alcoholic beverages
- Living in places without air conditioning or fans
- Becoming dehydrated

# TIPS TO STAY SAFE IN HOT WEATHER

• Drink plenty of liquids, such as water, fruit or vegetable juices, or drinks that contain electrolytes. Avoid alcohol and caffeinated



beverages. If your doctor has told you to limit your liquids, ask what you should do when it is very hot.

- If you live in a home without air conditioning or fans, try to keep your space as cool as possible. Limit use of the oven; keep shades, blinds, or curtains closed during the hottest part of the day; and open windows at night.
- If your living space is hot, try to spend time during midday in a place that has air conditioning. For example, go to the shopping mall, movies, library, senior center, or a friend's home. You may also contact your local health department or city to find out if they have air-conditioned shelters in your area.
- If you need help getting to a cooler place, ask a friend or relative. Some religious groups, senior centers, and Area Agencies on Aging provide this service. Search the Eldercare Locator to find services in your area. You could also consider taking a taxi or other car service or calling your local government to see if they offer senior transportation. Don't stand outside in the heat waiting for a bus.
- Dress for the weather. Wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing. Natural fabrics such as cotton may feel cooler than synthetic fibers.
- Avoid outdoor exercising and other physical activity when it is very hot. Instead, try to find someplace you can be active while staying cool indoors.
- If you must go outside, try to limit your time out and avoid crowded places. Plan trips during non-rush-hour times.
- Make sure to use a broad spectrum sunscreen, SPF 15 or higher, and reapply it throughout the day, especially if your skin will have continuous exposure to the sun. Wear a hat and other protective clothing, and sunglasses. If you do get sunburned, stay out of the sun until your skin is healed and use cool cloths and moisturizers to treat the affected area.
- Ask your doctor if any of your medications make you more likely to become overheated or sunburned.

# Key points to remember about hot weather safety

Older people can have a tougher time dealing with heat and humidity. The temperature inside or outside does not have to be high to put them at risk for a heat-related illness. Headache, confusion, dizziness, or nausea could be a sign of a heat-related illness. Go to the doctor or to an emergency room to find out if you need treatment.

To keep heat-related illnesses from becoming a dangerous heat stroke, remember to:

- Get out of the sun and into a cool, ideally air-conditioned place.
- Drink fluids but avoid alcohol and caffeine.
- Shower, bathe, or sponge off with cool water.
- Lie down and rest

Heat is equally dangerous for children and this is a reminder for drivers –

# A few facts from the National Highway Safety Traffic Administration (NHTSA)

### HEATSTROKE FACTS

The majority of hot car deaths — 53% — happen because someone forgets a child in a car. You may be asking yourself: How does this happen? Families who lost a loved one thought the same thing at one point, but then the tragedy happened to them. Hot car deaths don't just occur in the summer heat. On average, the first vehicular heatstroke of the year happens in March, according to Jan Null, who has been tracking such deaths since 1998. Among the trends he discovered over the years:

About 46% of the time when a child was forgotten, the caregiver meant to drop the child off at a daycare or preschool.

Thursdays and Fridays — the end of the workweek — have had the highest deaths. More than half of the deaths (54%) are children under 2 years old.

### See a Child Alone in a Vehicle?

If you see a child alone in a vehicle, make sure the child is okay and responsive. If not, call 911 immediately.

If the child appears to be okay, attempt to locate the parents; if at a public place, have the facility page the car owner over an intercom system.

If the child is not responsive and appears to be in distress, attempt to get into the car to assist the child—even if that means breaking a window. Many states have "Good Samaritan" laws that protect people from lawsuits for getting involved to help a person in an emergency.

Remember: Kids and hot cars can be a deadly combination. Don't take the chance. Always check the front and back seat of the vehicle before locking the door and walking away. Help spread the word on social media, #HeatstrokeKills #CheckTheBackSeat.

Family pets are just exactly that "family" to their owners and leaving them in a vehicle can have serious and even deadly results. The temperature in a vehicle rises quickly even with the windows rolled down. So rather than take your pet along for a ride to run an errand and leave them in the car when you reach your destination, it is far better to leave them at home where they are much safer.

## Bus Route 208 (No Fares until further notice!)

Bus Route 208 connects the Pueblo of Isleta and Valencia County communities to the Alvarado Transportation Center (ATC) in Downtown Albuquerque during the morning/midday when the Rail Runner does not operate. Route 208 features three northbound trips arriving at the ATC at 9:30am, 11:00am and 1:30pm, and three southbound trips departing the ATC at 9:35am,

11:05am and 1:32pm. At the ATC, riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes.

Route 208 serves two bus stops on the Pueblo of Isleta. The stop closest to the



village proper is located on NM 147 just east of the Rio Grande Bridge. Please do not park and leave vehicles unattended on the adjoining roads near this stop, as the bus and other vehicles use these roads to turnaround and access other locations. Route 208 also stops at the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station, where riders can transfer to the Isleta Resort and Casino shuttle. Because the bus serves the station, riders can also consider using Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque in the mid-morning and returning by train in the evening.

## Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride (No Fares until further notice!)

The Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride operates Monday through Friday from 8:15am to 2:45pm, providing trips within the Pueblo and to the ABQ RIDE Route 53 bus stop on NM 314. Service to places like Smiths, Albertsons and Wal-Mart in Los Lunas is also provided with requests made before noon at least one business day prior to your trip.


Request your Dial-a-Ride trip by calling Valencia County dispatch at (505) 352-3595 before noon at least one business day prior to your trip. Requests

# Health Beat: Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs)

What are STIs?

Sexually transmitted infections (STIs), sometimes called sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), are infections passed from one person to another during sexual contact (oral, anal, or vaginal sex or genital skin-to-skin contact). STIs can also be passed from a mother to baby, during pregnancy, when giving birth, or when breastfeeding. Some STIs can also be spread by sharing needles. There are more than 20 STIs including gonorrhea, chlamydia, genital herpes, trichamonaisis, HIV, syphilis, and hepatitis. Many STIs don't have any symptoms and the only way to know for sure if you have an STI is to get tested.

Who should be tested for STIs?

- If you are sexually active, you should get tested for sexually transmitted infections.
- If you are in a monogamous relationship (only having sex with one person who is only having sex with you), get tested at least once in your life.
- If you are having sex with multiple partners, get tested each time you have a new partner, and keep testing regularly (every 3-12 months).
- If you are pregnant, you should get tested for sexually transmitted infections. This helps to protect you and baby.
- If you use IV drugs and share needles, you should get tested for HIV, syphilis, and hepatitis at least once per year.

How can you prevent STIs? You can help to protect yourself by:


- Using condoms or dental dams when having sex,
- Talking openly with your partner(s) about sex, STIs, and STI testing,
- You and your partner(s) getting tested BEFORE having sex without a condom or dental dam,
- Talking openly with your doctor about your sexual history and STI testing,
- Asking your doctor if PrEP (a medicine that helps to prevent HIV infection) is right for you.

What STI testing is available at Isleta Health Center? If you are not having any symptoms and want to get screened for STIs, you can schedule an STI screening test without having to see a doctor first. Call 869-4385 and ask to schedule an STI screening test in the lab.

If you are having symptoms of an STI (pain with peeing; discharge or bleeding from penis, vagina, or anus; genital itching; blisters, sores, or warts on genitals or anus) we recommend that you are seen in clinic by a doctor. Call 869-4385 at 8:00am to schedule a same-day appointment.

STI testing and treatment is also offered at clinics throughout the state. Visit https://gettested.cdc.gov/to find other testing and treatment locations.

## ISLETA ELDER CENTER - ADULT DAY CARE SERVICES


It is common knowledge that elder care is one of the fastest-growing areas in the healthcare industry, with a demand that skyrocketed in the last five years. And the country will continue to see an increasing demand for elder care services in the coming years due to a rapidly growing elder population.

The elderly population is in dire need of facilities providing elder care services. In the past, elders and their families would have preferred traditional nursing homes or community-based alternatives. The needs of the elder population are dynamic. There is an increased need for home- and community-based elder care providers that can provide elders with adult day services whenever the primary caregiver is not available.

Fortunately, located here in Isleta is the POI Adult Day Care Center which provides participants a full day of services Monday through Friday. Services such as meals, basic health care and health assessments, assistance with appointments and activities of daily living (ADL). The Adult Day Care Center also provides transportation, care coordination as well as therapeutic, recreational and socialization activities. In a nutshell, it is a comfortable place where our elders spend the day participating in health-seeking activities, while their caregivers are at work, running errands, or enjoying a well-deserved rest and relaxation. It is a compassionate and safe environment for the elders and is considered a home away from home for some elders.


