Governor's Report

Maguwam,

I want to continue to wish the entire community a nice safe and healthy month as we approach into June! We would like to remind the community to continue to practice the safety protocols and continuing to keep our COVID numbers low.

Thank you to everyone who attended our 2nd Community Meeting held at the casino. We are eager to say our departments and directors are working hard to secure funding for our continued projects. We anticipate to holding another community meeting in August, but we will provide more information as we get closer.

We would like to Congratulate ALL our graduates, "The Class of 2023!" We are very proud of you all and your accomplishments.

I would like to take this time to invite the community to our Governor's Feast on Saturday, June 17, 2023. Mass is scheduled for 8am, and the procession to follow with tribal activities. We would like to extend this invitation to our tribal vendors. If you will like to be a vendor at the feast, you must come to the Governor's office to fill out an application.

As we continue with the renovations of the little leagues fields. The Little League Chical field on Tribal Road 10 is making progress with the field lights and are set to be running in 2 weeks. We are excited to move onto the little league fields next to the recreation center. We ask you are careful around these areas as the facilities are undergoing these improvements.

We are aware of the current situation with the increase of the mosquitos in the surrounding areas. The pueblo does intend to provide mosquito control in the parks and recreation areas only beginning in June. Keep in mind there is not a possibility we are able to kill all mosquitos, we do ask you continue to utilize insect repellant. Please use repellant and keep in mind that mosquitos harbor in weeds around homes.

Moonlight Drive Extension Project: The tribe has selected the necessary approvals to have the project under construction within the May-June 2023 timeframe. The

project will involve the extension of existing Moonlight Drive to a new intersection of Moonlight Drive with NM314. This project includes two roundabouts, curb & gutter, sidewalk, a multiuse trail asphalt surfacing, waterline, sewer lines, storm drain and arroyo stabilization. The project will be new roadway construction and therefore should not have any traffic impacts. We ask that when construction starts, please avoid driving, biking, walking and jogging in the area under construction for your safety and the safety of the construction workers.

Currently, the Bosque is closed until further notice due to the high water flows from snowmelt run-off. Roadways are closed and barriers will be in place for the safety of the tribal community. Thank you for your cooperation and will update you with more information as it is provided.

Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during the month of May.

ADMINISTRATION

State & Federal Funding Update The Governor and Council have been actively engaging the State and Federal government for increased funding to Isleta for infrastructure, education, law enforcement, and natural resources management.

In February, Governor Zuni met with Governor Lujan Grisham to discuss funding for restoration work to the Village Proper, which would include renovations to housing and other existing facilities, as well as infrastructure improvement. Governor Lujan Grisham was supportive of the project and expressed an interest in funding a broader program for "Main Street" renovations across all Tribal and Pueblo land in New Mexico.

Governor Zuni also met with U.S. Congressman Vasquez in February to discuss the ongoing trespass by Kirtland Air Force Base of unexploded ordnance and other military debris across Pueblo lands. Congressman Vasquez recently announced his sponsorship of a \$1 million

federal budget earmark for Isleta's wildfire as those ultimately sponsored by the NM management program.

In May, Governor Zuni and President Lente met with U.S. Senator Heinrich to discuss unexploded ordnance, education and Tiwa language, the restorative work needed within the Village Proper, and water infrastructure. Senator Heinrich has announced his sponsorship of nearly \$4 million in federal budget earmarks for the Village Restoration Project, Chical water main improvements, after-school programming by the Isleta Department of Education, and wildfire management.

Although neither Governor Zuni nor the Council have yet had the opportunity to meet with U.S. Senator Luján this term, Senator Luján has agreed to sponsor \$8.3 million in a federal budget earmarks for Isleta.

The chart below, which was also distributed at the May 21st Community Meeting, provides the funding requests made by Isleta for federal Fiscal Year 2024, as well Congressional Delegation.

Note that even though 10 of Isleta's budget requests are now sponsored, federal funding is not yet guaranteed. The U.S. Senate and House will now debate the federal budget as a whole, including the earmarks sponsored by individual Senators and Congressman. Isleta is in a relatively strong position, as Senator Heinrich is a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, which drafts the budget. However, the Republican Caucus - which now controls the U.S. House - is hostile toward all federal budget earmarks.

While U.S. President Biden has publicly stated that he will not agree to Republican demands for budget cuts, he may relent to such demands during the presently ongoing debt ceiling negotiations. Because the federal fiscal year operates from October to September, any earmarks approved by Congress for Isleta in this budget round will begin to be administered in October of this year.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for July Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, June 21, 2023 at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to <u>Nathaniel.Lujan@</u> <u>isletapueblo.com</u>. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo. com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture June be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

ISLETA TRIBAL COURT PEACEMAKING PROGRAM



The Tribal Court Peacemaking Program was established by the Isleta Tribal Council on June 11, 2020 (Resolution No. 2020-028)

What is PEACEMAKING?

Peacemaking is a voluntary and confidential process in which a qualified peacemaker helps parties communicate to resolve problems between them. Peacemakers are trained to guide participants through the resolution process; they help the parties come up with agreements by listening to all points-of-view, clarifying issues and interests, and facilitating open and honest discussion. Peacemakers do not take sides; and have no personal interest in the outcome of the process.

What happens in PEACEMAKING?

Peacemaker will describe the process and ask each party for a commitment to participate. Each party is invited to discuss their perspective on the situation and what they hope to achieve through peacemaking. The peacemaker helps parties identify specific issues as they explore possibilities for settling differences. Parties then negotiate which ideas for resolution are mutually acceptable and satisfy the needs of all parties. A written agreement ends the session. The written agreement signed by all parties is taken before the court for approval.

What are the qualifications of a PEACEMAKER?

A peacemaker must have high ethical standards and demonstrate leadership qualities. A peacemaker should be a good listener and able to communicate and understand various positions of parties in peacemaking sessions. Knowledge of cultural values and law is a plus, but not required.

Benefits of PEACEMAKING:

Fair, Neutral and Confidential: Peacemaking is a voluntary process; it provides a neutral, respectful and confidential setting where both parties can openly discuss their views on the dispute. Parties have an equal say in the process.

Allows the Parties to Determine the Solution: Parties decide settlement terms, not the peacemaker. The peacemaker assists the participants in reaching a voluntary, mutually acceptable resolution. There is no determination of guilt or innocence. No legal arguments are made. No judges or spokespersons are allowed.

LOS ANGELES, CA – Los Angeles County Assessor Jeff Prang has named Ted Olguin as his new Chief of Staff of the Assessor's Communications and Public Affairs team.

An enrolled tribal member of the Pueblo of Isleta Native-American community in New Mexico, Ted is the highest ranking Native American in the Assessor's Office. As Chief of Staff of the Communications and Public Affairs Unit, Ted will be responsible for a wide range of duties that includes public education, media, legislative analysis and advocacy, internal and external communications, and community outreach. He will oversee a staff of 13, including field deputies, special assistants and administrative staff and the implementation of Assessor Prang's vision of providing excellent quality service to the public, in large measure by way of an aggressive educational outreach program.

"Ted is uniquely qualified to lead our efforts in the public affairs arena," said Assessor Prang. "Internal and external communications have changed significantly over the years with a variety of multi-media platforms now available, along with conventional outlets. Ted has the unique ability to navigate this constantly changing modern world of public affairs. He's a welcomed addition to the Executive Team."

Olguin is a an alumnus of the Southern California Coro Fellow in Public Affairs program, one of the nation's premier fellowships equipping emerging leaders with skills, knowledge, and networks to collaborate and drive innovative solutions. It provides a graduate-level, experiential, cross-sector leadership training program that prepares aspiring leaders for effective & ethical leadership in the public affairs arena.

Anyone involved with a dispute can file a Request for Peacemaking at the Tribal Court. Cases in the Tribal Court can be transferred to the Peacemaking Program. All parties involved must agree to Peacemaking. Please contact the Tribal Court if you have any questions, or refer to the Peacemaking Program Rules posted on the Tribal Court webpage (listed under "Resourceful Links").

Assessor Jeff Prang was first elected in 2014 and has been re-elected in 2018 and 2022. He runs the largest assessment office of its kind in the nation, employing nearly 1,400 people with an annual budget near \$200 million. Opportunity for Public Comment

PNM – Proposed BF Tap Line Project

Project Location: Tribal Road 30, Chical

Under the National Environmental Policy Act, the Pueblo of Isleta is given an opportunity to identify any comments, concerns, and suggestions our community might have regarding Public Service New Mexico's (PNM's) Proposed BF Tap Line Project. The proposed project is a rebuild of the existing BF Tap Line. Currently, the electric power line is capable of carrying 46-kV and is constructed with wooden monopoles within a 10-foot-wide easement.



Due to the aging of pole structures and the need to increase carrying capacity, the rebuild would be a 115-kV line with weathered steel poles.

The new structures would be approximately 89 feet aboveground (existing structures are approximately 56 feet aboveground) within a 50-foot-wide, 0.9-mile-long right-of-way, totaling a maximum 5.3 acres of disturbance. The new line would be constructed 5 to 10

The existing distribution line will have minor outages during the reconstruction of the transmission line. All affected households will be provided prior notice. Segments of Tribal Road 30 may be closed; however, all residents will have access. The existing line would be kept in-service until the new line is constructed to prevent outages for the community.

Construction and operation vehicles would access the proposed project area via existing roads. Construction is scheduled to begin in October 2023, and the construction period would be approximately 1 month. Construction activity will take place only during daylight hours.

A vicinity map and Biological Evaluation prepared by SWCA Environmental Consultants are available at Governor's Office or Environment Department located at 3929 Highway 47.



Recent radon monitoring conducted in late April/mid-May 2023 inside the St. Augustine Church continues to show radon levels well below the EPA recommended radon action level of 4.0 pCi/L with averages also below the WHO recommended radon action level of 2.7 pCi/L. Each radon monitor was set out for a total of 7 days which continuously collected radon levels as seen in the above line chart. As a reminder, the average radon levels used to be around 19.5 pCi/L inside the Church. Now, average levels are around 2.2 pCi/L and have remained low since appropriate changes were made to allow high air flow inside the building. The Pueblo of Isleta Environment Department will continue to monitor radon levels periodically to ensure the HVAC system is working properly to keep radon levels low.

Lowering radon levels and improving the indoor air quality inside the Church is a major success and we would like to thank Public Works and Design & Construction Department for their help in solving this issue. For more information about radon, please call Environment Department at 505-869-9814.

What to do if you find a used needle outdoors

People, especially children, must never touch or pick up needles found on the ground. Discarded needles can be harmful. Needles or



hypodermic needles are also known as syringes or sharps.

Cleaning up discarded needles must be done carefully to protect human health and the environment.

If a used or discarded needle is found on Isleta tribal land, please call Isleta Police Dispatch at 869-3030 to report

the location so that a qualified tribal employee can safely collect and dispose of the discarded needle.

Individuals who use needles for insulin shots or other medical uses are expected to dispose of their used needles appropriately in sharps containers that individuals have to purchase themselves.

An exclamation mark within a triangular border is the international symbol for caution. Always exercise caution if you see a discarded needle.

"MPN" is a unit of measure that stands for most probable number. MPN is equivalent to colony forming units ("CFU").

The Pueblo of Isleta's most stringent surface water quality standard for E. coli bacteria is 88 MPN/100 ml at all times and at all flow rates.

By Order of the Governor, the Rio Grande is closed for fishing. The reason for closure is for the safety of our community. We have been blessed with a good spring runoff. Be aware that bacteria concentrations in the Rio Grande typically spike or rise to unsafe levels following storm events and high water levels in tributaries upstream. Please watch signage at the NM 147 bridge. Governor will lift the closure order when the Rio Grande is safe.

Notes regarding surface water quality sampling:

On September 30, 2022 one sampling event was conducted to measure the concentration of pesticides and herbicides at 4 sample locations: the drain near NM 45 and Interstate 25, Atrisco Riverside Drain, NM 147 and the Albuquergue Riverside Drain near the Northern Boundary. All results were non-detect.

Irrigation waters on the west side were shut off around March 22, 2023 for flushing.







We moved to a new location! We are now located at the Tribal Service Complex in the space formerly known as the Wellness Center.

UPCOMING PROJECTS

The Public Works Department will be busy with new projects the next few months and through the year, we ask you to please be careful when traveling in these areas and watch out for the construction crew and equipment.

• Eastside Drinking Water Infrastructure (MAP: Isleta Pueblo Water System)

o Well drilling should be underway by mid-June for two new drinking water wells to be constructed, but it will take time to complete the drilling of each well.

o The Pueblo is also working with PNM to bring 3-Phase electrical service to each of the well sites.


o Currently the Eastside water system is provided water produced only by the two Casino wells. This puts a strain on the two wells and the Arsenic treatment facility. With the hot summer months quickly approaching, water usage will continue to increase. Please remember to turn off the water once you are done watering your gardens and don't over-water them. Check your home for any leaking fixtures, especially the toilet as a "stuck" flapper valve will waste a lot of water in a short period of time. Excessive water leaks will also overwhelm your septic system, potentially saturating the leach field.


• Eastside Sewer Collection Systems (MAP: Eastside Sewer Collection System)

o All residences and buildings on the Eastside of the Rio Grande and South of the Tribal Complex, to the Bosque Farms and Peralta reservation lines will be connected to a sewage collection system

o The sewage collection lines will connect to the existing Eastside treatment facility, which has enough capacity to handle the expected sewage. Preliminary design includes an E-1 pump system to be installed at each building, with piping connecting the E-1 unit to the main collection line; lift stations as needed to pump the sewage to the treatment facility, abandonment of existing septic systems at each residence and electrical upgrades as necessary.

- o Public meeting will be held in June to give an update on this project
 - Keep a look out for the time and place to be announced
 - All East Side Residents are highly encouraged to attend
 - This will be the time to express your concerns and any comments before we meet with the engineering firm
- Westside Wastewater Treatment Plant





o Project is to expand the existing plant to handle an additional 200,000 gallons of flow per day at the Westside Wastewater Treatment Plant, located on TR100.

o Review of proposals submitted by engineering firms is underway.


• Los Padillas Tank and Well Construction

o Construction will be started for a new well that will be drilled near TR 82 and Hwy 314, with a future elevated 200,000-gallon water storage tank to be constructed on the same property.

o The elevated water storage tank will provide consistent water pressures throughout the area, which is a much needed improvement.

o Once the well and elevated tank are completed, the old well located on TR 90 will be properly abandoned.

o The Public Works Utility crew installed a new 6" water main line along the western shoulder of Highway 314, South of TR 90, to TR 82.



 Westside Water Line Replacement 2 (MAP: Westside Waterline Replacement -2)

o This project will replace existing 2" and 4" water main lines with new 6" water main lines, fire hydrants, and valves along these roads. Residences will be connected to the new water lines and the old main lines will be abandoned.

o Planning and design work has been completed and a due date for construction bids to be submitted has been set for mid-June 2023.



Introduction

Sacraments are powerful signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, through which Divine Life is given. There are seven Sacraments: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Reconciliation, anointing of the Sick, Matrimony and Holy Orders. Sacraments are classified as Christian Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist). Sacraments of Healing, (Reconciliation and the Anointing of the Sick), and Sacraments of Commitment (Matrimony and Holy Orders).

According to the Second Vatican Council "The purpose of the Sacraments is to sanctify men, to build up the body of Christ, and finally to give worship to God. The Seven Sacraments are God's gift to us. They allow us to grow closer to him and to deepen our faith and commitment to the Church.

The Sacraments are actions of our Catholic faith, which take place in a local community, which would be a Mission or Parish. In the celebration of the Sacraments, we find our faith strengthened, and the hand of salvation is extended to faithful believers. The Church has been called by God to extend God's loving touch to all his people in need.

As the first of three Sacraments of Initiation – **Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.**

Baptism serves as the gate way to all the other Sacraments. It enables one to be born anew in Christ and grants us each a share in his divine life. Our Lord declared: "Unless a man be born again of water and the Holy Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God" (John 3:3)

Baptism makes us sharers in the life of God as members of the Church, the Body of Christ.

Baptism of Children requires special care and understanding since a child does not know what is happening at Baptism. They will need to learn the teachings of Jesus and the Catholic Church. The Parents and Godparents make a serious promise to the child to be the teachers of the child in faith. The best teachers are those who **PRACTICE** what they teach. The daily living of the faith always involves honesty about truly living the teachings of Jesus and the Catholic Church.

Baptismal Policy

Baptisms at St. Augustine Parish are celebrated on the third Sunday of each month. Please note – *Baptisms are not held during Lent*. Baptisms are scheduled two months after the parents meet with the priest, and all baptismal registration forms are submitted. Parish office hours are 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

One responsibility of the Church leaders in our Parish is to help people see the relationships that are implied in the celebration of the **Sacraments**, and to help them strengthen those ties.

Because of this, we offer the present policy regarding infant Baptism:

a) If you are a registered member of St. Augustine Parish, and one who is sincere and active in the practice of the faith, you are eligible to have your infant baptized here. Parents are asked to meet with the priest to discuss steps to have their child baptized. Registration forms will be given to the parents after meeting with the priest. We ask that you attend Mass during the months leading up to the baptism, and also after the baptismal day.

b) If you are not yet registered and you want your infant baptized into Christ, please make known your intention to be an active participant of St. Augustine by registering as a parish member. Take a few months to accustom yourself to our parish and find your place here.

c) Letter of Permission. Parents from other parishes who wish to have their infants baptized at St. Augustine are welcome to do so after we receive a letter from the pastor of their home parish giving permission for the baptism to be celebrated at St. Augustine Parish.



First Communion

d) Choose Godparents. A Godparent must be a practicing adult Catholic, have received the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, & First Communion), and be able to fulfill the responsibility of exemplifying a Catholic way of life by living in full harmony with the Catholic faith (*Cf. Code of Canon Law, 874*). Two Godparents are required, one male and one female. No more than two are permitted. It is also prohibited to have two male or two female godparents.

e) Attend **Baptismal Instruction (required for both Parents and Godparents)** before the Baptism ceremony can take place. Baptismal Instructions are the specific preparation for infant baptism in our parish. Everyone who participates in this program stands to gain something. Almost all participants in the process discover that they have something important to give.

f) A Baptismal Fee of \$15.00 per child (Parishioners) or \$30.00 per child (Non-Parishioner) covers the cost of certificates, candles and other supplies provided for the baptism.





See your eye doctor regularly!

First and most important, it is recommended that you have your eyes examined by an optometrist or ophthalmologist at least once per year. You will be screened for eye diseases such as glaucoma or macular degeneration. If these are identified early, you can work with your eye doctor to preserve your vision for many years to come.

Maintain a healthy lifestyle!

Conditions such as Diabetes and High Blood Pressure can affect your eyes. It is very important to work with your Primary Care Doctor to maintain healthy blood sugar and blood pressure. A healthy lifestyle not only helps the body, but also helps the eyes.

Use the right eye drops!

Dryness of the eyes is very common with age. It is recommended that you use eye drops for lubrication, also known as "artificial tears". Wear Sunglasses!



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Health Beat: A Focus on Alzheimer's Disease Dr. Hadley Pope Phone: 505-869-3200

What is Alzheimer's Disease?

Alzheimer's Disease (AD) is a type of brain disease that affects memory, thinking, and reasoning skills. AD primarily affects people who are older than 65 years of age. There is no cure for AD but there are some treatments, particularly at the early stages of the disease. Early diagnosis can also help patients and families get connected to resources and support. Some changes in memory happen to everyone as they age, however, memory loss that affects daily life and functioning is not a typical part of aging. If you are concerned about memory issues in yourself or a family member, make an appointment with your doctor.

10 Early Signs and Symptoms of Alzheimer's Adapted from Alzheimer's Association (alz.org)

1. Memory loss that disrupts daily life: forgetting events, repeating yourself or frequently relying on more aids to help you remember (like sticky notes or reminders).

2. Challenges in planning or solving problems: having trouble paying bills or cooking recipes you have used for years.

3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home or at work: having problems with cooking, driving places, using a cell phone, or shopping.

4. Confusion with time or place: having trouble understanding an event that is happening later, or losing track of dates.

5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relations: having more difficulty with balance or judging distance, tripping over things at home, or spilling or dropping things more often.

6. New problems with words in speaking or writing: having trouble following or joining a conversation or struggling to find a word you are looking for (saying "that thing on your wrist that tells time" instead of "watch").

7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps: placing car keys in the washer or dryer or not being able to retrace steps to find something.

8. Decreased or poor judgment: being a victim of a scam, not managing money well, paying less attention to hygiene, or having trouble taking care of a pet.

B'EEH-K'OO-EE WELLNESS CENTER Treatment for an Alcohol or Drug addiction

Addiction is defined as a chronic, relapsing disorder characterized by compulsive drug seeking and use despite adverse consequences.

The health risks associated with drinking and/or drugging are not limited to the following:

• Serious injuries, which can be caused by vehicle crashes, burns, falls, and even drownings.

• Physical violence often occurs as a result of drinking, and can end up in homicide, suicide, assault, and spousal or partner abuse.

• Sexual behavior that poses risk. HIV/AIDs and many other diseases have been passed along through risky sexual behavior.

• Heart disease, liver disease, and numerous digestive problems result from drinking.

• All types of social problems result from abusive drinking.



Inpatient Treatment/Residential Treatment Centers (RTC)

What is Inpatient/Residential Treatment?

Individuals living at the treatment center receiving around the clock care, education and participating in extracurricular activities while learning. At residential treatment centers, individuals are able to access a higher level of care with individual, family, or group therapy provided. Residential treatment centers are available to both men and women, or women with children, residential treatment centers accommodate people of all ages and stays can range from 90 days to 1 yr. and beyond. RTC provide safe, effective, evidence based care, for individuals who have experienced negative consequences from issues related to Drugs and/or alcohol related issues.

Outpatient Treatment (IOP)

Individuals work on their recovery while living at home and still receive counseling through a treatment center. B'eeh-K'oo-ee Wellness Center offers IOP "The Ripple Effect" Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 4:30pm to 7:30pm.

What is Detoxing?

Detoxing generally refers to the period during which someone who has a chemical addiction goes through chemical withdrawal. During this period, the addictive substance is still exiting the addicted person's body. Some individuals may need assistance with a medically assisted detox.

Medical detox

Medical detox refers to ridding the body of toxic addictive substances under the supervision of a team of licensed medical professionals. This team is usually headed by a physician and consists of nurses, clinical staff and therapists. Some facilities utilize advanced practice staff like nurse practitioners or physician assistants to deliver medical care during detoxification.


Medication Assisted Treatment

Medication-assisted treatment (MAT) is the use of medications paired with counseling, behavioral therapies and/or mutual aid meetings (AA,NA) which is effective in the treatment of Alcohol misuse, opioid use disorders (OUD) and can help some people to sustain recovery. Vivitrol is used for Alcohol and Opiate addiction, it blocks opiate receptors and does not contain opiates in this medication. It is a once a month injection that helps treat the cravings of alcohol and opiates. Naltrexone (pill form of Vivitrol) is the generic name for Vivitrol. These medications work best when paired with counseling and support groups (AA, NA).

Facts For VIVITROL


- •Blocks opiate receptors, no opiate in medicine
- Can be used for both alcohol and opiates • Once monthly injection
- Works best in combination with therapy and support agencies AA, NA

•This treatment is recommended for at least 6 months to a year

WITHDRAWAL

What does having withdrawals mean?

A term used to describe the physical and mental symptoms that a person has when they suddenly stop or cut back the use of an addictive substance, such as opiates and opioids, nicotine products, or alcohol. Withdrawing from alcohol on one's own can be very dangerous and even deadly. Withdrawal symptoms usually subside on their own, but when the symptoms are severe, withdrawal may require medical treatment. Helping Your Adult Family Member Who Has an Addiction

Although you may be tempted to rescue, bribe, pamper, scold, or threaten your adult family member who continues to use and abuse alcohol and/or drugs, this is not a helpful approach.

Families share experience, strength, and hope at Al-non meetings. These meetings teach you how to stop "enabling". The word enabling means "allowing, permitting, or aiding" the alcoholic/addict to stay in their sickness and enabling keeps you, the family, trapped in the problem. Enabling can make you physically and emotionally sick and cause increased stress with you and your home environment. Addiction is not something that affects just the alcoholic/addict but has a negative impact on the entire family and the community.

No one wants their adult family member to suffer with an addiction and your intentions to help are out of love and concern. When enabling turns into an intervention, things begin to change. It is time to take your focus off the adult family member's addiction and place it onto yourself and your family. You regain power to make meaningful choices about what you will do and what you won't do. Enabling does not teach responsibility.



ISLETA HEALTH CENTER ANNOUNCEMENT

On April 27, 2023, Isleta Health Center achieved accreditation by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care (AAAHC). Accreditation distinguishes the Health Center from other outpatient facilities by an independent external process of evaluation.
