In the month of February, we have been super busy as myself, Lt. Jiron and Lt. Abeita attended the 2024 American Indian Day at the State Capitol. I was honored to provide the invocation and some brief remarks to kick off the day's events.

As we continue to stay busy thru the month, we have met with state officials during the New Mexico legislative session. I successfully advocated for Isleta Department of Education summer youth programming and secured funding from Representative Harry Garcia to provide cultural and educational programming for the next two summers. I met with Governor Lujan Grisham and she supported my request for funding to begin design of the historic Pueblo of Isleta Main Street Restoration and for additional vehicles for the Rec Center. We appreciate the support of Representative Garcia and Governor Lujan Grisham.


Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during the month of February.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for April Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, March 20, 2024, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to <u>Nathaniel.Lujan@</u> <u>isletapueblo.com</u>. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo. com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

Selected works will be displayed for 6-9 months, afterwards the items will be returned to owners and a new set of community artwork will be displayed. If artist is not selected, they may be put on a waitlist to be displayed at a later time.

Notification to artist: Cultural staff will contact artist based on the artist's preferred method of contact.

Sales: POICC is looking to display community Artwork "On Loan" at this time. Any artwork for sale will be handled by the Artist, not POICC.



Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who Is Eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the <u>Federal Poverty Guidelines</u>, or if a member of the household meets at least *one* of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs:
 Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program or School Breakfast Program, including at U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community

Eligibility Provision schools.

- •Medicaid
- Federal Housing Assistance, including:
 - Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program (Section 8 Vouchers)
 - Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)/ Section 202/ Section 811
 - □ Public Housing
 - Affordable Housing Programs for American Indians, Alaska Natives or Native Hawaiians
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- WIC

I hope this memo finds you and your families doing well and staying safe. The Census office is located in the village proper north of the Governor's office. Our address is 123 Tribal Road 40, Isleta, NM 87022. Hours of operation are Monday- Friday 8:00am to 4:30pm.

Address Updates:

Please make sure to update your address each time you move so our office has the most current information on file. We have noticed a lot of address issues within the Census and Treasury department during the past distributions. Our office is the main source that other departments use to verify information. You may also call our office to verify your information regularly to avoid any issues.

New Address update policy:

Address Change

a) Tribal members are responsible for maintaining a current address with the Tribal Census/Enrollment Department.

b) Acceptable documentation of a change of address shall include at least two (2) of the following:

1. A valid, state issued driver's license or government-issued identification card listing the new address.

2. A current utility bill with the requester's name and address listed on the statement. Eligible utilities bills shall include propane bills.

3. Current insurance card or bill showing the requestor's name and address.

4. Current real property rental agreement or purchase agreement showing the requestor's name and address.

5. State Medical or Public Assistance with requestor's name and address on card, letter from issuing agency showing requestor's name and address, or profile print out from issuing agency showing the same.

6. Bank or credit card statement not more than 60 days old.

7. Employment pay stub containing requestor's name and address.

8. Documentation from an education institution such as a transcript, report card, or enrollment information.

9. A notarized change of address authorization.

Tribal Identification Cards:

Tribal Identification cards will be issued every Tuesday and Thursday by appointment. Any lost or stolen ID's will have a replacement fee of \$20.00, money order only. Made payable to the Pueblo of Isleta. Please note a limit of $\underline{1}$ replacement ID will be issued per year.

Reminder** ALL TRIBAL IDENTIFICATION CARDS HAVE AN EXPIRATION DATE OF FIVE (5) YEARS.

**ALL REQUIRED DOCUMENTS MUST BE ON FILE WITH THE TRIBAL ENROLLMENT/CENSUS OFFICE PRIOR TO RECEIVING A TRIBAL IDENTIFICATION CARD. **

Birth and Certificates:

The Census office cannot make or accept copies of state birth certificates, it is illegal to alter, copy or counterfeit birth certificates.

Once the death certificate has been approved and registered with the NM State Vital Office, an Authorization form must be signed and notarized at the Census/Tribal Enrollment Department giving Director or Enrollment Clerk authorization to obtain Death Certificate on behalf of the family.

All Certified Death Certificate copies are \$5.00 each with cash, check or money order payable to: NM Vital Records Office. P.O. Box 25767 Albuquerque, NM 87125

Minor IIM accounts:

Our office assists any minor who is now of age to request to withdraw their Individual Indian Money (IIM) account. Forms are available here in our office. Also, address updates can be updated here at the census office for any IIM account.

If your name, or someone you know, name is on the list below please call or come to the Census office for assistance. Residence Ordinance:

Any non-tribal member wishing to reside on the reservation must have a residence ordinance application on file. Applications are available for pick up only at our office. This ordinance is being enforced by Governor's and IPD, please make sure your application is up-to-date. Due to delays in background checks, this application can take up to 6 weeks or longer to complete. Note: only one nontribal member can be sponsored by enrolled tribal member (over the age of 18) per household. Any minor non-tribal members do not need an application. Please verify with our office the status of your application or any concerns you may have.

State of NM Birth Certificates may be obtained through the Census/Tribal Enrollment Department. We will continue to make monthly visits to New Mexico Vital Statistics on behalf of tribal members. An Authorization form must be signed and notarized at the Census/Tribal Enrollment Department giving Director or Enrollment Clerk authorization to obtain Birth Certificate on behalf of Tribal Member. The cost for each certified certificate is \$10.00 each with cash, check or money order payable to: NM Vital Records Office. P.O. Box 25767 Albuquerque, NM 87125

Death Certificates:

There have been many questions regarding the death certificate process. As a reminder, the Pueblo of Isleta, Census/Tribal Enrollment Department will kindly assist family members in the completion of death certificates of all Tribal Members. Paperwork needs to be completed by the family before starting the process on the state system. Paperwork can be picked up at the Census office.

With winter almost over and spring is blooming so starts the beginning of another fire season. As we begin smelling smoke, the Isleta Pueblo Fire Department, and all Pueblo partners want to remind Community members and visitors of the important role that fire plays in our community.

The fire department's goal is to become a fire-wise and fire-safe community. In order to accomplish this mission, the Isleta Pueblo Fire Department is in the process of establishing a community-wide fire patrol and Burn assistance program. This patrol and assistance is designed to assist the members of the community in the planning and execution of controlled burns of agricultural and cultural areas.

Over the past several years we have had an increase in agricultural burns. Currently the Pueblo of Isleta has issued over 180 burn permits, which are required for a controlled burn. To obtain a burn permit you will need to go by the Department of Natural Resources Office at 3929 Highway 47, you can call the DNR office at 505-869-9817 with any questions. On the day of your burn, you will need to call Isleta Dispatch at 505-869-3030 to advise of your location and a good contact number of who is doing the burning.

The Isleta Fire Department does assist the community in the burning of fields and ditches if requested. All you need to do is contact the fire department for assistance. The fire department will assist in the pre-planning of any proposed burns. We will also assist in the establishment of a sustainable water source for the burn in the event the property is not located within a reasonable response area of available water.

We wish to assist the community members by having a pre-planned fire wise, fire safe prescribed burn process that will mitigate any losses of property to the community members and help decrease any fees or fines in the event the fire gets out of control.

The Pueblo of Isleta fire department is comprised of 9 Volunteers, 1 Fire Chief and 6 full time firefighters. The full time firefighters are on duty Saturday thru Friday 8:00am to 6:00pm. Our Volunteers assist when they are available, usually nights and weekends. All firefighters have attended the appropriate Wildland Firefighter training. All firefighters are required under the National Wild Fire Coordinating Group and the Southern Pueblos Agency to follow proper guidelines for wildland firefighting and maintain the proper certification and personal protective equipment required.

My name is Lloyd Padilla, my mother is from the Navajo Nation, my late father was part Isleta and Laguna Pueblo. I was raised primarily Navajo. My late grandfather was Ricardo Padilla, WW2 Veteran raised here in Isleta.

I have a background in Education, completed my Bachelor's degree in Native American Studies with a Minor in Psychology and currently working towards my Master's degree in Academic counseling. I taught at the Santa Fe Indian School and also worked at the Native American Community Academy in Albuquerque, NM. During my time at SFIS, I coached the High School and Middle School Cross Country boys/girls teams where our varsity girls won the 2022 State Title.

I want to support Isleta youth in *pursuing their goals and help guide them in following their dreams*. Thank you for welcoming me into this new position and I am honored to serve in this role.

During the Los Lunas In-Service day, the department took a group of students to visit Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute (SIPI) and Central New Mexico Community College (CNM). Students were able to tour both campus' and ask questions about each school. One of the highlights at SIPI was that they have their own optometry teaching facilities where students learn how to do eye exams, as well as make eye lenses for glasses.





The highlight at CNM was their School of Skilled Trades & Arts (STA) program, which consist of:

- Aviation Maintenance
- Technology
- Carpentry and Construction
- Diesel Equipment Technology
- Electrical Trades
- Heating, Ventilating, Air
- Conditioning and Refrigeration
- Industrial Technology (Mechatronics)

Students met with a student and professor in the Diesel Equipment Technology where they were able see hands on demonstrations on what all goes into the program. Both site visits were a success and we hope that in the future more students will join us on these learning opportunities.

Highschool Visit

The Spring semester has certainly been a dynamic one. This semester has been marked with a range of activities and initiatives aimed to support student understanding and to enhance student learning. One initiative included a visit by our tribal leadership on January 24th to all the three Los Lunas Public School district high schools which are Los Lunas High School, Century High School, and Valencia High School.

The leadership was able to listen to students' experiences at school. This included the benefits and challenges. Students expressed that academic work, social expectations, and athletic endeavors weigh heavily in their minds. Mental health quickly became the common concern among students. Some highlights were that students enjoy many of their teachers and felt supported by them. In addition, most students expressed their enjoyment for Tiwa classes and wish they had more Tiwa related activities within their academics. It appears that students felt this could create a stronger sense of belonging within the school community. The DoE encouraged Los Lunas staff to allow students to incorporate their identity in their projects. Both students and tribal leaders thoroughly enjoyed the visit. Tribal leaders were also able to have a





SUMMER BRIDGE PROGRAMS

Most Colleges and Universities offer "Summer Bridge Programs". This allows incoming college freshmen to get a jumpstart on their first year and refresh their skills in Math, English and Reading over the summer. Students also have the opportunity to experience life as a college freshman and learn "what to expect" when the semester starts. During this time students have the opportunity to seek out resources, ask questions and get introduced

discussion with Los Lunas Public School Superintendent, Dr. Kettler. Tribal leaders heavily focused the Pueblo's task of language preservation. Attendance, academic success and funding were also topics of discussion - Los Lunas administration expressed that they would support the Pueblo with this daunting task of improving outcomes for students. The Governors and Council expressed that they would love to continue hearing from both students and Los Lunas School administration. Tribal leadership felt this ongoing dialogue was necessary to the success of Isleta students. Additional visits have been planned.



Middle School Visits

This Spring semester has also been filled with trips to visit the middle school students. On February 6th and 7th, we visited with students from Los Lunas Middle School and Valencia Middle School respectively. During these visits we were able to bring over 400 books to students. Students were able to choose as many books as they wanted. With a little luck and a little search every student was able find a book. We hope that this helps create a love of reading within Isleta students. We enjoy these visits with students and look forward to many more.




Elementary Visits



Call for Applicants:

The Tribal Council is soliciting letters of interest from individuals interested in serving on the **Pueblo of Isleta Housing Authority Board of Commissioners (1 position) and The Pueblo of Isleta Tribal Enrollment Committee (1 position).**

Any persons interested in serving on the Board/ Committee are requested to submit a letter of interest, including a resume/vital to the Tribal Council Office. Applications will be accepted until the vacancies are filled.

Qualifications for Pueblo of Isleta Housing Authority Board of Commissioners are:

1) Each Commissioner shall possess communication skills, experience, and expertise necessary to carry out the duties of a Commissioner, and to contribute to the ability of the TDHE to achieve the purposes for which the TDHE was established.

2) Each Commissioner shall possess at least two years' experience in housing development, design, management, construction/modernization, business management, personnel, tribal governance, accounting, financing, or housing inspections, or, in the alternative, he or she shall possess, at a minimum, an Associate's or Bachelor's Degree in one of the following areas: Business, Health, Political Science, Building Trades, Human Services, or Social Services.

3) Prior to appointment to the Board, each prospective Commissioner shall submit to a background investigation and a drug screen. The prospective Commissioner shall pay for such background investigation and drug screen, but, upon the TDHE's receipt of satisfactory results, shall be reimbursed for all such costs.

4) Commissioners shall be Enrolled Members.

5) Commissioners shall not be employees of the TDHE.

6) When nominated and appointed, Commissioners shall not be past due on any payment owed to the TDHE or its predecessor entity.

7) Criminal Background.

a) Conviction of any crime requiring listing on a Sex Offender Registry site, whether tribal, state, or federal, shall result in a finding of ineligibility until such time as the individual is no longer required to register. Conviction of domestic violence or other Crime of Violence involving the use, attempted use, or threatened use of physical force against a Person or property; or any offense related to conversion of property or that would tend to reflect their ability to manage finances shall result in a finding of ineligibility

of the individual as a Commissioner for a period of five years from conviction, or release from probation, incarceration, or parole, whichever is later.

b) If, while in office, a Commissioner is charged with the commission of one or more of such offenses under this section, he or she shall be immediately suspended from the Board and shall remain suspended until such time as the offense or offenses for which the Commissioner was charged is or are resolved. If the Commissioner is convicted of the offense or offenses charged, his or her appointment to the Board shall be terminated immediately.

The Season of Assessments

What type of standardized test does my child take?

• **ACCESS** Students in English language learner (ELL) program take the ACCESS for ELLs language proficiency test in February. The test measures academic English language proficiency for students learning English in our school and throughout our state.

• **BIE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS** (ELA) & **BIE MATH** All students in grades 3-6 take the BIE ELA and BIE Math tests during the Spring. These computer-based tests measure academic proficiency in English language arts and mathematics.

• **BIE SCIENCE** This computer-based test is only administered to students in grades 5 during the Spring and measures academic proficiency in science.

• **BIE ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT** This assessment is designed for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. The decision for a student to be administered the alternate assessment is left to the discretion of the individualized education program (IEP) team.

Why is it important for my child to participate?

Teachers in our school use this information to help them make decisions about instruction for your child. Teachers also use these test scores to monitor the progress your child makes toward proficiency of the state standards. It helps students, parents, and teachers understand the student's level of performance and areas for improvement.

Can I get a copy of my child's test results?

Yes! NWEA MAP assessments reports are available after each testing period (fall, winter, spring). All other test reports are not available until June 2024. We will plan to distribute these reports at the start of the SY24-25 school year. We also maintain a copy of these reports in your child's records.

What can my child do to prepare?

Students can prepare by getting a good night's rest the night before the test day, arrive to school on time, eat breakfast, and do their best.

Since Truancy focuses on attendance and ensuring the school policies are followed by our students and parents, below is information from the Los Lunas Public Schools Handbook:

- All students between the ages of 5 and 18 must attend school daily.
- What is chronic absenteeism?

o Chronic absenteeism is when a student misses 10% or more of the school year for any reason, excused or unexcused.

• A school approved extracurricular activity is when a student is not in school or class as a result of participation in a schoolsponsored sanctioned event, practice, competition, or contest. Students are permitted fifteen (15) school approved extracurricular events per semester. states the following:


A. Any person who without justification or excuse, fails to send or deliver a child under his or her care and supervision to school is guilty of a failure to send a child to school.

B. Any person found guilty of failing to send a child to school is guilty of a Class E Misdemeanor. Each day of school missed shall be considered a separate offense.

The Truancy department has been sending notification letters to our students that have multiple unexcused absences in accordance to the Truancy Department's <u>Steps of Enforcement</u>. Once parents receive these notification letters, please contact our department so that we can work with you to address any concerns or questions regarding your child's attendance to school. Keep in mind that we are here to work together to avoid negative outcomes, as we want to see positive results from our Isleta students attending school regularly and pursuing their future goals.

Puebloof Isleta Veterans Association (POIVA) - Commander Fred R. Lujan

As you drive north or south on Highway 314, you have noticed the construction project at the Pueblo of Isleta Veterans Association Center, to the west end of the smaller buildings. This is the maintenance/storage facility. This building has been under construction for over a two year period, but is now near completion. All that is needed now is here and there electrical connections. The major issue of the longevity of construction was due to the slow availability of construction supplies, some due to COVID. This building will house the tractor and implements that will be used for cultivating the four acres at the POIVA property.

POIVA would like to increase its membership, especially with younger Veterans, to conduct color guard and funeral details. Annually, we have had elections for new officers in January, but we have postponed 2024 elections, hoping that there will be new Veterans who will join the POIVA and vie for one of the officer positions. Due to the lack of new members, the POIVA has had the same officers year after year. Below is the list officers and duties. The only qualification for being an officer is a commitment to helping veterans.

<u>Pueblo of Isleta Veterans Association</u> <u>Duties of Officers</u>

Commander - It shall be the duty of the Commander to preside at all meetings of the Association and to have general supervision over the business and affairs of the Association, and such officer shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Association.

Vice-Commander - The Vice-Commander shall assume and discharge the duties of the office of Commander in the absence or disability of, as when called upon by the Commander.

Adjutant - The Adjutant shall have charge of and keep a full and correct record of all proceedings of all meetings, keep such records under the direction of the Commander, and handle all correspondence of the Association.

Finance Officer - The Finance Officer shall have charge of all finances and see that they are solely deposited in some local bank and shall report once a month to the Association the condition of the finances. The Finance Officer shall sign all checks disbursing the monies.

Chaplains - The Chaplain shall be charged with the spiritual welfare of the Association and will offer divine but nonsectarian service in the event of dedications, funerals, and public functions and adhere to ceremonial rituals as recommended from time to time.


News

There are no substitutes for blood, platelets or plasma—they cannot be manufactured. Patients in need of blood or blood products must rely on donations from people like you. Those who are hesitant about donating blood for the first time often find that the donation process is easy and that saving lives is deeply gratifying.

One donation can save multiple lives. Here are the facts:

- Just one donation can save up to 3 lives.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is 3 pints (or three whole-blood donations).
- More than **1 million** people every year are diagnosed with cancer for the first time. Many of them will need blood— sometimes daily during chemotherapy.
- More than 38,000 blood donations are needed every day.
- Type O-negative whole blood can be transfused to people with any blood type, but this type of blood is rare, and supplies of it are low.
- Type AB plasma can be transfused to patients with all other blood types, but it is also in short supply.

WIC **Diabetes Awareness**

THERE ARE 2 TYPES OF DIABETES

Type 1-known as juvenile or insulin dependent diabetes. The exact cause is unknown but the body's immune system attacks the insulin producing cells in the pancreas which are needed to process glucose in our body. Insulin is required to treat this type.

Type 2- cells in the muscle, liver and fat become resistant to insulin which is needed to transport sugars into cells of the body, this causes a raise in blood sugar levels. There are four stages to this type. They are insulin resistance, pre-diabetes, type 2 diabetes and type 2 diabetes with vascular complications. The condition develops over time and most people with diabetes have this type. Factors such as weight and genes are contributing factors.

SYMPTOMS

The symptoms include: being overly thirsty and using the restroom frequently; blurry vision; tingling in the hands and feet; wounds that are slow to heal; and, weight loss without trying.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Diabetes can be managed through diet and drugs such as Insulin and Metformin. A care team needs to be established with a primary care doctor, endocrinologist and dietitian. Lifestyle changes such as weight loss, healthy eating and exercise benefit an individual and manage symptoms.

Women's History month celebrates the overlooked contributions of women to society. The event initially started as Women's History week. In 1987 it became a month's long celebration.



Patient Education: Understanding the Referral Process

Welcome to the Isleta Health Center (IHC) Purchase Referred Care (PRC) Department.

Your health and well-being are our top priorities. To ensure you receive the specialized treatment and diagnostics you need, it's important to understand the referral process from start to finish. Here is a step-by-step guide to help you navigate through it.

Step 1: Generating Referrals

Referrals are initiated by IHC providers when specialized treatment or diagnostics are needed. This is the first step in accessing the care you require outside of our primary services. Referrals can also be generated by an outside provider, but keep in mind, you are responsible for calling PRC with the appointment day, time, facility and reasoning.

Step 2: Insurance Information

It is crucial that IHC has your current insurance information on file. IHC is your payor of last resort, requiring you to use your primary insurance first or provide a denial letter from CMS if you do not qualify for Medicaid.

- Sign Up for Insurance: You can sign up onsite or through www.yes.state. nm.us.
- Onsite Benefits Coordinator: Make an appointment with our onsite Benefits Coordinator for assistance at (505)869-4469

The premise that Indians are guaranteed health care from our treaties *as long as the water flows and the grass grows* is, unfortunately not that simple. Indians ARE required to apply for alternate

resources per 42 CFR 136.61 – Payor of Last Resort. While some treaties mention health care, the Indian Health Service is not an entitlement program, and therefore funding for PRC is not guaranteed by the Federal government. AR allows PRC funds to be conserved, thereby providing health care for more Indian beneficiaries. The Isleta Health Center receives its PRC funding from Indian Health Service, and must comply with the mutually agreed-to agreement which includes 42 CFR 136.61.

Step 3: Referral Generation

Once your insurance details are in order, the PRC will generate a referral for the specialized care you need. It is also important to make sure your address and phone number are up to date at Patient Registration. This helps PRC in scheduling appointments/and or facilities contacting you with important appointment information.

Step 4: Scheduling Appointments

If you have questions regarding the scheduling of your appointment, contact the PRC. Please note that you may be required to schedule your own appointment at the hospital or clinic. You can obtain a hardcopy of your referral onsite by request. Please keep in mind that you are <u>required to call</u> <u>PRC of all scheduled appointments</u>, including follow-ups, procedures, tele-med and in-person visits

Step 5: Attending Your Appointment

When attending your appointment:

- Provide your insurance information.
- Indicate that IHC is the payor of last resort.

• Let provider know you have a referral (either by fax or picked up by patient)

Step 6: Handling Bills

Should you receive any bills:

• Bring them to IHC immediately. Do not wait until they go into collections, as processing payments requires time.

Emergency Care:

If you attend emergency care, inform the PRC of your visit within 72 hours. Leaving voicemails is acceptable, please provide:

Name

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- Date of Birth
- The date you were seen at the facility
- Name of Facility you were seen at
- Reason for the visit
- Transportation method (self/ ambulance ie: Isleta/AMR/Albuqueque)
- Any follow up appointments

It is essential to inform the hospital of both your primary insurance and IHC as your last payer. Failure to inform IHC of your emergency or urgent care visit means we cannot search for your claims for payment.

PRC Referral Coverage: Please remember, PRC referral coverage is not an entitlement. It is funding allocated for referred care or emergencies. Compliance with federal rules regarding the payment of claims and bills is mandatory to remain in compliance. The only way to ensure compliance is for patients to follow the required pathways for payment.





March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. This is a month to spread awareness of this disease in which cells in the colon or rectum grow out of control. The colon is the large intestine/bowel and the rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus. Abnormal growths, called polyps, sometimes grow in this area. Over time, they can turn into cancer, which is why it is important to get screened to find and remove the polyps before they become cancer, or, if cancer has already formed, it is important to catch it early, as treatment works best in the early stages of cancer.



Are you at risk to get Colorectal Cancer? There are some risk factors

that make it more likely for you to get colorectal cancer that you cannot do anything about, such as: • Age (as you age the risk increases)

- Inflammatory bowel disease such as Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis.
- A personal or family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps.
- A genetic syndrome such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP), external icon or hereditary nonpolyposis colorectal cancer (Lynch syndrome).

However, there are also some lifestyle factors that put you more at risk for this disease and these lifestyle factors you can change, to bring down your risk. These factors are:

RISK: Eat a diet low in fruit & veggies. WHAT TO DO: Eat more Fruits and Vegetables.



Are you worried a loved one might be at risk for suicide? Don't hesitate to call 988, a 24/7 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. You can call if there's a mental health crisis, if you're worried about someone else, if you need help navigating a difficult situation, or just had a bad day. If there is an urgent crisis, it's always still ok to call 911.

There is no way to know if a loved one will follow through with threats of suicide, and we should always take threats seriously. If you are hearing of suicidal thoughts or seeing concerning behaviors, these may be calls for help.

Warning signs might include unsafe behaviors, saying things like "I wish I wasn't here anymore," or someone not acting like themselves. If you see any concerning behaviors, you should approach them and offer support. You can also always help your loved one stay safe by removing lethal weapons and associated items (gun, ammunition, knives, medications, rope, etc.) from the home and making sure these items are locked away.

There are other suicidal warning signs like leaving a note, giving away personal items, risky behaviors with substances, isolation and withdrawal, mental health distress, or struggling to cope with a difficult situation. People ages 10-34 are at higher risk of suicide (CDC, Facts about Suicide, 2022).

You can also encourage your loved one to seek counseling treatment services at Isleta Health Center B'eeh-K'oo-ee Wellness Center (BKWC) 505-869-5475. A counselor can help them explore strategies for managing crisis situations and develop coping skills. It may take time for your loved one to develop these skills and see a change in behavior and mood. For some, behaviors that can help mood might include listening to music, dancing, journaling, getting routine sleep,

RISK: A low-fiber, high-fat diet, high in processed meats.	WHAT TO DO: Eat a low-fat, high fiber diet and stay away from processed meats.
RISK: Overweight and obesity.	WHAT TO DO: Get active and eat healthier.
RISK: Alcohol consumption.	WHAT TO DO: Limit your alcohol consumption. Contact Isleta B'eeh K'ooee Wellness Center to help (505-869- 5475).
RISK: Use commercial tobacco user.	WHAT TO DO: Quit commercial tobacco use. Contact Isleta Health Center Health Educator, Stephanie Barela, to help you quit (505-869-4479).

Many cancers affect both men and women and of these cancers colorectal cancer is the <u>3rd leading</u> <u>cancer killer</u> in the United States, according to the American Cancer Society. The sad thing is, <u>it does</u> <u>not have to be</u>, because as mentioned above, there is a screening you can get to catch the abnormal growths, known as, polyps, before they become cancer. According to the CDC, about nine out of every 10 people whose colorectal cancers are found early and treated appropriately are still alive five years later. This is why it is so important to get screened!

The exciting new news is that that recently the US Preventive Services Taskforce began recommending screening for colorectal cancer in adults aged 45 to 75 years. Previously it was age 50-75, which is great to hear because the earlier you catch it the better. So, if you are 45 years old or older, **get screened now**. If you think you may be at increased risk for colorectal cancer, speak with your provider about when to begin screening, which test is right for you, and how often to get tested.

eating well, praying, and engaging in traditional spirituality. Scheduling regular family time can also improve communication around emotions and create a greater sense of safety and support.

For many of us, it can be difficult to talk about suicide and suicidal thoughts with people we care about. But if you talk about it, you could help them get the care they need.

We use Medicine Wheel & 12 Steps Teaching Videos, Talking Circles and Mind Mapping to work through and heal those things that often lead us to alcohol and/or drug use, abuse, or dependence. Having the group sit in a circle and take the time to connect with each other forms one great mind that creates solutions and ideas that will be far more useful than the results of only one person thinking alone. 

Did you know you have to call PRC to inform them of all appointments?


This includes all ER/urgent care visits, any follows ups, any secondary referrals, telemed appointments, rescheduled appointments. Not calling in for appointments will delay payment

Did you know if you receive a bill from a provider, you have to bring it in to PRC, even if you have a referral?



ISLETA SOCIAL SERVICES INFORMATION ON TRAUMA BONDS

Trauma bonds are created during abuse and they create powerful emotions that are difficult to change. A family going through trauma may feel very close knit because of what they have endured as a family unit, even when one member is causing the pain.

Trauma bonds can be caused by being in an unhealthy relationship with an unhealed person. Trauma bonds help your partner feel in control. This is because there might have been past traumatic experiences that left a feeling of being broken or incomplete. Some examples are:

- Past physical abuse
- Past sexual abuse
- A particularly stressful event
- Alcohol or drug addiction without substance abuse treatment
- A family member that never showed them healthy relationships

Toxic relationships may be the only love they've known. It becomes like a drug addiction when their brain chemistry releasing feel-good chemicals every time they take control.

There are 7 stages of Trauma Bonding:

- 1. Love Bombing-
- 2. Trust and Dependency
- 3. Criticism and Doubt
- 4. Control and Domination
- 5. Tolerance of Abuse
- 6. Withdraw and Obsession
- 7. Trauma Bond

Children and Youth may NOT seek help.

Trauma bonds can be a barrier for victims or survivors to report violence and seek services. Survivors may feel fear, shame, self-blame, protective of the offender, loyalty or admiration towards the offender, and love towards the offender.

These negative bonds impact relationships inside and outside of the family and can lead to intense loyalty to an abuser, repeated abusive relationships, and the cycle of violence can continue beginning with teen dating violence.

You might struggle to reconcile the abuser's harmful behavior with the affection they sometimes show. This confusion and self-doubt are part of the trauma bond. Instead-their control can keep you in a trapped in an abusive relationship.

But—with the proper support and guidance, you can break free from the painful and confusing cycle of abuse. Freedom from an abusive partner involves recognizing the abuse and understanding the dynamics of trauma bonding. But it also means seeking professional help.

It is certainly a challenging journey, but it's important to remember that you are not alone and help is available. You have the strength and resilience to overcome this. Remember you deserve a life free from abuse.
