Governor's Report

Maguwam,

Spring has sprung and comes with it many outdoor activities, we hope everyone had a nice Easter.

Also coming with the spring season are the many fire dangers and the dangers around our water areas. The Rio Grande River will be running fast, as well as the irrigation canals, and therefore we are advising the children not be allowed to be around these areas without adult supervision.

I want to thank all of the neighboring fire departments and first responders who responded to the March 11 Fire. I would like to thank Fire Chief Gary and the Isleta firefighters for their work to put out the fire and their continued monitoring of the area. I would also like to thank the Southern Pueblos Agency, Valencia County Fire Department, Bosque Farms Fire Department, Bernalillo County Fire Department, NM State Forestry, and the Isleta Pueblo Department of Transportation for their rapid and coordinated response to the fire. Their collective efforts helped to contain the fire quickly and prevent it from spreading to nearby residences. Please remember to practice fire safety this irrigation season.

During the month of March, we learned that Senator Lujan and Representative Vasquez have officially secured \$900,000 in federal funding towards the Pueblo's Fire Protection Vehicle Acquisition Project. This funding will help support the Pueblo's Fire Department with the purchase of new fire apparatus.

At the tail end of February, Lieutenants Jiron and Abeita met with Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army Civil Works, Mr. Jaime Pinkham. Assistant Secretary Pinkham and Army Corps staff discussed critical projects located on the Pueblo and also toured the Pottery Mound site. On Friday, March 8th, I was privileged to meet with Second Gentleman, Douglas Emhoff, during his visit to New Mexico. He spoke with us on the federal efforts to improve infrastructure across the country and the state.

This month, I hosted Governor Lujan Grisham and Mr. Gene Sperling from the White House for a tour of the Village and St. Augustine Church to discuss the Pueblo's current infrastructure projects and the importance of preserving and renovating the Pueblo of Isleta Village Proper.


Remember to reserve the Reception Hall and Old Court House early for graduation parties. Both facilities are filling up fast!

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for May Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, April 17, 2024, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to <u>Nathaniel.Lujan@isletapueblo.com</u>. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.



Call for Applicants:

The Tribal Council is soliciting letters of interest from individuals interested in serving on the Pueblo of Isleta Housing Authority Board of Commissioners (1 position) and The Pueblo of Isleta Tribal Enrollment Committee (1 position).

Any persons interested in serving on the Board/ Committee are requested to submit a letter of interest, including a resume/vital to the Tribal Council Office. Applications will be accepted until the vacancies are filled.

Qualifications for Pueblo of Isleta Housing Authority Board of Commissioners are:

- Each Commissioner shall possess communication 1) skills, experience, and expertise necessary to carry out the duties of a Commissioner, and to contribute to the ability of the TDHE to achieve the purposes for which the TDHE was established.
- Each Commissioner shall possess at least two 2) vears' experience in housing development, design. management, construction/modernization, business management, personnel, tribal governance, accounting, financing, or housing inspections, or, in the alternative, he or she shall possess, at a minimum, an Associate's or Bachelor's Degree in one of the following areas: Business, Health, Political Science, Building Trades, Human Services, or Social Services.
- 3) Prior to appointment to the Board, each prospective Commissioner shall submit to a background investigation and a drug screen. The prospective Commissioner shall pay for such background investigation and drug screen, but, upon the TDHE's receipt of satisfactory results, shall be reimbursed for all such costs.
- Commissioners shall be Enrolled Members. 4)
- 5) Commissioners shall not be employees of the TDHE.
- When nominated and appointed, Commissioners shall not be past due on any payment owed to the TDHE or its predecessor entity.
- 7) Criminal Background.
 - Conviction of any crime requiring listing on a a) Sex Offender Registry site, whether tribal, state, or federal, shall result in a finding of ineligibility until such time as the individual is no longer required to register. Conviction of domestic violence or other Crime of Violence involving the use, attempted use, or threatened use of physical force against a Person or property; or any offense related to conversion of property or that would tend to reflect their ability to manage finances shall result in a finding of ineligibility of the individual as a Commissioner for a period of five years from conviction, or release from probation. incarceration, or parole, whichever is later.
 - b) If, while in office, a Commissioner is charged with the commission of one or more of such offenses under this section, he or she shall be immediately suspended from the Board and shall remain suspended until such time as the offense or offenses for which the Commissioner was charged is or are resolved. If the Commissioner is convicted of the offense or offenses charged, his or her appointment to the Board shall be terminated immediately.

Recycle Right Isleta! Here is some information on recycling correctly at home. It is important to keep your paper towels, plasticware and pizza boxes in your blue bin, dispose them in the trash. Empty and rinse . materials though keep water usage minimal. When bagging recyclables use clear bags only. Do not bag recyclables in colored trash bags. When recyclables are bagged in colored trash bags, they are not opened when they reach the recycling facility, the recycling workers assume the bags are trash and your material is with the material, it helps them to distinguish trash from recyclables. Use of colored bags and prohibited items in your blue bin will result in non-collection. Do not use recycling carts for trash. Using recycle carts

Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who Is Eligible for the Affordable Connectivity **Program?**

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least one of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs:
- Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program or School Breakfast Program, including at U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community Eligibility Provision schools.
- ·SNAP
- Medicaid • Federal Housing Assistance, including:
 - Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program (Section 8 Vouchers)
 - Project-Based Rental Assistance (PBRA)/ Section 202/ Section 811
 - **Public Housing**
 - Affordable Housing Programs for American Indians, Alaska Natives or Native Hawaiians
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

- Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits or Lifeline;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs and lives on **Qualifying Tribal lands**:
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
 - · Tribal TANF
 - Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
 - Tribal Head Start (income based)

From the Department of Education

The Department is continually inspired by the transformative power of learning. The month of March saw students explore various areas of this transformative learning. The Department found an opportunity to allow students to develop a love of learning. During the week of March 11-18 students from the Los Lunas Public School district found themselves on spring break. Seventeen students registered for this trip that was both fun and educational.

Monday - Sandia Mountain Range





Students hiked through the Elena Gallegos Open Space Park in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Students hiked the gently ascending trails that offered glimpses to the cityscape of Albuquerque. The natural beauty of the park surrounded students and filled them with a sense of awe and wonder. As we hiked the students enjoyed a symphony of gravel crunches and wind whistles. At the end of the hike each student experienced a moment of profound sense of gratitude for an opportunity to experience the natural splendor of New Mexico.

Tuesday - Wastewater Treatment Plant

Students embarked on an immersive and educational experience at the Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority. The students were able to gain valuable knowledge in the process of maintaining New Mexico's scarce natural resource: water. The tour allowed students to overview the facility's operations. First, the students learned about the history of water availability in Albuquerque. The tour showed that Albuquerque has historically maintained an overestimation of



how much water aquifers contained. The tour began with showing the journey that water takes after falling down the drain. As students toured the facility they were instantly greeted by the natural scent of grease and oil separating from sewage. Students later learned the facility simply adds air to the water allowing the water to naturally break down waste. At the end of the tour students journeyed to the Rio Grande. With the gentle murmur of the Rio Grande, students listened as the tour guide explained that the treated water is cleaner than when Albuquerque first receives it. He continued, stating that the Pueblo of Isleta for religious and cultural reasons requires that the water be clean. He believes that the Pueblo embodies the idea of community. The students were able to gain a deeper sense of community and water safety.

The Environmental Department would later inform students how water contamination impacts our community. The Environmental Department demonstrated that water contamination does not remain with the river but also with our ways of life. Students learned that the contamination can also contaminate crops. Students also learned that wildlife drinking the water can hold the contaminants within their bodies. The Environmental Department created a lasting impression of the importance of maintaining water within our tribal community. We appreciate our partnerships with the Pueblo of Isleta Environmental Department.

Wednesday - Botanical Gardens/Zoo

As the students stepped into the aquarium they were warmly welcomed with a world of vibrant colors in stark contrast to the polychrome gray of Albuquerque. The gentle sway of aquatic plants and graceful glide of fish created a serene atmosphere. Students





fixed their gaze on the lazy patrol of glowing jellyfish. Each exhibit offered a passing glimpse into the biodiversity of ocean life. The students left the aquarium with a sense of awe and appreciation of the beauty and complexity of the ocean.

Students journeyed to the botanical garden. The botanical offered a whimsical escape for students. The garden contained exhibits where students could explore gardening, music, and art design. The students thoroughly enjoyed the maze within the garden.

At the zoo students explored various ecosystems from the African savannah to bamboo ladled forests of Asia. Each enclosure gave students a glimpse of various ecosystems around the world. Students learned the location of the animals' natural habitat, diet, and conservation status.

For some exhibits students learned the cultural importance of some animals. The journey to the zoo enhanced student learning, discovery, and appreciation for the natural world.

Thursday - Isleta Eagle Golf Course & Computer Programming





The students had golf lessons at Isleta Eagle Golf Course. The students had lessons emphasizing the importance of grip, stance, and posture. Proper technique was demonstrated for the students. During their lesson students were able to explore the lush green fairways and rolling hills of the course. Some students even created sand art within the bunkers. As students progressed through their lesson they had gained new skills and confidence within the game of golf.

Later Sonja, tutor, introduced the students to the wonderful world of Ozobots. Ozobots are small, programmable robots designed to teach coding and robot concepts to students in a fun and interactive way. The students were amazed as the palm-sized robots followed colored lines drawn on graph paper. The students were able to create different paths with different colors and patterns that created various commands. The students enjoyed this engaging and educational tool.

Friday - State Roundhouse

On the last day and windiest day of spring break, students visited the New Mexico State Capitol. As the students journeyed to Santa Fe, they saw the air come alive with dust. Once at the Capitol the students were able to explore the building and its unique



architecture. The students were able to explore the State Senate chambers. They also learned about the electronic voting system that the senators and representatives use during session. The tour included an overview of the art housed in the Capitol. Students enjoyed New Mexican art with its unique blend of Hispanic and Native American influence. Through the trip to the Capitol, students were



able to gain an appreciation for our state's government and art.

Trio Program of Northern New Mexico and the Pueblo of Isleta Department of Education with the first annual 2024 Career Technical Education College Fair at the Isleta Resort and Casino Ballroom from 4-8 pm. The Fair was open to the public with



vendors from various institutions, colleges and agencies within the states of New Mexico and Colorado. The guests were provided information on either education, employment and/or trades. Approximately 148 people attended the fair at the luxurious Isleta Resort and Casino. The primary audience was the school aged children of the Pueblo of Isleta and the event was attended by sixty-three community members that ranged in age from 7th grade to college students. A small crowd of curious on-lookers also attended the event as the various vendors had great giveaways, door prizes and especially the Department of Education's famous wheel of prizes that kept the guests excited. We were pleased that the Governor and his Lt. also mingled amongst our curious onlookers and they too enjoyed the fair.

During the event, we had our higher education students volunteer one or two hours at the fair. The original count was three on the volunteer sign-up. The final count of volunteers was nine and these students were able to assist with the prize wheel, to relieve a vendor for a break to get some food or a drink. Students were also encouraged to visit with the various booths and schools to get familiar with things unfamiliar to them. The students shared that they didn't know what to expect of the fair. In conclusion, we had a good turnout and fun was enjoyed by all.

FAFSA Night at DOE

On Tuesday, March 19, 2024 DOE collaborated with E.O.C Trio Program out of Northern New Mexico to help students interested in attending college with the FAFSA form. FAFSA (*Free Application for Federal Student Aid*) is a form most colleges and universities use to determine how much financial aid a student is eligible to receive, which could include grants, scholarships, work-study funds, and loans. The FAFSA form is commonly required for scholarships and is a main requirement for the POI Scholarship. Those in attendance and worked on their FAFSA notice the new changes for the 2024-2025 FAFSA. DOE and EOC was able to inform 10 participants of the importance of completing a FAFSA form.

The newest change for the 2024-2025 form is every contributor (you, your spouse, a biological or adoptive parent, or your parent's spouse) who's required to provide information on the FAFSA form—needs a StudentAid.gov account before accessing and completing their section of the online form. Contributors can access their StudentAid.gov account by using their FSA ID (account username and password).



Our department will be hosting another FAFSA night on March 27, 2024 from 4:00pm-7:00pm to help those who still need to complete their form. One thing about FAFSA, you must apply for aid every year. If you need help completing your FAFSA, feel free to give us a call at (505)869-9790.

Throughout the first 8 weeks, fellows can expect to commit about 30-40 hours per week, (including overnight stays). Thereafter will be 10 hours per week and some evenings or weekends. The fellowship serves as a language enrichment program designed to support growth, development, knowledge and a community network. Upon successful completion of the 16-week session, fellows may be offered the opportunity of extending their fellowship. (All program required costs will be included).

Who can apply?

- Isleta Tribal members between 16-25 years of age who live in or near Isleta Pueblo. Applicants 16-18 years of age must be in good academic standing in school. Applicants 18 and over must have a high school diploma or GED by the start of the program
- Orientation will take place the last week of May 2024 for the selected Fellows.



Isleta Health Center Optometry Digital Eye Strain

We are using screens now more than ever before. Many of us use our computer screens at work and spend much of our



spare time on our TVs, phones or tablets. This can be a wonderful thing, but there are also potential side effects. One of the effects of increased screen time is that it can bother our eyes, a recent term has been coined for this: "Digital Eye Strain". Our eyes feel strained due to the background light from the devices, and due to small muscles inside our eyes that are working hard to keep us focused on the devices in front of us.

The Optometry Times and many eye-care professionals have recently created a simple rule to help combat this Digital Eye Strain. They call it the 20-20-20 Rule; this means that for every 20 minutes you spend on a digital screen, you should take a 20-second break to look at something at least 20 feet away. Oftentimes, our eyes feel most relaxed when we let them rest for a moment and just look into the distance. If you can actively remember to take short breaks from staring at screens throughout your day, your eyes will thank you. Especially if you are feeling eyestrain or fatigue at the end of the day, this is something you should implement into your daily routine. Vision is such an important part of our lives, let's remember to take care of our eyes so they can take care of us for many more years to come.

ISLETA POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWSLETTER APRIL - 2024



Greetings to all! The first quarter of 2024 is now behind us and spring is here. The winds arrived right on time in March as did some early April showers, but as we all

know Mother Nature will see to it the winds will be around for a while longer. The winds in the area can become fierce and cause road hazards and heavy blowing dust. During these times extra safety precautions should be taken and below are a few tips taken from "Defensive Driving.org – 9 Safety Tips for Driving in High Winds".

Did you know that high winds can have a devastating effect on road safety? In fact, over <u>1.2 million vehicle crashes</u> a year are weather-related, including from driving in high winds.

When learning to drive, it's common not to experience any type of bad weather. This may be due to the time of year you learned or because your lesson was canceled.

As a result, new drivers can be caught off guard in the event of driving in high winds. They often don't know what to do, and this causes them to panic.

This kind of situation is hazardous, not only for them, but for other road users. It increases the chance of a crash and can have a long-term effect on their confidence.

So, it's important to know what to do whilst driving in windy conditions. If you have the knowledge and expertise required, then you can remain calm and stay safe.

The following is a condensed version of their tips:

The old tried and true common sense rule: If you do not have to be out during inclement or dangerous weather, "Please stay home" as it is the safest place to be and you are not placing yourself in harm's way.

If you are unsure about traveling, check local weather, news, and other outlets as travel advisories may be broadcast to travel only in emergency situations. Often, when there is bad weather, they advise you not to travel or only travel in an emergency and these are classified as seeking medical help or escaping a dangerous situation. It should not be going to the grocery store, movies/cinema or other social events. If you are in need of emergency help, call 911 immediately.

If you plan on taking a long journey, preplanning is advisable particularly if you are traveling across the states within the "tornado alley". The "tornado alley" states usually include Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, South Dakota, Illinois, Missouri, Indiana and Ohio. However, be mindful, these are not the only states that could have a tornado touch down, so always listen to emergency weather alerts, etc. In this wonderful age of electronics you might consider downloading a good weather application which keeps you on top of weather forecasts as you travel.

Always prepare for driving in windy weather and storms, as it is advisable to be prepared for any type of scenario. Below are a few considerations:

- Take a spare tire and puncture repair kit
- Take a mobile phone car charger
- Pack warm clothing, including blankets
- Have a first aid kit
- Bring a torch with extra batteries
- Prepare a bag with snacks as well

When in dangerous situations, a person's natural reaction is to escape quickly. If driving in a wind storm, some will try to get to the destination faster, but in essence it places them in more danger with a higher risk of getting into a crash. Remember, gusts of wind surround the car and affect handling and braking. These gusts also come in short, unpredictable bursts catching drivers off guard. If driving at a high rate of speed, you give yourself less reaction time. Therefore, slow down to maintain a greater control of your vehicle and allowing yourself to be able to react more efficiently.

The best types of vehicles to drive in windy conditions are small sports coupes. This is because they are more aerodynamic, allowing the wind to easily travel over them. Trucks and buses, because they are considered "high profile", are the worst as they are blown around more easily by side winds. And it can almost feel like you are being hit from the side by another vehicle or broadsided.

You have heard some crashes involving a semi-tractor trailer to topple over, blocking the highway/roadway for hours. Trucks pulling empty box trailers are even more susceptible as there is no weight in the trailer to keep it grounded and strong winds can lift the trailer causing the tractor to topple on its side or worse.

Motorcyclists should definitely refrain from traveling during these types of weather conditions as it takes far less wind to affect the handling of the motorcycle and can easily knock the rider off balance. Motorcyclists run a high risk of serious injury or death as they have little/no protection and could also be struck by a vehicle once the bike is down.

Finally, if you are driving a 4×4 or saloon, be cautious. The car can still topple over or be knocked off the road. So, you should slow down and park somewhere safe.

If you are about to go from a protected area, like a tunnel or highway protected on each side by hills/mountains be extremely cautious when coming out of these areas, and prepare yourself for sudden gusts. These can catch a driver off guard, pushing you into the next lane and crashing.

Ideally, you want to avoid overtaking other vehicles, but sometimes this is unavoidable. If overtaking trucks, buses, motorcycles and even bicyclists, be aware and take precautions:

Always give these vehicles a wide berth as these types of vehicles are high risk during wind storms and could result in crashes (great bodily injury and/or death). If you must pass, maintain distance from them.

So, when overtaking trucks, buses, motorbikes, and even cyclists, take the following precautions.

First, give them a wide berth. We've already established that trucks, buses, and motorbikes are most at risk from high winds. If a bus or truck was to be blown over onto your vehicle, it could be fatal.

So when overtaking, stay as far away from them as possible. If the worst did happen, your vehicle would have more chance of not being hit.

In terms of motorcyclists and pushbike users, just do the same. If they come off, they could be thrown into your vehicle's path. If you were to hit them, it could have devastating consequences.

Falling debris can also be a factor during a severe windstorm with branches from trees broken and falling into the roadway or an entire tree toppling over. Always be vigilant and slow down during these storms particularly if driving during darkness. If you are driving in a forest or the countryside, you need to constantly be on the lookout for falling trees.

Control of the steering wheel is also important. Some drivers feel they have complete control of their vehicle with one hand but during a windstorm your chances increase of the winds surprising you and you are not able to instantly maintain/gain control. Remember hand placement at the hours of 2 and 10, using the steering wheel as a clock face.

Finally if you feel the need to park somewhere, do so in a safe place. Do not park near cliff edges, ditches or underneath trees or large poles.




PUEBLO OF ISLETA VETERANS ASSOCIATION (POIVA)




time, POIVA is still waiting for PNM to complete connection to main electrical power unit.

Keep it simple, if you do not see it on this flier throw it away in the trash. Do not use your blue recycle cart for trash or it will be confiscated. Have your cart out by 7am. For service schedule announcements check the POI newsletter & POI Facebook. (505) 869-4106

Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility. When your recyclables are bagged in colored bags they are not opened up and your material is landfilled instead of recycled. Using clear bags helps to ensure the health and safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the recycle facility. Using colored bags will result in your recycles not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.

PROJECT UPDATES FROM PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department will be busy with projects through the year. We ask you to please be careful when traveling in these areas. Watch out and maintain a safe distance from construction crews and equipment.

• Eastside Drinking Water Infrastructure

o The Pueblo is continuing to work with PNM to bring 3-Phase electrical service to each of the new well sites.

o Just a friendly reminder with the hot summer months quickly approaching, water usage will continue to increase. Please remember to turn off the water once you are done watering your gardens and don't over-water them. Check your home for any leaking fixtures, especially the toilet, as a "stuck" flapper valve will waste a lot of water in a short period of time. Excessive water leaks will also overwhelm your septic system, potentially oversaturating your leach field. We are providing water from two wells for the whole Eastside.

• Water Storage Tank Improvement

The 400,000 gallon water storage tank located off NM 317, across from TR 64, is in the process of being rehabilitated on the inside. The tank was drained and sandblasting of the interior began on Monday, March 18, 2024. Once the sandblasting work is completed, any necessary repair work to the tank will be done. A new coating material will be installed on the entire interior of the storage tank. The coating will be allowed to cure in place for a specified amount of time. Once the coating is cured, an inspection of the tank, by a certified coating inspector, will occur. If any issues are noted, these will be properly repaired and a re-inspection will Once all work is completed, the water storage tank will be disinfected and placed back in service. Based on weather conditions, curing times and inspection results, the storage tank could be off-line for several weeks.

The 400,000 gallon water storage tank provides water to the lower zone area of the Shea Whiff water system. The lower zone includes the area from the Rio Grande river, West to NM 45, and from TR 70 North to the Isleta Boundary.

While the storage tank work is underway, there will be a 200,000 gallon water storage tank on-line to provide waters to the lower zone. The Pueblo does have the ability to bring water down from the I-25 storage tanks (upper zone) if there is a high demand for water in the lower zone. The Pueblo is asking residents throughout the Shea Whiff area to conserve water, especially while the 400,000 gallon storage tank is out of service. Conserving water will help prevent the system from straining to keep up with the water demand.

Once the 400,000 gallon tank work is completed, the work crews will relocate to the Los Charcos area and begin rehabilitation of the Los Charcos water storage tank. A temporary storage tank will be brought in to provide water to the community while the existing tank is taken out of service. The tank's interior will be sandblasted, repaired as needed and then re-coated. Inspection of the cured coating will occur and if any issues are noted, the necessary repair work will occur; followed by an inspection. Once all the work is completed, the water storage tank will be disinfected and placed back in service.













Michael was truly someone to learn from, as he was constantly teaching those who encompassed him how to contribute in helping make the world a better place.

It has been utterly profound the amount of love and respect that has been shown. As many of you have directly said, Michael was one-of-a-kind human and he will never be forgotten nor replaced. Did you know you have to call PRC to inform them of all appointments?

This includes all ER/urgent care visits, any follows ups, any secondary referrals, telemed appointments, rescheduled appointments. Not calling in for appointments will delay payment.

Did you know if you receive a bill from a provider, you have to bring it in to PRC, even if you have a referral?

Some facilities will send a bill to the patient but not Isleta Health Center. It is best to bring all bills in received by mail to make sure PRC contacts the facility to bill Isleta.



What is Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)?

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), hereafter referred to as Autism (which includes Asperger's Disorder and Pervasive Developmental Disorder - Not Otherwise Specified [PDD-NOS]), is a complex, lifelong developmental condition that typically appears during early childhood and can impact a person's social skills, communication, relationships, and selfregulation. The Autism experience is different for everyone. It is defined by a certain set of behaviors and is often referred to as a "spectrum condition" that affects people differently and to varying degrees.

While there is currently no known single cause of Autism, early diagnosis helps a person receive resources that can support the choices and opportunities needed to live fully.

Family members or support providers become concerned that a child is not following a typical developmental course, they turn to experts, including psychologists, educators and medical professionals, for a diagnosis.

At first glance, some people with Autism may appear to have an intellectual disability, sensory processing issues, or problems with hearing or vision, and the diagnosis of Autism may become more challenging.

These conditions can co-occur with Autism and it can be confusing to families when they receive multiple diagnoses. However, it is important to identify Autism, as an accurate and early Autism diagnosis can provide the basis for appropriate educational and home-based support.

There are many differences between a medical diagnosis and an educational determination, or school evaluation, of a disability.

A new diagnosis of Autism can be emotionally challenging for both the individual and the family. The Autism Society is here to help navigate that diagnosis and connect you to the resources and support you need. An Autism diagnosis can help qualify an individual for community and educational services.

For toddlers and preschool-aged children with a new diagnosis, they will be eligible for early intervention/preschool services and for direct therapy and behavioral support based on the child's needs and the family's preferences. For school-aged children, they may qualify for community services with medical diagnosis and for school-based services with an educational diagnosis of Autism.

For adolescents and adults who are receiving a new Autism diagnosis, this can be a challenging time. Support services are available to support communication, emotional, mental health, and vocational needs, but the individual with Autism will need to choose which therapies and support they find useful.

It can be challenging to choose options if you don't know how the options work and what the support can do to help. Support groups can be helpful to learn from other adults who are experiencing similar situations. Local Autism Society affiliates can help make connections with providers and resources in the community.

Autism is a **lifelong condition**, and the available, necessary support and treatment changes as Autistic individuals move through major life phases. With many more people being diagnosed with Autism, appropriate services and support are even more pressing. Quality of life for individuals with Autism and their families depends not only on the foundation provided in childhood, but also on ongoing support that is specific to their educational, medical, social, recreational, family, and employment needs. The Autism Society supports people with Autism and their families through three critical stages of life by connecting them to the resources they need, when they need it.



<u>Medication management – first, do no harm!</u>

Has it been more than a year since you've checked in with your Isleta Health Center primary care doctor? If so, give us a call! IHC is now fully staffed with medical providers and working hard to reconnect with patients we haven't seen in a while.

If you have submitted a refill request for your medications and have been asked to make an appointment – there is a reason for that! Many medications for high blood pressure, thyroid conditions, diabetes, and numerous other conditions need to be monitored for safety and effectiveness.

Sometimes a medication that is intended to be helpful can actually cause harm if not monitored. For example, if someone's kidney function has decreased, we may need to lower the dose of a medication to make sure it doesn't accumulate to toxic levels in the body. In some cases, particularly as elders advance in age, their bodies may become more sensitive to certain medications—these medications may need to be decreased or discontinued.

Many of our patients get their healthcare in multiple locations – that is another reason we would like to check in with our patients about all of their current medications (including supplements and over the counter medications!). Sometimes patients are taking prescription medications that aren't documented in our health record. This could increase the potential risk for serious medication interactions.

Finally, prescription medications sometimes need to be updated. For example, IHC has newer diabetes medications on our formulary that protect the heart and kidneys and can decrease the need for insulin. Other updates to medications may include optimizing thyroid or blood pressure medication dosages to make sure they are still the best medicine recommended for the patient. We also have updated immunizations available – for example, RSV protection for infants/toddlers as well as elders age 65+.

Our staff at IHC are patients and caregivers ourselves – we know how valuable your time is, and how sometimes the healthcare system can be a challenge to navigate. Please rest assured that your IHC provider will not ask you to come in for an appointment unless they think you need it, for all the potential reasons above. If you have received a letter from us related to prescription medications and/or the need for an appointment, or if it has been a while since you have been seen, please reach out for an appointment: 505-869-3200.

Why Denim?

Have you heard of National Denim Day?

April is sexual assault awareness month! Millions of people around the world participate in campaigns to help spread awareness. One popular campaign is National Denim Day which, people are encouraged to wear denim to combat victim blaming and educate others about sexual violence on Wednesday April 24th, 2024. The denim day story begins in Italy 1992 after a court ruling where a rape conviction was overturned. This was due to the justice's rule that the 18-year-old victim was wearing tight jeans therefore, implying that she must have helped the person who raped her remove her jeans, thereby implying consent. The following day after the conviction, women in the Italian Parliament protested by going to work wearing jeans in alliance with the victim.

The Denim Day campaign was developed by Peace Over Violence in Los Angeles, which is an organization that brings attention to topics

like victim-blaming and myths that surround sexual violence. According to the non-profit group, they started the campaign in response to the case and the activism surrounding it. Since then, wearing jeans on Denim Day has become a symbol of protest and longest running sexual violence prevention and education campaign in history. Suicide and Crisis Lifeline

Are you worried a loved one might be at risk for suicide? Don't hesitate to call 988, a 24/7 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. You can call if there's a mental health crisis, if you're worried about someone else, if you need help navigating a difficult situation, or just had a bad day. If there is an urgent crisis, it's always still ok to call 911.

There is no way to know if a loved one will follow through with threats of suicide, and we should always take threats seriously. If you are hearing of suicidal thoughts or seeing concerning behaviors, these may be calls for help.

Warning signs might include unsafe behaviors, saying things like "I wish I wasn't here anymore," or someone not acting like themselves. If you see any concerning behaviors, you should approach them and offer support. You can also always help your loved one stay safe by removing lethal weapons and associated items (gun, ammunition, knives, medications, rope, etc.) from the home and making sure these items are locked away.


There are other suicidal warning signs like leaving a note, giving away personal items, risky behaviors with substances, isolation and withdrawal, mental health distress, or struggling to cope with a difficult situation. People ages 10-34 are at higher risk of suicide (CDC, Facts about Suicide, 2022).

You can also encourage your loved one to seek counseling treatment services at Isleta Health Center B'eeh-K'oo-ee Wellness Center (BKWC) 505-869-5475. A counselor can help them explore

strategies for managing crisis situations and develop coping skills. It may take time for your loved one to develop these skills and see a change in behavior and mood. For some, behaviors that can help mood might include listening to music, dancing, journaling, getting routine sleep, eating well, praying, and engaging in traditional spirituality. Scheduling regular family time can also improve communication around emotions and create a greater sense of safety and support.

For many of us, it can be difficult to talk about suicide and suicidal thoughts with people we care about. But if you talk about it, you could help them get the care they need.

Patient Education: Understanding the Referral Process

Welcome to the Isleta Health Center (IHC) Purchase Referred Care (PRC) Department.

Your health and well-being are our top priorities. To ensure you receive the specialized treatment and diagnostics you need, it's important to understand the referral process from start to finish. Here is a step-by-step guide to help you navigate through it.

Step 1: Generating Referrals

Referrals are initiated by IHC providers when specialized treatment or diagnostics are needed. This is the first step in accessing the care you require outside of our primary services. Referrals can also be generated by an outside provider, but keep in mind, you are responsible for calling PRC with the appointment day, time, facility and reasoning.

Step 2: Insurance Information

It is crucial that IHC has your current insurance information on file. IHC is your payor of last resort, requiring you to use your primary insurance first or provide a denial letter from CMS if you do not qualify for Medicaid.

- Sign Up for Insurance: You can sign up onsite or through www.yes.state. nm.us.
- Onsite Benefits Coordinator: Make an appointment with our onsite Benefits Coordinator for assistance at (505)869-4469.

The premise that Indians are guaranteed health care from our treaties as long as the water flows and the grass grows is, unfortunately not that simple. Indians ARE required to apply for alternate resources per 42 CFR 136.61 - Payor of Last Resort. While some treaties mention health care, the Indian Health Service is not an entitlement program, and therefore funding for PRC is not guaranteed by the Federal government. AR allows PRC funds to be conserved, thereby providing health care for more Indian beneficiaries. The Isleta Health Center receives its PRC funding from Indian Health Service, and must comply with the mutually agreedto agreement which includes 42 CFR 136.61.

Step 3: Referral Generation

Once your insurance details are in order, the PRC will generate a referral for the specialized care you need. It is also important to make sure your address and phone number are up to date at Patient Registration. This helps PRC in scheduling appointments/and or facilities contacting you with important appointment information.

Step 4: Scheduling Appointments

If you have questions regarding the scheduling of your appointment, contact the PRC. Please note that you may be required to schedule your own appointment at the hospital or clinic. You can obtain a hardcopy of your referral onsite by request. Please keep in mind that you are *required to call PRC of all scheduled appointments*, including follow-ups, procedures, tele-med and inperson visits

Step 5: Attending Your Appointment

When attending your appointment:

- Provide your insurance information.
- Indicate that IHC is the payor of last resort.
- Let provider know you have a referral (either by fax or picked up by patient)

Step 6: Handling Bills

Should you receive any bills:

• Bring them to IHC immediately. Do not wait until they go into collections, as processing payments requires time.

Emergency Care:

If you attend emergency care, inform the PRC of your visit within 72 hours. Leaving voicemails is acceptable, please provide:

- Name
- · Date of Birth
- The date you were seen at the facility
- Name of Facility you were seen at
- Reason for the visit
- Transportation method (self/ ambulance ie: Isleta/AMR/ Albuquerque)
- Any follow up appointments

It is essential to inform the hospital of both your primary insurance and IHC as your last payer. Failure to inform IHC of your emergency or urgent care visit means we cannot search for your claims for payment.

PRC Referral Coverage: Please remember, PRC referral coverage is not an entitlement. It is funding allocated for referred care or emergencies. Compliance with federal rules regarding the payment of claims and bills is mandatory to remain in compliance. The only way to ensure compliance is for patients to follow the required pathways for payment.

WIC Diabetes Awareness

THERE ARE 2 TYPES OF DIABETES

Type 1- known as juvenile or insulin dependent diabetes. The exact cause is unknown but the body's immune system attacks the insulin producing cells in the pancreas which are needed to process glucose in our body. Insulin is required to treat this type.

Type 2- cells in the muscle, liver and fat become resistant to insulin which is needed to transport sugars into cells of the body, this causes a raise in blood sugar levels. There are four stages to this type. They are insulin resistance, pre-diabetes, type 2 diabetes and type 2 diabetes with vascular complications. The condition develops over time and most people with diabetes have this type. Factors such as weight and genes are contributing factors.

SYMPTOMS

The symptoms include: being overly thirsty and using the restroom frequently; blurry vision; tingling in the hands and feet; wounds that are slow to heal; and, weight loss without trying.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Diabetes can be managed through diet and drugs such as Insulin and Metformin. A care team needs to be established with a primary care doctor, endocrinologist and dietitian. Lifestyle changes such as weight loss, healthy eating and exercise benefit an individual and manage symptoms.
