Governor's Report


Maguwam,

I hope this newsletter finds everyone in good health and spirits. I can't believe we are entering the month of May! As, we approach this month and prepare to accept the blessings of our graduates, a healthy and blessed farming season, and as we watch our youth exit another school year and prepare for the next grade level. This is going to be a busy month, as I would like to remind our community to stay safe and continue to watch out for one another. As a reminder to everyone doing yard work and farming, please do not block the roadways. It is important for safety reasons to make sure that branches, rocks, and other debris do not block access for our first responders and road equipment.

I would like to apologize for canceling the last community meeting. I am happy to announce we have come together and scheduled the community meeting on Saturday, May 4, 2024, at 9:00 am-12:00 pm at the Isleta Resort and Casino, Ballroom A. We will be posting posters around the community as a reminder.

I would like to share some information and updates we have continued to work on for our community. Our departments have begun a new initiative to ensure that the Pueblo has the most up-to-date information on tribal member addresses and who lives in each home to ensure that emergency

responders can locate and provide emergency services. This month, I ask that you update your residency information with the Census to ensure that the Pueblo has accurate records. Please look out for more information about this new initiative. I will be in attendance at the Rio Grande Compact Commission Annual Meeting in El Paso, next week to advocate for our water rights for the Pueblo. I want to thank Second Lt. Abeita and Natural Resources Director Clint Lente for traveling to Washington DC this month on behalf of the Pueblo and the Coalition of the Six Middle Rio Grande Pueblos to advocate for our water rights issues and funding. They met with the New Mexico Congressional delegation and the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs to

importance of getting out to vote. The state Primary Election Day is Tuesday, June 4. New Mexico law now provides same-day voter registration during early voting and on Election Day. You can vote early at your local County Clerk's Office from May 7 to June 1 or at designated early voting locations from May 18 to June 1. The last day to request an absentee ballot is May 21. Please contact your local County Clerk's Office or visit NMVote.org for more information on voting locations, absentee and early voting, and how to become a poll worker. I encourage everyone, especially our young people, to register and vote. Your vote matters.

I would like to send a special, "Thank you" to our first responders the police dept., dispatch, fire dept., EMS, Open Space officers, and the Isleta Health Center for their dedication to the community, and their department! As most of you know we held the Blue Mass this past Sunday, April 14, 2024, at the St. Augustine Church in honor of them.

Last, I want to send my condolences to the families of those who have lost their family members during April.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for June Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, May 22, 2024, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel.Lujan@isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.



ISLETA TRIBAL COURT JURY TRIALS

On November 14, 2001, the Isleta Tribal Council passed Resolutions 2001-134 and 2001-135, which govern jury trials in the Tribal Court. These resolutions may affect you either as a juror or as a criminal defendant.

Because you may be called a potential juror shortly, you should know your rights and duties. This article will tell you what you need to know about the Pueblo of Isleta Tribal Court jury system. According to the Tribal Council's resolutions:

- 1. A person accused of a crime may have a jury trial only if the crime is **punishable by jail**. There is no right to a jury trial in civil cases.
- 2. A person who wants a jury trial must request a jury at the time of arraignment.
- 3. The jury will consist of 6 jurors and 2 alternate jurors. Prospective jurors will be randomly chosen by a computer-generated randomizer using the Tribal census enrollment list.
- 4. You are qualified to be a juror if you are a member of the Pueblo and are at least eighteen years old.
- 5. Even if you are otherwise qualified, you may not serve on a jury if you are an elected or appointed official, you work for the Tribal Court, you work for the Pueblo's Police or Wildland department or Wild Land, or you have been convicted of a felony. If you fall into any of these categories and are summoned to serve on a jury trial, you must appear and tell the Court why you are not qualified to serve. If you do not appear, the Court may fine you up to \$500.00.
- 6. Even if you are qualified to be a juror, the Court may disqualify you from jury duty if you have a legal or personal relationship with one of the parties, you are biased or prejudiced in some way (so that you will not be able to decide the case fairly), or for any other reason justifying dismissal. If you fall into any of these categories and are summoned to serve on a jury trial, you must appear and tell the Court why you should be disqualified. If you do not appear, the Court may fine you up to \$500.00.
- 7. The Court may excuse otherwise qualified individuals if they are participating in traditional activities within the community, if they are ill, if they are disabled, or for any other good reason. If you fall into any of these categories and are summoned to server on a jury trial, you must appear and tell the Court why you should be excused. If you do not appear, the court may fine you up to \$500.00.
- 8. Serving on a jury is your legal and civic duty if you are summoned by the Court to serve on a jury, you must appear when summoned. If you do not come to Court for jury selection and service, the Court may fine you up to \$500.00.
- 9. Your employer may not punish you in any way if you are summoned to jury duty. Any employer who discharges, disciplines, threatens otherwise coerces an employee who is to serve jury duty, may be held in contempt of court and penalized.
- 10. Jurors shall be paid \$50.00 per day for their jury service.
- 11. The Defendant who requests a jury trial will not pay any fees before the trial. However, if the Defendant is found guilty by a jury, the Defendant will pay Restitution to the Pueblo of Isleta for the cost of the trial. The restitution will be in addition to any fines or other sentencing requirements, and will include \$50.00 per trial day for court costs and \$50.00 per day per juror. (For example, a person convicted in a jury trial that lasts one day will be required to pay \$450.00 restitution: \$50.00 court costs + (8 jurors x \$50.00) = \$450.00.)



Affordable Connectivity Program

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who Is Eligible for the Affordable Connectivity **Program?**

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least *one* of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs:
 - · Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program or School Breakfast Program, including at U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Community Eligibility Provision schools.



Attention Pueblo of Isleta Residents: Update in POI Environment Department Asbestos Program



To educate the community about asbestos and to prevent releases of asbestos-containing building material (ACBM). The Environment Department performs building materials inspections for demolition and general renovation projects for homes within the Pueblo of Isleta reservation.

Protecting Your Health and Those Around You

What is Asbestos? It is a natural mineral fiber that is mined from the Earth. It was used in many common building materials for its strength and durability, insulation properties, and fire resistance. Asbestos is hazardous to human health and the environment. Microscopic fibers are released into the air when the materials are disturbed. These fibers can enter the lungs when inhaled and can damage the lung tissue.

Renovation or Demolition? What You Need to Know Before You Start

This is a reminder to all households that a building materials inspection is required before any renovation or demolition work. The purpose of a building materials inspection is to rule out the presence of asbestos-containing building materials.

Asbestos is found in many building materials, including but not limited to:

FUNDING NOW AVAILABLE

The Tribal Council approved a budget using ARPA funding to assist households with building materials inspection, asbestos abatement (if necessary), and demolition. The deadline to get a household project on the Environment Department's list is **July 15**, **2024**.

An archaeological window into Isleta history

Many of you probably remember the large project in 2021/22 to upgrade the sewer lines in the pueblo. As part of that project, the Pueblo of Isleta Cultural and Historic Preservation Department and Public Works Department had an archaeologist monitor the sewer line excavations to make sure that no sensitive cultural remains were disturbed or destroyed. In all, 132 locations were monitored throughout the pueblo – the first time so much of the pueblo's ground and "underground" could be inspected this way. Fortunately, at none of the 132 monitored locations was there evidence that the sewer-line work affected any sensitive material or damaged any foundations of the ancestral pueblo.

But some interesting things relating to Isleta's history did come out of the monitoring. The excavations unearthed a variety of pottery sherds, especially in locations around the plaza, and from there west to approximately Tribal Road (TR) 40, north to TR 42, east to TR 42 and 38, and south to TR 35. Pottery sherds are important because different forms, styles, clays, and tempers may represent different pottery types. All over the world, pottery types have been changing over time, and this is true also of the pottery made by the ancestors of Isleta and other pueblos since they first started making pottery about 2000 years ago. With the

right amount of data, archaeologists can date different pottery types to different periods. Some periods may span hundreds of years, others may be much shorter (and often they overlap to an extent). If there are enough sherds of different types they can give a general idea of when and how long a place was settled or used.

Such a general idea or sequence is exactly what the pottery sherds/types seen during the Isleta sewer-line monitoring are offering. The oldest sherds date to c. 950-1000, and latest are yesterday's refuse. And because some sherds (like those oldest sherds) occur only in certain locations, it is possible to trace changes in Isleta's size and footprint over the last 1100 years. The maps below show four major changes from c. 950-1000 to the mid-1700s. One perhaps surprising observation is that the plaza layout that figures so prominently in Isleta's history seems to date largely to the 1600s and not earlier. Perhaps the single main plaza only developed after the 1612/13 founding of the Mission of San Antonio on the plaza's north side? (The mission was rebuilt and rededicated to San Agustín around 1710). Alas, this is a question the pottery sherds can't answer.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION


On April 9th, the Department joined Isleta Elementary School's journey to the Wildlife Sanctuary at Los Padillas. Students were greeted with a friendly wind. Students experienced the outdoor classrooms of the Sanctuary. The Sanctuary teachers engaged students with many interactive activities such as identifying signs of animal life, examining plant life with magnifying devices, and learning about natural landmarks within our area. Students thoroughly enjoyed the day. While the students learned about the interconnectedness of our natural world the students looked to bring the lesson back to our community. First, the students thought about how we care for the natural resources within our community. Finally, students wanted to learn our Tiwa words for the natural world around them such as pond, mountain, and wind. Students also wanted to learn the names of various birds in Tiwa such as woodpecker, roadrunner, and quail. The day at the Wildlife Sanctuary fostered a sense of awe and wonder for both the natural world around us and our language, Tiwa.

"Looking Forward" has been a central theme for the Department of Education. On April 10th, Governor Zuni and the Department participated in the Tribal Leaders Consultation for Albuquerque Public Schools. The session began with an encouraging and refreshing prayer from Governor Zuni. The consultation heavily focused on the status of Indian education. Topics discussed included focusing on the struggles of Native American students as English language learners, implementation of the new guardrails and standards of APS, along with how APS is using Johnson O'Malley funding to address the educational needs of Native American students. Tribal leaders and educational directors strongly voiced their opinions. Tribal leaders sought to protect language and culture, while educational directors looked at how our respective departments could work in alongside Albuquerque Public Schools. Governor Zuni closed the consultation wishing everyone safe travels and hoping that our tribal communities would work together for the betterment of our students.



The Department also visited Santa Fe Indian School for their College and Career Day. The Department was able to offer Isleta students some supplies that might make life easier. The Department was also able to offer some insight into pursuing higher education to all students.

Our Academic Success Coach Lloyd Padilla had prepared several informational pamphlets for students in high school. These pamphlets offered information such as things to consider when choosing a college, goals that high school students should set, and pursuing a healthy life. While at Santa Fe Indian School the Department learned that Lloyd is a great asset for our department. Students from SFIS overwhelmed the Department's table as students gathered to express that they missed Lloyd and his presence at SFIS.



The tutoring service has been busy. Students have shown some preference toward attending on Wednesday but overall are consistently attending our tutoring services. Students continue striving forward as the year comes to a close. Students are looking at their current academic performance and examining how that will impact them in the coming year. On April 22nd, the Department will begin a spring session with Sylvan Learning. The sessions will occur twice a week from 4 pm-6 pm at the Department of Education office.

The end of the school year is approaching fast. Now is the time to get with your school counselor to make sure you are not missing any credits. If you are missing any credits, it is best that you sign up for summer school. This will help with your workload next year.



Lunas Police Department, Santa Fe Police Department, and the Albuquerque Police Department.



Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility. When your recyclables are bagged in colored bags they are not opened up and your material is landfilled instead of recycled. Using clear bags helps to ensure the health and safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the recycle facility. Using colored bags will result in your recycles not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.

TEMPERATURES AND FOOD SAFETY

Improper handling of food affects millions of people each year. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), 48 million Americans become sick from food every single year. This is about 14% of the population or 1 in 7 people. Of those 48 million people, "128,000 are hospitalized and 3,000 die." One way to help reduce foodborne illnesses is to be mindful of the role temperature plays in food safety.

How long can I keep food out of the fridge?

According to the CDC, foods can be kept out of the fridge at room temperature for two hours. This refers to the temperature of the environment, not the food itself. Once a food is cooked or taken out of the fridge or freezer, you have two hours to consume it before putting it back into the fridge or freezer. If the food is kept at a temperature over 90°F, you only have one hour before putting it into the fridge or freezer. If you want to let the food cool down before putting it in the fridge to prevent dropping the fridge's temperature, that is okay. However, keep in mind you will need to put the food away within the 1- to 2-hour time limit.

Why is it important to not leave foods at room temperature or high temperatures for too long?

Bacteria grow rapidly in a temperature range called the "Danger Zone." The danger zone is between 40°F and 140°F. This is why refrigerators are kept at 40°F or below. Hot-holding foods at a temperature above 140°F are also okay for feasts or gatherings.



Foot Care for People with

Diabetes



This is part of our series of articles with tips for how to support loved ones living with diabetes! You have probably heard that people with diabetes need to take care of their feet. But what exactly does that mean?


Over time, higher blood sugar levels cause damage to the small blood vessels and nerves in the

This damage can sometimes make the feet feel tingly, painful, or even numb. When the toes or eet are partially numb, people might not feel pain if they step on something or get a blister, cut, or callus. Since they might not notice these problems when they start, time can pass and the injury to the foot can become infected, leading to bigger problems!

These problems can be prevented!

- 1) Carefully check the feet every day. Some people ask a family member for help, or even use a hand mirror see the bottoms of their feet more easily.
- 2) If the skin is dry or cracked, apply lotion to keep the skin soft and prevent cracks from turning into cuts. One exception - don't put lotion between the toes.
- 3) Wear socks without tight elastic bands. Wear white socks whenever possible this makes it easier to notice if there is any pus or blood.
- 4) Wear shoes that fit well and with plenty of room for the toes. We don't want the shoe to cause blisters! 5) Check inside shoes before putting them on to make sure there aren't any pebbles or
- debris in there that could injure the feet. 6) Cut toenails straight across to avoid ingrown toenails. If there are ingrown or thick toenails, definitely consult the doctor or podiatrist!
- 7) If there is a wound or ulcer, take action right away! Set up a medical appointment ASAP to give the foot the best chances to heal quickly and get back on your feet







Did you know you have to call PRC to inform them of all appointments?

This includes all ER/urgent care visits, any follows ups, any secondary referrals, telemed appointments, rescheduled appointments. Not calling in for appointments will delay payment.

Did you know if you receive a bill from a provider, you have to bring it in to PRC, even if you have a referral? Some facilities will send a bill to the patient but not Isleta Health Center. It is best to bring all bills in received by mail to make sure PRC contacts the facility to bill Isleta.


