Governor Zuni would like to extend his thanks and appreciation to the community, for all the love and support you have given him during this time. He was recently diagnosed with cancer and is undergoing treatment and is being cared for by his family.

October was a busy month filled with multiple community events that we hope you attended and enjoyed. We are happy to see the return of the Annual Memorial Walk. We hope that this event provided comfort and warm memories for the community as we move into the holiday season.


Individuals must provide proof of Tribal Membership and residency.

#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

**DEADLINE** for December Newsletter articles is set for Wednesday, November 13, 2024, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel.Lujan@isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

**PROBATES** need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

**CLASSIFIED ADS:** The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

For Declaration of Candidacy for the **2025-2026** Term for Pueblo of Isleta Tribal Governor and Tribal Council

Early Voting for the General Election shall be held Wednesday and Thursday, November 20 and 21 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. both days and Saturday, November 23 from 8 a.m. to noon. All early voting shall be held at the Isleta Recreation Center Gymnasium.

The General Election will be held on **Saturday**, **November 30 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m**. at the Isleta Recreation Center Gymnasium.

Voters with disabilities who are unable to physically walk form their vehicle to the polling place shall receive in-vehicle registration and voting assistance from poll clerks.





# PROHIBITION OF DISORDERLY CONDUCT AND ELECTIONEERING

**Electioneering Strictly Prohibited.** No person shall campaign or discuss candidates within 100 feet of the polling place while registration, nomination, or elections are taking place. Elections Code, Law and Order Code § 03-05-02(H).

Disorderly Conduct Strictly Prohibited. No photography or recording shall be permitted within 100 feet of the polling place during election, registration, or nomination events. No harassment, intimidation, or other disorderly conducted shall be permitted within 100 feet of the polling place. No loitering shall be permitted within 100 feet of the polling place. Individuals, including poll watchers, in violation of this section shall be subject to removal and/or arrest by the Isleta Police Department. Elections Code, Law and Order Code § 03-05-02(I)





#### Department of Natural Resources

The Department of Natural Resources has been working closely with Governors regarding the issues and concerns we face in the Bosque. It is our goal to regain access to reconnect the community to the Rio Grande and Bosque. We are removing invasive species (Russian Olive, Siberian Elm, Tree of Heaven, and Salt Cedar) from the forest to reduce fuel loading by processing cottonwood logs for firewood and oven wood for the community's use. In this initiative we are getting multiple benefits by reducing the risks to catastrophic wild fire, improving habitat, improving forest health, and access for tribal member use. The project recently completed is a 30-acre section which was hand treated near the 240 wasteway north. We are planning to expand from Los Charco's area to Hwy 1-47 to capture a larger scale of land reclamation of the Bosque. In a second phase we are working with the Cultural Affairs Department with plans to re-establish fruit trees and native plants for community to harvest and to provide ground cover where invasive species were removed in the Bosque.

The Bureau of Reclamation is funding the Pueblos Bosque Restoration Crew for treatment of invasive species, jetty jack removal and maintenance. We are currently working with Army Corp of Engineers on a feasibility study to develop a treatment plan driven by the Pueblo with all concerns and needs.



#### IS THERE LEAD IN YOUR WATER PIPES?

Public Works needs your help to "fill in the blanks" on the lead inventories. We need to know what type of pipe was used to connect your home to the shut-off; if this line had been replaced and what type of piping was used; if there is any type of water filtration at your home; the owners name, physical and mailing addresses, phone number, and year home was constructed. All of the information collected goes back to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

All of this information is important as it helps us submit more thorough funding requests to update these lines to protect the safety and health of the community.

The initial inventory for each of the four water systems on the Pueblo were submitted to the EPA on October 15, 2024. EPA is reviewing each inventory and will contact the Pueblo with any questions. What we submitted was not comprehensive. We still need to "fill in the blanks".

Public Works may have information on what materials were used when your home was constructed. If we know the home was built after 1990 based on records we have on file, there will be no need for you to complete a form. Any homes or business we do not have records on will be asked to complete a form with the information requested.

Bureau of Reclamation Grant Funded Irrigation Ditch Rehabilitation Project

#### Why Are We Rehabilitating the Sand Ditch?

Our Sand Irrigation Ditch is a vital resource for our community's agricultural and landscape needs. Over time, it has experienced natural wear, sediment buildup, and reduced flow efficiency. To maintain sustainable water access and promote efficiency and conservation, we are undertaking a rehabilitation project to restore the ditch to optimal working conditions.

#### Key Benefits of the Rehabilitation Project

- **Increased Efficiency**: By reducing leaks and sediment build-up, more water will reach users quickly and efficiently.
- Water Conservation: A rehabilitated ditch minimizes water loss, helping us make the most of every drop and reduce waste.
- **Improved Reliability**: The project will improve the structural integrity of the ditch, reducing the risk of breaks or overflow during peak usage.
- Improved Operation and Maintenance Access: Per Tribal Resolution 2023-065, a 14-foot easement from the edge of the apron on both sides of the ditch will be created and maintained.

\*Fences encroaching withing the easement will be relocated by Department of Natural Resources staff outside the easement.





#### **EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE FUND**

These guidelines shall be used to provide monetary support to students and adults in need of educational assistance.

Assistance may be provided for the following categories: (Priority will be given to category A, then B and so forth).

#### Category

- (A) Students K-12: Students who are in need of academic support, unavailable through other resources, for example; tutoring through Sylvan Learning Center or other programs.
- (B) Students K-12: Students with disabilities.
- (C) Students K-12: Students attending private institutions.
- (D) Students K-12: Students involved in extra-curricular activities, i.e., band, chess, sports activities, science fair, etc.
- (E) Group Trips: To give students K-12 the opportunity to attend and explore educational programs or take education trips outside the regular classroom.
- (F) Continuing Education: Special interest classes, i.e., career development, etc.
- (G) Adult Education Special Programs: Department of Education hosted programs to include CNM Ingenuity and UNM-VC con current courses/classes.

#### Bus Route 208 (No Fares until further notice!)

Bus Route 208 connects the Pueblo of Isleta and Valencia County communities to the Alvarado Transportation Center (ATC) in Downtown Albuquerque during the morning/midday when the Rail Runner does not operate. Route 208 features three northbound trips arriving at the ATC at 9:30am, 11:00am and 1:30pm, and three southbound trips departing the ATC at 9:35am, 11:05am and 1:32pm. At the ATC, riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes.

Route 208 serves two bus stops on the Pueblo

of Isleta. The stop closest to the village proper is located on NM 147 just east of the Rio Grande Bridge. Please do not park and leave vehicles unattended on the



adjoining roads near this stop, as the bus and other vehicles use these roads to turnaround and access other locations. Route 208 also stops at the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station. where riders can transfer to the Isleta Resort and Casino shuttle. Because the bus serves the station, riders can also consider using Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque in the mid morning and returning by train in the evening.

#### Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride (No Fares until <u>further notice!</u>)

The Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride operates Monday through Friday from 8:15am to 2:45pm, providing trips within the Pueblo and to the ABQ RIDE Route 53 bus stop on NM 314. Service to places like Smiths, Albertsons and Wal-Mart in Los Lunas is also provided with requests made before noon at least one business day prior to your trip.

Request your Dial-a-Ride trip by calling Valencia County dispatch at (505) 352-3595 before noon at least one business day prior to your trip. Requests are accepted between 5:00am and 3:00pm Monday thru Friday. On the date and time of your trip, a wheelchair accessible van will arrive within 15 minutes of your scheduled pickup time. Trips may also be grouped together; riders should expect to travel





#### Health Beat: Pedestrian Safety National Walk To School Day

For the several years, the Isleta Elementary School 6th graders and the Isleta Kindergarteners have teamed up with the Isleta Health Center Health Educator to promote National Walk to School Day and Pedestrian Safety. Annually on the first Wednesday of October, we come together to celebrate the benefits of walking by encouraging children to walk and bike to school. On this National Observance, it is a good time to teach the students pedestrian safety tips, as a way to help decrease the risk for pedestrian injuries and death. Many children are killed every year. According to the CDC,

More than 700 children are killed by cars every year. Additionally, more than 21,000 are taken to the hospital because they are hit by a car. Many times this happens when children dash out into the street from between parked cars. The driver doesn't see the child until it is too late. Driveways and parking lots are a bad place to play.

With these staggering numbers and also with Halloween coming up, we know something needs to be done. So let's work on decreasing pedestrian injuries and start to promote pedestrian safety with our kids. Please share these tips with your children:

- BE SEEN
  - · Increase your visibility at night by:
    - Carrying a flashlight/glow stick when walking.
    - Wear reflective clothing or reflective wristbands.

If you went to the Isleta Health Center Health Fair this last year, the wristbands everyone received are reflective, and can be worn to help being seen.

- · Adding lights to your child clothes/costume.
- Wear light colored clothing.
- FOLLOW SAFETY RULES
- Use the side walk when possible.
- Cross at the crosswalk.
- Look left, right, left when crossing the street and continue looking until you reach the sidewalk.
- If possible, make eye contact with drivers in stopped vehicles to ensure they see you before you cross in front of them.
- Put phones and other devices down when walking and make sure you watch where you are going.
- Children under 10 years old should walk with an adult.

#### Too much Sugar and the Eyes – IHC Optometry


November is diabetes awareness month. It is important to bring awareness about diabetes and its effects not only in the blood, but also in the eyes. Diabetes is a metabolic disease caused by increased sugar in the blood. Increased sugar levels can damage blood vessel walls and allow the blood to leak out. This can happen anywhere in the body, but the eye is the only part of the body where we can see a naked blood vessel using lenses and a microscope.

#### Annual diabetic eye exams are important.

Every patient with diabetes should receive a comprehensive eye exam with dilation at least once a year. Although not fun, dilation widens the pupil so that the doctor can see more of the inside of the eye. These include important parts such as the retina (layer of tissue that light focuses on), optic nerve (supplies retina information to the brain), macula (central vision), and blood vessels (supplies the eye with blood). Diabetes can cause changes to these structures such as macular edema/swelling, retinopathy, and even hemorrhages of the blood vessels. In mild cases, a patient may not know they have diabetic changes in their eye, however if left uncontrolled, more severe cases can occur that may lead to blurry vision, blind spots, or even loss of vision. If any diabetic changes are noticed, the patient will be seen again in 3, 6, or 12 months and will be educated on importance of proper blood sugar control and following up with their primary care physician. Sometimes, more help is needed and a retina specialist may get involved.


Every comprehensive eye exam will also include checking for any glasses prescription. Sometimes, a patient may report fluctuating vision. This can happen if diabetes is uncontrolled. If fluctuating vision occurs along with uncontrolled diabetes, we will monitor closely until it is better controlled before prescribing a new pair glasses. Other causes that can cause blurry vision are cataracts and dry eyes. Diabetes can worsen cataracts causing the natural lens in the eye to become cloudy and causing blurry vision. Dry eye symptoms can including tearing, burning, foreign body sensation, and blurry vision that comes and goes. During a comprehensive exam, the doctor can identify these types of conditions and make a plan for you and your eyes. At Isleta Health Center, we look forward to scheduling you for a diabetic or comprehensive eye exam.

#### M.A.A.D. WALK/RUN

#### **REACHING FOR A STAR**

Although December is still in the offing, planning for Reaching for a Star is already underway and we know the time will pass too quickly before the event. An annual event for many, many years Sgt. Kathleen Lucero will again be at the helm with her many volunteers to make this year's event a success just as she has in the past.

#### **INFORMATION**

Emphasis has been placed on the use of illegal narcotics the past couple of newsletters, but it is a high priority based upon the amount being found and seized here on the Pueblo. Nationally it is recognized as a crisis and based upon the DEA's May 9, 2024 press release, here are a few facts:

"The shift from plant-based drugs, like heroin and cocaine, to synthetic,

chemical-based drugs, like fentanyl and methamphetamine, has resulted in the most dangerous and deadly drug crisis the United States has ever faced," said DEA Administrator Anne Milgram. "At the heart of the synthetic drug crisis are the Sinaloa and Jalisco cartels and their associates, who DEA is tracking world-wide. The suppliers, manufacturers, distributors, and money launderers all play a role in the web of deliberate and calculated treachery orchestrated by these cartels. DEA will continue to use all available resources to target these networks and save American lives."

Drug-related deaths claimed 107,941 American lives in 2022, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Fentanyl and other synthetic opioids are responsible for approximately 70% of lives lost, while methamphetamine and other synthetic stimulants are responsible for approximately 30% of deaths.

Fentanyl is the nation's greatest and most urgent drug threat. Two milligrams (mg) of fentanyl is considered a potentially fatal dose. Pills tested in DEA laboratories average 2.4 mg of fentanyl, but have ranged from 0.2 mg to as high as 9 mg. The advent of fentanyl mixtures to include other synthetic opioids, such as nitazenes, or the veterinary sedative xylazine have increased the harms associated with fentanyl.

Seizures of fentanyl, in both powder and pill form, are at record levels. Over the past two years seizures of fentanyl powder nearly doubled. DEA seized 13,176 kilograms (29,048 pounds) in 2023. Meanwhile, the more than 79 million fentanyl pills seized by DEA in 2023 is almost triple what was seized in 2021. Last year, 30% of the fentanyl powder seized by DEA contained xylazine. That is up from 25% in 2022.

Social media platforms and encrypted apps extend the cartels' reach into every community in the United States and across nearly 50 countries worldwide. Drug traffickers and their associates use technology to advertise and sell their products, collect payment, recruit and train couriers, and deliver drugs to customers without having to meet face-to-face. This new age of digital drug dealing has pushed the peddling of drugs off the streets of America and into our pockets and purses.

The cartels have built mutually profitable partnerships with China-based precursor chemical companies to obtain the necessary ingredients to manufacturer synthetic drugs. They also work in partnership with Chinese money laundering organizations to launder drug proceeds and are increasingly using cryptocurrency.

Nearly all the methamphetamines sold in the United States today is manufactured in Mexico, and it is purer and more potent than in years past. The shift to Mexican-manufactured methamphetamine is evidenced by the dramatic decline in domestic clandestine lab seizures. In 2023, DEA's El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC) documented 60 domestic methamphetamine clandestine lab seizures, which is a stark comparison to 2004 when 23,700 clandestine methamphetamine labs were seized in the United States.

Fentanyl and methamphetamine are still at the top of the lists for narcotics seen frequently, but other drugs have been seen making their way to this part of the country. Being informed on the many dangers of these and any narcotics to include prescription medications is important to keep yourself, your family, your friends, etc. safe.

#### **SAFETY TIPS**

Although October was unusually warm this year, changes are coming with lower overnight temperatures and relatively warm days. We all know changes are unpredictable and we ask everyone to be prepared. After seeing the

unexpected floods in Roswell and damages sustained and unfortunately the deaths reported, please all, be reminded these types of storms can happen anywhere. Stay out of arroyos, ditches etc. where running water can become walls of water and sweep you and your vehicle away. Remember "Turn around, don't drown".

Always be informed about severe weather changes and prepare. This might include postponing a trip out. Roadway surfaces will change with the onset of rain, causing slippery conditions. Add in some of the high winds experienced and it is a recipe for danger. If you absolutely must drive in severe inclement weather, drive slower and be ever aware of traffic flow, roadway conditions, etc.

With the approaching holidays, it is well known traffic will increase with preparations for Thanksgiving, "Black Friday" and of course Christmas shopping. If traveling to Albuquerque remember the road construction on Interstate 25 which continues for at least another two years has created a major slow down of traffic and crashes are imminent. Remember to maintain a safe distance from the vehicle in front of you and keep watch in the rear view mirror for those drivers who are not paying attention and could cause a collision.

The Survey & Mapping Department and Fire Department has my permission to place new E-911 Addresses on each home located on the Pueblo of Isleta Reservation.



#### What happens when you call 911?

Hopefully you never had to call 911, but if you have, you know it can be scary and frustrating at times. First off, knowing where you call from makes a difference. If you are calling from a landline within Isleta, it will go directly to the Isleta dispatch center. If you call from a cell phone multiple things can happen depending on your location within the Pueblo; 1.) Your call could go to the POI dispatch center, 2.) Your call could go to Bernalillo County EMS or 3.) Your call could go to Valencia County EMS.

If you call from a cell phone the dispatch center will not have a location or name. So please make sure you let the operator know your name and location before you tell them what is happening. This will ensure emergency units are sent as soon as possible. If dispatch does not have this information there is no way they can dispatch emergency services quickly. If you reach an outside dispatch center, just let them know you need Isleta Dispatch and they can transfer/connect you. Also please answer all the questions dispatch has for you. It may seem mundane, but all the information is critical for Police, Fire, and EMS. Tell dispatch something distinctive about your residence. This will help ensure PD and EMS can locate your property more quickly.

Please remember dispatch is there to help you just as much as EMS, FIRE, and PD. Dispatchers of the 911 service are just as important as the rest of Emergency Services offered here on Isleta Pueblo.





#### Recap






Mexican Gothic Book Club participants at NM Escape Room.


#### FITNESS SECTION

Reminder that classes are on a first come basis, based on space availability. So please arrive early and secure your spot. We are





Keep it simple, if you do not see it on this flier throw it away in the trash. Do not use your blue recycle cart for trash or it will be confiscated. Have your cart out by 7am. For service schedule announcements check the POI newsletter & POI Facebook. (505) 869-4106

Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility. When your recyclables are bagged in colored bags they are not opened up and your material is landfilled instead of recycled. Using clear bags helps to ensure the health and safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the recycle facility. Using colored bags will result in your recycles not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.


#### **Health Beat: Moccasins vs. Shoes**

Heel drop is basically the height of the heel of your shoe. The height difference between your heel and forefoot. Many people do not realize tennis shoes frequently have built in heels.

Toe spring is the upward curve of the toe of a shoe.

This is what your foot looks like in a typical tennis shoe. Notice the heel height and your toes pointing toward the sky.



Below is an x-ray of your foot. You can see how there is not enough room for you toes in a typical tennis shoe. In a moccasin your toes fit in the shoe properly.



Heels affect other parts of your body, not just our feet. In the picture below you can see how we normally stand without a heel. How far our body leans forward with a heel and how the body has to adjust to stand straight while wearing a heel.





Fig. 1: Left, barefoot stance, 90 degree angle with perpendicular; center, if body column were rigid, on medium 2-inch heel angle is reduced to 70 degrees; right, to regain 90 degree angle on 2-inch heel, body column must make adjustments.


Shoes with toe spring and heels affect the entire body including our knees, hips and back.



Heels change the inclination of the foot, thus affecting the whole body.

Moccasins allow us to walk naturally.

- There are no differences in the height of the soles of our shoes between the heel and forefoot
- No toe spring with our toes pointing toward the sky
- Moccasins do not cause problems with our feet, knees, hips and back
- Allows the feet of children to develop normally and naturally
- With moccasins you are much less likely to develop foot deformities like bunions and hammertoes.

#### Vaccine Recommendations for the 2024-25 Respiratory Disease Season

#### COVID-19

- Everyone ages 6 months and older should get an updated 2024–2025 COVID-19 vaccine. This includes people who have received a COVID-19 vaccine before and people who have had COVID-19
- The COVID-19 vaccine helps protect you from severe disease, hospitalization, and death.
- It is especially important to get your 2024–2025 COVID-19 vaccine if you are ages 65 and older, are at high risk for severe COVID-19, live in a long-term care facility, or have never received a COVID-19 vaccine.
- Vaccine protection decreases over time, so it is important to stay up to date with your COVID-19 vaccine.
- Getting a COVID-19 vaccine is a safer, more reliable way to build protection than getting sick with COVID-19.

#### Seasonal Influenza

- Everyone 6 months of age and older should make a plan to get an updated flu vaccine.
- All U.S. flu vaccines for the 2024-2025 season are itrivalent (three component) vaccines that protect against three influenza viruses: an A(H1N1) virus, an A(H3N2) virus, and a B/Victoria virus.
- People age 65 and older and people who have received a solid organ transplant can opt to receive a "high dose" flu vaccine
- Flu vaccination can keep you from getting sick from the flu.
- Flu vaccination can also reduce the risk of hospitalization from flu as well as the severity of illness even if someone gets sick with the flu.

#### **RSV Vaccine**

- Recommended for all adults age 75 and older if they did not receive a previous RSV vaccine last season.
- Recommended for people ages 60–74 who are at increased risk of severe RSV, meaning they have certain chronic medical conditions, such as lung or heart disease, or they live in nursing homes.
- The RSV vaccine is not currently an annual vaccine, meaning people do not need to get a dose every RSV season.
- Eligible adults can get an RSV vaccine at any time, but the best time to get vaccinated is before RSV starts to spread in communities.

#### **TEMPERATURES AND FOOD SAFETY**

Improper handling of food affects millions of people each year. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), 48 million Americans become sick from food every single year. This is about 14% of the population or 1 in 7 people. Of those 48 million people, "128,000 are hospitalized and 3,000 die." One way to help reduce foodborne illnesses is to be mindful of the role temperature plays in food safety.

#### How long can I keep food out of the fridge?

According to the CDC, foods can be kept out of the fridge at room temperature for two hours. This refers to the temperature of the environment, not the food itself. Once a food is cooked or taken out of the fridge or freezer, you have two hours to consume it before putting it back into the fridge or freezer. If the food is kept at a temperature over 90°F, you only have one hour before putting it into the fridge or freezer. If you want to let the food cool down before putting it in the fridge to prevent dropping the fridge's temperature, that is okay. However, keep in mind you will need to put the food away within the 1- to 2-hour time limit.


# Why is it important to not leave foods at room temperature or high temperatures for too long?

Bacteria grow rapidly in a temperature range called the "Danger Zone." The danger zone is between 40°F and 140°F. This is why refrigerators are kept at 40°F or below. Hot-holding foods at a temperature above 140°F are also okay for feasts or gatherings.

Some facilities will send a bill to the patient but not Isleta Health Center. It is best to bring all bills in received by mail to make sure PRC contacts the facility to bill Isleta





#### 8th Annual Isleta Cancer Survivor's Day Event

Every year in June, people all over the country CELEBRATE National Cancer Survivor's Day; however, in Isleta we usually celebrate this special day on the 2nd Tuesday in May, however, due to situations beyond our control, we needed to move Cancer Survivors Day to October this year. Isleta's 8th Cancer Survivor's Day event was held on October 8th at 5pm at the Isleta Health Center Activities Center. Although it was a few months later than most, we believe any time is the right time to celebrate the cancer survivors in the community.

The evening began with beautiful music by Native Flutist, William Clark, who is Laguna/Navajo. We then had a presentation on "Cancer is Survivable" by Rachel Davis from the American Cancer Society. Then we had a few people share their experience as a Cancer Survivor, when the importance of regular checkups and cancer screenings was discussed. Cancer screening is when you check your body for cancer before you have symptoms. Along with regular cancer screenings, it is important to watch your body for symptoms and warning signs of cancer, such as:

#### **Symptoms & Warning Signs of Cancer:**

- Unexplained weight loss
- Fatigue
- Night sweats
- Loss of appetite
- A sore that does not heal.
- Unusual bleeding or discharge.
- Recurrent fever
- Enlarged lymph nodes
- Swelling in the neck
- Obvious change in a wart or mole.
- Thickening or lump in the breast or elsewhere.
- Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
- Nagging cough or hoarseness.
- New, persistent pain
- Recurrent nausea or vomiting
- Change in bowel or bladder habits (constipation/ diarrhea)/blood in urine or stool.
- Persistent bloating
- Non-healing skin blemishes

After this presentation, there was a touching presentation on St. Peregrine by Brian Earle. In 2018, Mike Abeita bestowed his mother's St. Peregrine statue upon Rose Lente. In 2019, Rose passed this onto Victoria Jojola, who was able gain comfort from it for two years due to the event being postponed in 2020 and again in 2021. Last year the Saint was passed on to Brian Earle and this year Brian passed the Saint on to Ruth Abeita. Next year she will provide St. Peregrine to someone else, as this tradition will grow and continue to provide support to Cancer Survivors in the community.

I would like to extend an open invitation to all community members to attend our monthly Isleta Health Education Presentations. We meet on the <u>2nd Tuesday of each Month</u>, usually alternating times from one month meeting 5-6:30 at the Isleta Health Center Lg Conference Room (Enter on the North Side of the Clinic) and then the following month we meet from 12:30-2pm at the Isleta Elders Center. The group meets again on November 12th at 5pm at the Isleta Health Center with a presenter to discuss Prostate Cancer. Everyone is welcome to attend our meetings. #### Diabetes Awareness Month

November is Diabetes Awareness Month. Your Isleta Health Center (IHC) Diabetes Prevention and Treatment Program (DPTP) team wants to take this opportunity to remind the community that Type 2 Diabetes is preventable. Even with a diagnosis of Type 2 Diabetes, the chronic symptoms caused by Diabetes can be prevented or managed as well. From last month's Diabetes article, as of 2021, 16% of all American Indian and Alaska Native individuals have Diabetes. From the International Diabetes Federation, there are 537 million people worldwide with Diabetes. Research done in 2023 estimated that Diabetes will more than double in the next 30 years, from 537 million people to 1.3 billion worldwide in 2050.

This month, we want to encourage you to come visit our Wellness Center behind the clinic from the hours of 8:30am – 4:30pm, Monday through Friday, this November to have your A1c screened. A1c is a nonfasting lab draw doctors use to diagnose Diabetes and to monitor how well Diabetes is being managed. While you're there, you can meet with one of our Certified Personal Trainers who would be more than happy to provide some free personal training. We also have our annual Diabetes Conference coming up on November 19th, from 9am-2pm, at the Isleta Resort and Casino.

In 2025, your IHC DPTP will be expanding the services that we provide to better accommodate the predicted increase of Diabetes and Prediabetes. We are looking for motivated individuals with Prediabetes who would be interested in participating in an intensive yearlong Diabetes Prevention Program focusing on lifestyle change. We plan to offer Diabetes Self-Management Education and Support (DSMES) classes. In the clinic, we will begin offering more intensive Diabetes Education and counseling for people with Diabetes or Prediabetes. We hope to increase nutrition and healthy cooking classes throughout the community. We will also be unveiling updates and new services at our Wellness Center, which is now open to all of Isleta, not just to those with Diabetes. # The Diabetes Prevention & Treatment Program will be hosting a month long Diabetes A1c Screening Event

Who should be screened?

1. Any adult 35+

- 2. Testing should be considered for overweight adults (18+), those with a BMI >25, with one or more of the following risk factors
- a. First degree relative with Diabetes
- b. High-risk race and ethnicity(African American, Latino, Native American, Asian American, Pacific Islander)
- c. History of cardiovascular disease
- d. Elevated blood pressure
- e. Low HDL cholesterol and/or elevated triglycerides f. Individuals with PolyCystic Ovarian Syndrome (PCOS) g. Individuals who do not exercise or have a sedentary
- People with Prediabetes should be screened yearly.
   People who were diagnosed with Gestational Diabetes.
- (GDM) should be tested every 3 years.
- People with HIV, exposure to high-risk medicines(like chronic steroids), history of pancreatitis
- Youth (onset of puberty or after 10 years of age) who are over 85%ile BMI and have one or more risk factors.
   Maternal history of Diabetes or GDM during child's
- gestation
  b. -Family history of Diabetes first- or second-degree
- c. -High-risk race and ethnicity(African American, Latino, Native American, Asian American, Pacific Islander)

If screening results are normal, testing should be repeated at a minimum of 3-year intervals. More frequent testing dependent on initial results and risk status.



#### Supporting Your Mental Health During the Holidays

#### From B'eeh K'oo-ee Wellness Center

In a 2014 survey conducted by the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), researchers found that 64% of people diagnosed with a mental illness experienced worsening symptoms during the holidays. While some may find the holidays to be a mostly joyful time, it might be a mixed time for many of us, even if we haven't been diagnosed with a mental illness.

Here are some tips on how you can take care of your mental health during the holiday season:

- 1. Check in with yourself regularly. Ask yourself how you're feeling. If you're not feeling 100% joyful and happy, that's okay. Feeling down or sad during the holidays is normal for many people. Noticing our feelings and emotions is the first step to taking care of ourselves.
- 2. **Develop a plan.** Make a plan for when you're feeling stressed, lonely, or sad. It's important to make this plan when you feel "ok," that way the plan is ready for when you're not feeling very good. Ask yourself: What usually helps me feel better?
- 3. **Connect with Community.** For many, being with trusted loved ones (even if you're not talking about your feelings) can help us feel better. Ask yourself: Who helps me feel better when I'm down? Who is a positive influence?
- Avoid alcohol and drugs. Sometimes people use substances because it makes them feel better in the short-term. For example, someone might use alcohol to feel less stressed or to "get through" something. However, immediate effects include decreased inhibitions (which can cause us to do or say things we wouldn't normally do or say) and potential risky behaviors like driving while under the influence. Once immediate effects have worn off, substances (including alcohol) cause increased depression, stress in relationships, and health problems. Alcohol especially affects the brain's ability to get deep sleep, which makes emotional regulation more difficult. Check in on those around you who are in recovery or who are struggling with substance use to see how you might be able to support them.
- 5. **Know when to ask for help.** If you're experiencing ongoing low mood, difficulty sleeping, decreased or increased appetite, difficulty concentrating, or anything that makes you feel like you're not yourself, reach out for help. Don't wait for symptoms to get worse.
