Governor's Report

Maguwam,

I hope all is well with everyone in our community, I hope everyone is in good health and spirits. Whew, it is hot outside with temperatures reaching 100 degrees. I want remind everyone to hydrate and make sure you are drinking plenty of water. I would like to again, remind everyone to be safe during this summer season. Keep a look out for one and another and talk to someone when you are having a hard time, we as a community are here for everyone. I would like to take a moment to honor our late former Governor Max Zuni, he passed at his home on June 11th as he was battling cancer. Governor Zuni retired from Honeywell is 2003. Shortly, after retirement he was appointed 1st Lt. Governor in 2005, while he served with Jose R. Benavidez, Governor Zuni dedicated himself to the Pueblo of Isleta for many years after his first term in office. We will forever remember him as the Governor with his sense of humor, and his offerings of candy. He will forever hold a memory in our hearts and as he would say, "I want everyone to be happy"!

At the tail end of May, Lieutenant Governor Jojola and I participated in a tribal consultation session hosted at SIPI. We provided comments on behalf of the Pueblo advocating against federal funding cuts and in favor of hiring more BIE staff. The Pueblo will be submitting detailed written comments in early July.

On June 10th and 11th Lieutenant Governor Jojola and I attended the 2025 State Tribal Leaders Summit & Governmentto-Government Indian Education Summit alongside DOE. The discussions were productive and the New Mexico Public Education Department was receptive to the Tribes' asks for continued support for culturally responsive education and services and programming that supports student success.

Later this month I will be meeting with Terry Sloan, Intergovernmental Tribal Liaison and staff from the City of Albuquerque. I look forward to discussing issues of mutual concern with the City. I would like to introduce M. Rodney Jones our 2nd Lt. Governor to serve our community. We are happy he has accepted this role; he is a former POI employee who served as Chief Judge for a 2-year term. He comes to us with many years of experience and we are excited to see great things happen for our community.

I would like to thank everyone who assisted with the preparations for our Governor's Feast celebrated on June 21, 2025. A special thank you to our families, friends and our POI departments who came together for us. Ha-wuh! I would like to also remind everyone of our upcoming Feast Day-St. Kateri Tekakwitha on July 14, 2025. We hope to see you there.

Cochiti Apple

On Isleta Earth day, Shi-Whif-Tui' was fortunate to have been gifted thirty-five apple tree saplings from Cochiti Pueblo. Their journey to Isleta began after a conversation I had with Kirsten Cuevas, a Healthy Soil Expert and employee of the Pueblo of Cochiti. Excitedly I, now the second Lt. Governor, explained my mission to propagate cuttings from what I believed was a wild apple tree in our Bosque. My efforts were inspired by Fee-oh (Herman Lente), a friend and colleague, who told me stories about picking apples from the Bosque during his childhood. He recollected traveling with his family on horse and wagon to collect firewood in the winter, plucking sweet red apples along the way.

A few weeks after our talk, Kirsten called me back to put me in contact with Cochiti Department of Natural Resources (DNR) director, Earl Conway. I met with Earl and he explained how Cochiti had reclaimed a portion of their ancestral lands that included the Dixon Apple orchards. He and his team were in the process of propagating some of the orchard's original trees and he said they would likely be able to give some to our Pueblo in the coming weeks. I reached out to Governor Jiron who then pointed me to Bosque Restoration Manager, Te-de' (Marcelino Zuni), with whom I shared my vision of repopulating the Bosque with apple trees. Te-de' exclaimed "I'm all in". We started to discuss obstacles we would have to contend with, but then he stopped and said, "let's just make it happen".

Isleta Youth Council Chair Llur-pa-thlu also joined in on our project. Once our team was established, a date was set to move forward with this exciting endeavor.

When the day to plant the saplings arrived, we were blessed to be in the company of Former Cochiti Pueblo Pete Herrera, eight TEFS students, representatives from the Isleta Youth Council, and Tede's Bosque restoration crew. Kristen was onsite to give the green light for the spot's soil and moisture content. Pete and Earl were present to demonstrate how to dig holes, trim roots and plant our new trees. Our eager young people then got to work. In total, twenty-five Cochiti apple trees (Dixon) and ten Honey Crisp apple trees made it into the ground in an hour and a half. It was a wonderful experience. Later that day I received a text from Kirsten that read, "thank you today was a good day for my soul."

Thank you for all entities that made this happen for our people here in Tui'. With our Great Spirits Blessings, these trees will grow and produce fruit for you and future

generations. Special BIG SHOUT OUT to Kirsten Cuevas from Sublime Farms in Valencia County who shared my vision with Cochiti and made this happen.



We then linked up with Los Lunas Schools Native American Liaison, Llur-pa-whew (Tinesha Howard) who coordinated a group of students belonging to the Tribal Exchange for Food Sovereignty (TEFS).



LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for August Newsletter articles is set for Tuesday, July 22, 2025, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to <u>Nathaniel.Lujan@</u> <u>isletapueblo.com</u>. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case # and 4) Date of Court Date. CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items which can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160 character limit. Ads that exceed the 160 characters will NOT be submitted into the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their own ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their own flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event where the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say of all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

From the Cultural and Historic Preservation Department: Early Days of Pottery Mound

Since 2012, when Isleta received ownership of the ancestral Tiwa pueblo of Pottery Mound from the University of New Mexico (UNM), the Isleta Department of Cultural and Historic Preservation (DCHP) has worked to understand the pueblo's occupation history, and how its inhabitants utilized the landscape around them. In a recent piece for this newsletter, we presented project results that show how the pueblo was occupied into the mid-1500s and how it was visited by one or more Spanish parties during that time. Today, we'll go back another 300 years to look at when and how the pueblo came into being.

Pottery Mound is famous for the many different ceramics that can be seen all over the site. By forms, styles, and raw materials, archaeologists can date the bulk of these ceramics to the 1300s and 1400s. The 1400s were the heyday of Pottery Mound; this was when the pueblo had the most inhabitants in its entire history. Far less visible are ceramics dating from the pueblo's founding years. There are several reasons for this. First, the people who established Pottery Mound were few in number, perhaps no more than half a dozen families, and left few ceramics. Second, the area where early ceramics have been found since the 1950s is small, and much of that area has been destroyed by the Rio Puerco. Third, the surviving remains of the earliest settlement are buried under later room blocks and are inaccessible for study.

Despite these challenges, it is possible to identify the location of this earliest settlement under the north-central part of the pueblo. The early ceramics from this area date from between 1100 and 1300. This ceramic evidence and the layering of structural remains suggest that the pueblo was founded around 1100-1200 and remained just a hamlet for about a century. Then, at some point around 1300, the population began to increase significantly. The reasons for this are not clear; however, it appears that some other, smaller sites around Pottery Mound were abandoned during that time, and that the inhabitants of those sites moved to Pottery Mound. Why? That's a question that can never be answered for certain, but perhaps it was because of Pottery Mound's location close to the Rio Puerco. Even when running intermittently, the Puerco would have been a more reliable source of water than the small tributary streams along which those smaller sites were located.

Cultural surveys by the Isleta DCHP of the lands surrounding Pottery Mound preserve information and fill in the map of Ancestral Tiwa settlement as it was before Pottery Mound became the most prominent pueblo in the area. But erosion and human activities endanger many sites in the Puerco Valley, Pottery Mound included.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPT: UPCOMING PROJECT LOCATING WATER SERVICE LINES

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is providing assistance, at no cost to the Pueblo and Tribal Members, to locate and identify select water service lines at residential properties. This is work following the Lead Service Line Inventory that occurred months ago. Areas where water lines noted in the inventories as "unknown" need to be investigated and documented. Public Works Department The Annual Consumer Confidence Reports (CCR's) will be available by the end of June. Watch your mailbox for the postcard with the information on how to access the reports.

EPA's contractor, ERG, will begin the first steps in the process to investigate the water service lines that are categorized as "unknown". ERG will first solicit and procure contractors to work with the Pueblo on Community Outreach, line location activities, and if needed, excavation of the water lines to obtain information on the type of piping installed from the shut-off to the home.

Once this work is completed, homeowners will be informed of what kind of piping is serving their residence. If it is Lead, educational materials will be provided. Any lead service lines noted will be added to a list for future replacement.

Johns Hopkins, located in Baltimore, Maryland, is recognized globally as a leader in nursing education, research, and practice, and is currently ranked #1 among graduate nursing schools in the United States. Phoebe graduated on May 20, 2025, from what is known as the most innovative nursing graduate program in the country.

Phoebe is committed to serving Indian Country and will seek a Labor and Delivery position within the Indian Health Service (IHS) or a Tribal Health Care system. Her dedication to improving healthcare outcomes for Native communities reflects her deep-rooted commitment to service and cultural preservation.

Her parents shared, "Tribal leaders at the national level are always advocating for nurses and physicians, and now we have one—a home-grown nurse. Phoebe will be giving back to Indian Country by working in one of the Tribal or IHS systems. We are extremely proud of our daughter and know she will be an amazing leader in Indian Country. This is just the beginning of her journey in the healthcare field." Phoebe's accomplishment is a celebration not only for her family but for the broader Native community as she takes this important step in advancing Indigenous health and representation in the medical field.




The United States Air Force (USAF), United States Space Force (USSF), Kirtland Air Force Base (AFB), Air Force Research Laboratory (AFRL) announce the availability of a Draft Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA) addressing the continuation of research, development, test, and evaluation (RDT&E) activities on Kirtland Air Force Base (AFB), New Mexico. The Draft PEA was prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations, and USAF instructions implementing NEPA.


The Draft PEA describes the AFRL proposal to evaluate potential environmental impacts associated with continuing to conduct RDT&E activities on Kirtland AFB, New Mexico. AFRL has been conducting RDT&E activities on Kirtland AFB since the 1960s and there are many existing Environmental Assessments and Environmental Impact Analysis Process documents spanning the decades from 1970 to present day. The Proposed Action consolidates all current and proposed future AFRL RDT&E activities into one PEA, ensuring these activities can continue to occur on Kirtland AFB into the future. Two units of AFRL conduct these activities, ARFL's Directed Energy Directorate (AFRL/RD) and AFRL's Space Vehicle Directorate (AFRL/RV). AFRL/RD develops directed energy weapons (including high energy lasers, high-power microwave, and high-power electromagnetic system prototypes) to counter, disable, and attack adversary sources. Equipment, components, and designs for war fighter weapons are created and tested in laboratories across Kirtland AFB before being tested outdoors at the High Energy Research and Technology Facility (HERTF)/HERTF Canyon, Frustration Canyon, Starfire Optical Range/1-Mile and 2-Mile sites, and Outdoor Laser Propagation and Firing Area to evaluate performance of the new technology. AFRL/RV ensures that the United States and its allies maintain space superiority by developing and transitioning technologies that provide space-based capabilities to the nation. Equipment, components, and designs for spacebased technologies are created in laboratories across Kirtland AFB and then tested outdoors at the Skywave Technology Laboratory, Improved Solar Observing Optical Network, and

South Park Antenna Field.

The Draft PEA evaluates potential impacts on the environment from the Proposed Action and the No Action Alternative. The Draft PEA demonstrates that the Proposed Action would not significantly impact the environment and based on this analysis, AFRL has prepared a Draft Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI).

At times, parents are also forgetting to go to the school webpage and click on the "Report an absence" link to report their student's absence. In most cases, after talking with parents and the parents contacting the school, these absences have been cleared up. 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ISLETA POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

JULY - 2025



was June 20, 2025 but the heat was here several days before that. Last month's newsletter warned of the dangers of heat and leaving children and pets in vehicles.

According to *Kids and Car Safety:*

This year, at least six children in the US have died after being left in hot cars. These incidents, which have occurred in multiple states, highlight the ongoing risk of vehicular heatstroke for children.

Details:

Recent Incidents: •

• March 18, 2025: A 4-month-old boy in Lakewood, New Jersey, died after being unknowingly left in a vehicle.

• May 7, 2025: A 2-year-old girl in Silver Spring, Maryland, died after being unknowingly left in a vehicle.

• May 10, 2025: A 6-year-old boy in Paso Robles, California, died after being left in a vehicle.

• May 25, 2025: A 1-year-old boy in Albuquerque, New Mexico, died after being left in a vehicle.

• June 8, 2025: A 21-month-old girl in Hammond, Louisiana, died after being left in a vehicle.

• June 9, 2025: A 7-month-old girl in Hamlet, North Carolina, died after being unknowingly left in a vehicle.

Important to note:

On average, nearly 40 children die in hot cars each year in the United States.

Since 1990, over 1,127 children have died in hot cars in the US, with at least another 7,500 surviving with varying degrees of injury.

More than half of the deaths (55%) are children under 2 years old.

How to prevent these tragic situations:

Never leave a child unattended in a vehicle, even for a short time.

Make it a habit to check the back seat every time you exit the vehicle.

Place a personal item in the back seat as a reminder (e.g., purse, phone,

employee badge). Notify your childcare provider if

The first day of summer ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. -

left inside a hot car at a Walmart in Albuquerque on Memorial Day.

According to court documents, police responded to the Walmart store on Carlisle Boulevard and Claremont Avenue in northeast Albuquerque. When officers arrived, they found a security vehicle blocking the car from leaving the store. Police say in court documents they found Michael Clohessy in the driver's seat of the vehicle with a 6-year-old in a car seat in the back.

<u>14 children have died in hot cars in</u> New Mexico since 1990

Court documents say security officers at the store were flagged by a customer who told them a child was in a vehicle with no adult around. Officers then went to the vehicle and found the child in the backseat. Security also noted the vehicle was turned off with no keys in the ignition.

Police interviewed Clohessy after they arrived. Court documents say he went to the Walmart store for items to change the oil in his vehicle. He told police that he was in town visiting his son. Court documents say Clohessy told police he left the child alone in the car with the car turned off and without the keys. He told police he took the keys with him, saying, "It's Albuquerque."

Police say in court documents that the responding officer explained the dangers of leaving a child in a vehicle unattended. Documents say Clohessy told police, "Ya, I know a child just died." Police believe he was referring to the **<u>1-year-old who</u>** recently died inside a hot car.

Court documents say Clohessy told officers he left the child in the car because his son did not want to go inside and Clohessy was going into and out of the store.

Clohessy was arrested and charged with child abuse with great bodily harm. The penalties that can result are as follows:

Penalties for Child Abuse

The penalties for child abuse in New Mexico vary based on the severity and circumstances of the abuse:

Third-Degree Felony: For first offenses that do not result in great bodily harm.

Second-Degree Felony: For ٠

A 6-year-old child was rescued after being If you see a child or an animal alone in a vehicle, call 911 immediately.

your child does not arrive at daycare as scheduled.

Teach children that vehicles are not play areas.

Consider using technology like rearseat reminder systems or apps that can alert you to a child being in the back seat.

As we all know, people treat pets as part of the family, so in that sense, don't leave them alone in a warm/heated vehicle. What happens to a human in a heated vehicle also affects our furry friends as well. Taking "Bandit" on a ride with you, only to be left alone in a vehicle, is impractical and your furry friend is better off left at home. Keep in mind be it a child or a pet, legal repercussions that can be faced:

second and subsequent offenses or if the abuse results in great bodily harm.

First-Degree Felony: If the abuse results in the child's death or if intentional abuse is inflicted on a child under twelve years of age.

Leaving a pet in a hot car in New Mexico can have consequences:

<u>It is a *petty misdemeanor*</u> punishable by up to 90 days in jail or a <u>\$500 fine.</u>

If the animal was in distress, suffered injuries, or died, it can be considered animal cruelty.

Leaving an animal in a hot car can lead to *fatal heatstroke*.

Some states have specific laws penalizing hot car offenses

Route 208 features three northbound trips arriving at the ATC at 9:30am. 11:00am and 1:30pm, and three southbound trips departing the ATC at 9:35am, 11:05am and 1:32pm. At the ATC, riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes.

Route 208 serves two bus stops on the Pueblo of Isleta. The stop closest to the village proper is located I on NM 147 just east of the Rio Grande Bridge.



Please do not park and leave vehicles unattended on the adjoining roads near this stop, as the bus and other vehicles use these roads to turnaround and access other locations. Route 208 also stops at the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station, where riders can transfer to the Isleta Resort and Casino shuttle. Because the bus serves the station, riders can also consider using Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque in the mid-morning and returning by train in the evening.

Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride (No Fares until further notice!)

The Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride operates Monday through Friday from 8:15am to 2:45pm, providing trips within the Pueblo and to the ABQ RIDE Route 53 bus stop on NM 314. Service to places like Smiths, Albertsons and Wal-Mart in Los Lunas is also provided with requests made before noon at least one business day prior to your trip.

Request your Dial-a-Ride trip by calling Valencia County dispatch at (505) 352-3595 before noon at least one business day prior to your trip. Requests are accepted between 5:00am and 3:00pm Monday thru Friday. On the date and time of your trip, a wheelchair accessible van will arrive within 15 minutes of your scheduled pickup time. Trips may also be grouped together; riders should expect to travel with others.

About Route 208

Bus route 208 provides three northbound and three southbound trips morning/midday between Valencia County, the Pueblo of Isleta, and Downtown Albuquerque when the Rail Runner does not operate. Riders are encouraged to use Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, by taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque midday and returning by train in the evening. Weekdays only.

All of our buses and trains are ADA compliant and are equipped with wheelchair lifts or ramps.




According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) there are about 4 million births in the U.S. each year. For those births, cord blood is collected only 5-10% of the time. Cord blood is derived from the umbilical cord and placenta after birth. It can easily be extracted for use. Parents who are interested should check with their provider to see if the hospital offers cord blood banking.

Cord blood can be donated to public cord banks, which store it for free and use it to help many people. Private blood banking is also available to help individuals related to the child who are also in need.

Tai Chi for Health



Recently, staff at the Isleta Health Center and the Elder Center went through a Tai Chi for Health Institute workshop and became certified instructors in Tai Chi for Fall Prevention and Arthritis Prevention. Training was sponsored by the Albuquerque Area Southwest Tribal Epidemiology Center.

Tai chi is an art that embraces the mind, body and spirit. With origins in ancient China, Tai Chi is one of the most effective exercises for health of mind and body. Although an art with great depth of knowledge and skill, it can be easy to learn and soon delivers its health benefits. On a physical level, Tai Chi can improve strength, flexibility, aerobic conditioning and balance. Research has shown that it improves cardiovascular fitness, lowers blood pressure, prevent falls and helps people who have arthritis. It can be performed standing or sitting and can be adapted for all individuals. The Health Center will soon be starting a 16 class Tai Chi program which will then transition to regular tai chi classes in the future.

Isleta National Diabetes Prevention Program




As of May 2025, the Health Center's Diabetes Prevention and Treatment Program (DPTP) was recognized by the CDC to prevent or delay type 2 diabetes. It is the only tribal organization in New Mexico with CDC recognition. The program, which has been heavily researched in the Diabetes Prevention Program

Outcomes Study (DPPOS), has shown that participants who complete the program can prevent or delay type 2 diabetes for at least 15 years. The research also shows that the program is more effective than medications at preventing type 2 diabetes.

The National DPP lifestyle change program can help you build healthy new habits that last a lifetime. The program runs for one year. During the first 4-6 months of the program, you'll meet about once a week. During the 2nd half of the program, you'll meet once or twice a month. Making lifestyle changes is an ongoing process. Staying in the program for the full year is essential to help you stick to new habits and avoid slipping back into old habits. If you have not reached your goals in the first half of the program, your Lifestyle Coach and other group members can help you succeed.

In the first half of the program, you'll learn to:

- Eat healthy without giving up all the foods you love.
- Add physical activity to your life, even if you don't



- think you have time.
- Deal with stress.
- Cope with challenges that can slow your progress, like choosing healthy food when eating out.

In the second half of the program, you'll enhance the skills you've learned so you can maintain the changes you've made. These sessions will review key ideas such as tracking your food and physical activity, setting goals, staying motivated, and overcoming barriers. Your Lifestyle Coach and the group will continue to support you. You'll learn some new information, too.


