



LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for December Newsletter articles is set for Monday, November 10, 2025, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel.Lujan@ isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case #, and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items that can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160-character limit. Ads that exceed the 160-characters will NOT be submitted to the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event that the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say in all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.

<u>Construction Project Notification – Isleta Diversion</u> <u>Dam Sluiceway and East Bank Modifications Project</u>

The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, in coordination with the Pueblo of Isleta and the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District, will construct modifications to the Isleta Diversion Dam (IDD) and the east bank of the Rio Grande with the goal of reducing the amount of sediment flowing into the Peralta Main Canal. The project will build a new concrete floor in the Peralta Sluiceway, automate several dam and sluiceway gates, and realign the east bank of the river just upstream of the IDD.

Construction is currently scheduled from: <u>November 19, 2025 –</u> <u>February 25, 2026</u>

The project site is located on the east side of the Rio Grande, south of the NM-147 bridge, on Tribal Road 21. Some traffic control may be required on NM-147 at the turnoff to Tribal Road 21.

^{*}Water quality samples are collected on a monthly basis from the Rio Grande. Two irrigation sample locations are collected during the growing season. There was no water in the Butte Lateral on the date of collection in September.

The Pueblo of Isleta's most stringent surface water quality standard for *E. coli* bacteria is 88 MPN/100 ml at all times and at all flow rates.

Please watch signage at the NM 147 bridge for surface water quality advisory.

Due to high levels of *E. coli*, Governor issued an Executive Order on August 13, 2025 to protect the health and safety of our community members. Until further notice, there is to be no swimming and no fishing in the Rio Grande.

The Pueblo's drinking water supply is safe and water in Isleta Lakes is clean.

TIME TO PREPARE FOR THE COLD

Colder temperatures are here and it's time to protect your plumbing from freezing temperatures. Sewer piping can freeze – especially underneath a modular home. Take time now to check your water and sewer lines. Any exposed water or sewer pipe should be protected with heat tape, insulation or other means to help prevent the pipes from freezing. If you have a modular home, please ensure the skirting is in good condition and if there is no skirting, do what you can to protect the underside of the home from the cold.

Swamp coolers should be properly winterized. The water supply line should be removed from the spigot or frost free and drained. Frost frees should not be left in the open position; remove any hoses from the frost free and close the frost free. When left open, the frost free cannot drain the water that is inside the unit. The frost free is designed to drain itself when the handle is put in the closed position, which should help prevent freezing.

Homeowners should know where the main water shut off is to their residence. Most homes have an interior and exterior main shut off valve. Toilets and sinks should have isolation valves going directly to the fixture. The purpose of the fixture isolation valves is to isolate just the fixture that has a leak, allowing water to be available at the other fixtures in the home. Have you ever tested these isolation valves to ensure they work? Take time before cold weather moves in to locate these valves and ensure they are working properly.

There should be a main isolation valve located both inside and outside of the home. Many of the interior main shut-off valves are located close to the hot water heater. Shutting this valve down will stop water from entering the home but you will still have water available outside the home. If it is necessary to shut off the water outside the home, knowing exactly where your shut-off valve is, is vital.

Locating the exterior isolation valve may be challenging. Take time to locate your exterior shutoff while it is not an emergency. Placing a marker of some type near the shut-off will save time in the event you do have an emergency and need the main water to the home shut-off. It will take Public Works time to respond to an emergency water leak, especially after hours or on weekends. If you know where the main shut-off valve is, Public Works employees can arrive and work immediately on shutting off the water to the home. If they need to first locate the shut-off, valuable time is lost and water damage to the home may occur.

Be prepared and protect your water and sewer pipes from the cold. Check the isolation valves at each fixture and know how to turn off your water in an emergency. Locate and mark the location of your exterior water shut-off device.



The Federal Clean Water Act (CWA) Section 404 authorizes discharges of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States. The US Army Corps of Engineers issues nationwide permits (NWP) for specific types of projects. The current NWPs will expire on March 14, 2026. The Pueblo is within a six-month reasonable period of time that ends December 18, 2025 to act on the Army Corps' certification request. More information on nationwide permits is available online at:

Protecting Elders: The Safety of COVID and Flu Vaccines

Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 and influenza is very important for older adults. These vaccines help protect people from getting very sick, going to the hospital, or even passing away from these diseases. Staying up to date with vaccines helps keep elders, families, and the whole community safe.

Some people worry about feeling sick after getting a vaccine. It is normal to have mild side effects like a sore arm, tiredness, or a low fever. These are signs that the body is building protection. Feeling a little sick after a vaccine is not the same as having the actual disease. The vaccine cannot give you COVID-19 or the flu. These side effects usually go away in a day or two.

Getting vaccinated is one of the best ways to protect yourself and others. Elders are at higher risk for serious problems from COVID-19 and flu, but vaccines make these illnesses much less dangerous. By getting vaccinated, you help protect your family, your friends, and your community.

Staying healthy helps everyone, and vaccines are a safe and effective way to do that. If you have questions about vaccines or want to schedule your COVID or Flu vaccine for the 2025-2026 winter season, contact Isleta Health Center Medical Clinic at 505-869-4385. Transit Services Now Serving the Pueblo of Isleta

The Pueblo of Isleta and the Rio Metro Regional Transit District Working Together

Bus Route 208 (No Fares until further notice!)

Bus Route 208 connects the Pueblo of Isleta and Valencia County communities to the Alvarado Transportation Center (ATC) in Downtown Albuquerque during the morning/midday when the Rail Runner does not operate. Route 208 features three northbound trips arriving at the ATC at 9:30am, 11:00am and 1:30pm, and three southbound trips departing the ATC at 9:35am, 11:05am and 1:32pm. At the ATC, riders can transfer to ABQ RIDE bus routes.

Route 208 serves two bus stops on the Pueblo of Isleta. The stop closest to the village proper is located on NM 147 just east of the Rio Grande Bridge. Please do not park and leave vehicles unattended on the adjoining roads near this stop, as the bus and other vehicles use these roads to turnaround and access other locations. Route 208 also stops at the Isleta Pueblo Rail Runner Station, where riders can transfer to the Isleta Resort and Casino shuttle. Because the bus serves the station, riders can also consider using Route 208 in combination with the Rail Runner, for example, taking the bus to Downtown Albuquerque in the mid-morning and returning by train in the evening.

Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride (No Fares until further notice!)

The Pueblo of Isleta Dial-a-Ride operates Monday through Friday from 8:15am to 2:45pm, providing trips within the Pueblo and to the ABQ RIDE Route 53 bus stop on NM 314. Service to places like Smiths, Albertsons and Wal-Mart in Los Lunas is also provided with requests made before noon at least one business day prior to your trip.

Request your Dial-a-Ride trip by calling Valencia County dispatch at (505) 352-3595 before noon at least one business day prior to your trip. Requests are accepted between 5:00am and 3:00pm Monday thru Friday. On the date and time of your trip, a wheelchair accessible van will arrive within 15 minutes of your scheduled pickup time. Trips may also be grouped together; riders should expect to travel with others.



Made from homegrown round gourds, each gourd is cleaned of seeds and fiber, then boiled in cedar water. The handles are made of cedar, smoothed with sandpaper to soften the shape and accentuate natural coloring. White leather straps are then placed at the top, middle, and end of handle. The handle is secured by a pin at the top to hold it in place.

We are planning to rotate the displays in the next couple of months. Be on the lookout for a call for artists in the future.

Principal Message

Dear Isleta Learning Community,

I hope everyone is doing well. One of the focus areas recently has been to prepare for an upcoming school accreditation review on December 2, 2025, of the Bureau of Indian Education Albuquerque ERC, which IES is a part of. This involved our parents/guardians, staff, and students (grades 3-5) taking a Cognia Climate and Culture Survey and observing student centered learning and engagement with the classrooms using the Eleot observation tool.

Highlights of the parent/guardian and student surveys are below, which will be discussed and further explored by IES staff. The ERC leaders spent some time analyzing the data of all schools and set goals and actions based on the data.

Glows: Parents/guardians (83% or 5 of 6) feel IES is respectful, safe, and welcoming. Students (89% 39 of 44) described their teachers as caring and being happy at school (66% or 29 of 44).

Grows: Fewer parents (34% or 4 of 6) feel they have opportunities to share opinions about learning activities and have lessons that prepare students for the future. Students (52% or 23 of 44) described being tired at school and being bored (32% or 14 of 44).

IES also held its first Parent Teacher Organization meeting on Oct. 8 from 5:30-7:00 pm. We had a productive meeting with the four parents/guardians who attended. Our PTO members completed a form that noted how they would like to assist our students and staff, and we discussed how our parents/guardians could assist with activities/events like at the school Feast Day on November 14th. Ms. Zuni will be sending out a notice soon for a second PTO meeting, which can be attended virtually as well.

It was great to see our parents/guardians at Parent-Teacher conferences as we are excited about gains our students have made, academically and with their social skills.

Overall, October has been a productive and exciting month. We're proud of all the growth and effort our third graders have shown!









The illegal narcotics game does filter on to Pueblo Lands and we ask everyone to be aware of this fact. Our Pueblo participated in a drug public service announcement recently on one of the television stations. It is important not to take this lightly as it is a problem everywhere. Below is an article published last year. Please read and take it to heart as the illegal narcotics game is constantly changing and adulterants are being used in various narcotics making them much more dangerous and lethal.

New drugs increasing presence in New Mexico brings even more threats to opioid epidemic

Xylazine, often sold to veterinary offices under the brand name Rompun from Bayer, has been increasingly used as an adulterant in opioids across the U.S., and an advocacy group in Albuquerque says it has made its way to here in the Land of Enchantment. It carries a host of negative side-effects, some of which can be life-threatening, or cause the loss of a limb due to infection.

Staff with a nonprofit in Albuquerque say they've seen a recent rise in the use of a dangerous animal tranquilizer as an adulterant in street drugs in New Mexico, and it brings a host of potential issues to an already deadly epidemic.

While xylazine, sometimes called tranq, is regularly used in veterinary offices as a sedative and pain reliever in animals, the <u>FDA says</u> in humans it can have several dangerous side-effects including extremely low blood pressure, sedation, severe withdrawal, and wounds that can become necrotic, which is rotting human flesh.

Ashley Charzuk with the New Mexico Harm Reduction Collaborative said her organization saw a sudden increase in the drug's presence starting in mid-May.

She says the tranquilizer is being used as an adulterant, or cutting agent, in other drugs.

"We never see xylazine by itself, or at least hardly ever, and here in New Mexico we've never seen it alone," she said.

When drug dealers or wholesalers are trying to maximize profits, they will cut the main drug of choice with a bulking product to increase yield. They will then add another drug, in this case xylazine, to increase the now weaker product's potency.

In New Mexico, Charzuk says xylazine has only shown up in a brown powder sold as fentanyl powder or heroin, even though the powder contains no actual heroin.

"We usually get around five to seven samples of that specific powder, like that brown powder," she said, "and I know that from the last quarter, three out of seven samples had xylazine"

That's a nearly 43% positive test rate.

Charzuk says the New Mexico Department of Health first confirmed the drug's presence in the state in samples taken in February, though it wasn't <u>announced</u> until later. The delay was caused by an error, where the positive test for Xylazine was missed by the harm reduction collaborative. In response to the positive test, the DOH distributed xylazine testing strips to harm reduction programs and community health offices statewide. They're also providing additional training and resources.

Usually people are unaware the tranquilizer is in their supply of drugs, which can cause them to unexpectedly pass into a deep sleep from which they cannot be woken. This is an especially dangerous problem for people living on the streets.

"They often will wake up and maybe they've been robbed, or maybe they've been assaulted, or they've fallen asleep in an area that is in direct sunlight and they've got extreme burns," she said.

Because of the tranquilizer's strong sedative effects, it can complicate overdose reversal. Even after receiving a dose of Narcan, people will still be asleep. In those cases, Charzuk says the best thing to do is not to rush to another dose of Narcan, but to confirm the victim is breathing, and if not, to perform rescue breathing, and put them in the recovery position.

"Which means on their side with their leg crooked and their arm crooked, so that way they cannot turn over onto their stomach and they cannot turn over onto their back," she said.

Xylazine constricts the blood vessels, known as vasoconstriction, which contributes to the wounds for which the drug is so infamous. Charzuk says the wounds don't necessarily appear at injection sites, like traditional abscesses associated with intravenous

drug usage. Instead, they often appear "downwind" of the injection, often where a small scrape might be.

"You add vasoconstriction to that, the healing process is now going to be much longer," she said. "It's going to be much more difficult for oxygen to get to the wound, and for white blood cells to get to the wound."

Dr. Anjali Taneja, the executive director of Casa De Salud, a harm reduction program and medical provider in Albuquerque's South Valley, said xylazine wounds generally require medical intervention to be properly treated.

"If someone has been taking care of a wound and it's not getting better, that's definitely a sign to urgently get care, and if that's at an outpatient center, or if that's in an emergency room, I think the access to care is really important," Taneja said.

Charzuk agrees that the wounds are more difficult to treat, but also says the wounds get such a bad reputation because they tend to be worse on people experiencing homelessness.

She says for people living in houses, who get the right equipment, which her organization provides, to take proper care of the wound, it can heal up well.

But for people living outdoors without access to running water, or proper light, who live in less than sterile situations... "Chances are the wound is going to grow," Charzuk said, "and it's going to need some kind of medical help and antibiotics.

Both Charzuk and Taneja say New Mexico is not prepared to deal with another large-scale drug epidemic. Charzuk says while providers and harm reduction advocates knew the drug would make its way to the land of enchantment, most thought there was at least several more months to prepare. Taneja says more services and a wider range of services are necessary to fight the encroachment of more and more dangerous drugs.

"Our city, county, state government systems have not put enough innovation and infrastructure into best meeting the needs of people who are using drugs," Taneja said, "and this only multiplies that effect, both for people who are using drugs and for their families."

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, Xylazine gets into the hands of drug manufacturers, wholesalers, and dealers in both a powder form that comes from China, and a liquid form rerouted from veterinary supply chains

The drug has been spreading across the United States for over a year now according to the DEA.

Organizations such as Bernalillo County's detox, the CARE campus, Presbyterian Health Group and the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office, as well as other official sources, said they were not able to confirm an increase in xylazine, though some of them did confirm they had heard accounts of its increased presence.

But Charzuk says her organization, which does direct harm-reduction work with people using drugs, including mobile outreach to people living on the street, is one of the only places in the state doing the sort of testing that can confirm xylazine's presence. "They're not in a position where they work with actual drug checking, or actual lab confirmations," she said. "The only reason we have this knowledge is because of the fact that the department of health has a drug checking program that actually allows us to go out into the community, collect substances, get them confirmed."

Charzuk says her organization provides several drug checking options, Such as collecting samples to send out to the UNC Chapel Hill, for more information on drug testing contact the collaborative or the NMDOH Harm Reduction Team.

Moreover, Charzuk says they have seen growing incidents of xylazine wounds, and more and more reports from people on the streets of drug users falling into a sleep from which they can't be woken. They were even able to go back and track the drug's progress moving south from Colorado into northern New Mexico, and then Albuquerque.

Now that xylazine is confirmed to be here, and shows signs of growing, Taneja says we need to invest in ways to keep drug users alive, so we can then get them into recovery.

After all, dead people can't get sober.

Why is It Important to Know the Names of My Medications?

Knowing the names of the medications you're taking is very important for your safety and overall health. Here's why:

1. Emergency Situations

In emergencies, it is important to know what medications you're on to avoid harmful interactions or duplicate treatments.

2. Avoid Drug Interactions

If you see different doctors or use multiple pharmacies, knowing your medications helps prevent dangerous drug interactions or duplication of treatments.

3. Correct Use

Knowing the names helps you:

- ☐ Take the right medication at the right time
- ☐ Avoid Mixing up medication that may look alike
- ☐ Follow the proper instructions (e.g. take with food, avoid alcohol)

4. Communicate with Healthcare Providers

Doctors, MA's, PA's, Nurses, Pharmacists and Pharmacy Technicians will ask what you're taking. Knowing the names helps you give accurate information and get the best care.

5. Track Side Effects or Allergies

If you have a reaction, knowing the medication name makes it easier to figure out what caused it and avoid it in the future

6. Refills:

You'll need medication names to:

- ☐ Request correct refills
- Verify prescriptions

7. Empowerment

Understanding what you are putting in your body helps you take control of your health and asked informed questions.

If it's overwhelming, you don't have to memorize everything – keeping a written or digital list of your medications (with names, doses, and why you take them) can be just as helpful.

Early Medication Refill(s)

We know that life can be unpredictable, and there are times when you may need to get your prescription filled earlier than usual. Whether you're planning a vacation or have experienced a lost or damaged prescription, it's important to understand our policy to ensure a smooth and timely process.

Early refills are for chronic medications only

This policy applies exclusively to your chronic, long-term prescription medications. Over-the counter (OTC), controlled substances and weight loss items are not eligible for early refills under this provision.

Two early refills per year

You are permitted a maximum of two early refills per calendar year for chronic medications. This can be for travel or lost or stolen medication.

After the annual limit


After you have used your two early refills for the year, you will have two options:

Transfer: You may transfer your prescriptions to another pharmacy. In this case, you will be responsible for any co-pay or out-of-pocket expense.

Wait: You may wait until your next refill is due to have it filled at IHC.


