I would like to take the time to thank our community for the support that you continue to show, and a special thank you to our tribal departments, who work endlessly to provide the services that keep our community running, and to be able to provide the various programs and events that we all look forward to attending throughout the year.

I'd also like to take this time to thank the Isleta Police Department, the Health Center, and the volunteers who made this year's Reaching for the Stars and Christmas Light Parade event such a success and warmed our spirits and hearts during this cold December month.

We'd like to congratulate the Isleta Police Department and the BIA (Bureau of Indian Affairs), and all the other dedicated men and women involved in the operation that resulted in recovering over 37,000 fentanyl pills, which are equivalent to \$1.5 million in street value and \$37,877 in cash. This successful operation between both agencies helped protect our community and our nation from the deadly drug that we all continue to see make a negative impact on the ones we care about.

I am writing to respond to the statements being circulated about recent incidents of alleged criminal conduct on the Pueblo. Conversations about these alleged incidents are happening in our community and online on social media.

While the Isleta Police Department is unable to comment on pending law enforcement investigations, IPD takes all allegations very seriously and considers confidentiality of critical importance to protecting victims and preserving the integrity of police investigations. These matters have been referred to outside law enforcement agencies to investigate and we will continue actively working with federal partners as appropriate.

If you are aware of criminal activity in our community, contact IPD and report your concerns. Please avoid spreading rumors.

Lastly, our Victims' Advocates are here to support our community and are an important resource. Victims Services can be reached at (505) 869-9838.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

DEADLINE for February Newsletter articles is set for Tuesday, January 20, 2026, at 4:30 pm. Articles may be dropped off at the Library or emailed to Nathaniel.Lujan@isletapueblo.com. Should you email your article, expect a confirmation email. If you do not receive a confirmation email, odds are it never made it to me and then it's time to panic, so call Nate at 505.869.9808.

People who wish to submit an article or flyer are responsible for generating their own article or flyer. Should you need help, please call the Library at 505.869.9808 and set up a date and time to sit down with a Library staff member who will help you throughout the process. The Library will NOT accept notes dropped off at the Library or information over the phone to generate your article.

PROBATES need to be published in the Newsletter for two consecutive months. Probates are considered court documents, therefore, all submitters must provide: 1) Name of Deceased, 2) Date of Deceased 3) Court Case #, and 4) Date of Court Date. A Probate form can be found on the Newsletter Archive page at <http://www.isletapueblo.com/newsletters.html>.

CLASSIFIED ADS: The new administration has requested that the Newsletter start a Classified Ad section for Tribal members selling land, houses, mobile homes, vehicles, and farm equipment. Leasing of houses and mobile homes will be accepted. Smaller items that can be sold at the local flea markets or weekly yard sales will NOT be accepted.

Currently, this service is FREE to Tribal members. Land, houses, and mobile homes must be within the reservation boundaries. Ads must meet the 160-character limit. Ads that exceed the 160-characters will NOT be submitted to the Newsletter. A single picture may be submitted with the ad. Submitters of classified ads are responsible for generating their ads as this is a FREE service.

As a reminder, Tribal business owners may submit a small flyer at no charge. Like the classified ads, business owners are responsible for generating their flyers as this is a FREE service.

Classified ads and business flyers will be posted no more than two consecutive months. In the event that the Newsletter may exceed the 24-page limit, classified ads and business flyers will be "bumped" for newsletter articles. Again, this is a FREE service for Tribal members.

The Isleta Newsletter is owned and operated by the Pueblo of Isleta. Therefore, the Governor of the Pueblo of Isleta has the final say in all articles and contents within the Isleta Newsletter.



Keep it simple, if you do not see it on this flier throw it away in the trash. Do not use your blue recycle cart for trash or it will be confiscated. Have your cart out by 7am. For service schedule announcements check the POI newsletter & POI Facebook. (505) 869-4106

Your recyclables do not need to be bagged, however it is highly recommended to bag your recyclables for curbside pickup during windy season. This is to reduce the chance of creating litter due to winds. If you choose to bag your recyclables it is important to use clear bags only. Colored bags are not accepted at the recycling facility. When your recyclables are bagged in colored bags they are not opened up and your material is landfilled instead of recycled. Using clear bags helps to ensure the health and safety of the line workers who come in contact with the material when sorting at the recycle facility. Using colored bags will result in your recyclables not being collected. This is important to sustain the recycle program moving forward. Your understanding and cooperation is greatly appreciated.

ACCESS TO LANDLOCKED PARCELS

The Governor has directed the Surveying and Mapping Department to begin formally designating easements for access to landlocked land assignments and ditches. This will allow Surveying and Mapping to ensure that all landlocked parcels have a documented right of access.

The Pueblo of Isleta Ordinance Governing Land Transactions provides that the Governor has authority to create easements, including ditch easements and road easements, through tribal lands to ensure that any land holding is not landlocked. Creating an easement only provides a right of access. It does not increase or decrease the area of any Land Assignee's property, and does not entitle any Land Assignee or any other party to any compensation.

Through this process, Surveying and Mapping will work with all impacted land assignees to develop the best possible easement locations. The final easement will be issued by Governor, with notice provided to any impacted land assignee.





BROADBAND



The Pueblo of Isleta Broadband Initiative is making significant strides toward delivering high-speed internet access to the community. Nearly 100,000 feet (approximately 19 miles) of conduit/pipe have been installed as part of Phase I on the Westside of the Rio Grande. Phase II, which will focus on the Eastside of the Rio Grande, is scheduled to begin construction in late January. Additionally, preparations are underway for the Palace West (Headend), the central hub that will house the network's core switches and routers. Vendor selection for this critical component will be finalized in the coming days. These milestones represent a major step in bridging the digital divide and ensuring reliable connectivity for all tribal members. This progress would not have been possible without the leadership and support of the Tribal Council and Administration. Their vision and commitment have been instrumental in making this initiative a reality.

ISLETA POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS JANUARY – 2026



IHSP TRAFFIC DIVISION

This hardworking division is always on the go not only attending to their traffic enforcement duties but working with other agencies in the world of traffic safety. We ask everyone to begin 2026 on a good note and be mindful of the traffic laws that are enforced. DWI is a priority and with efforts ramping up during the holiday season, so please understand the Traffic Division will continue to enforce traffic violations, i.e., speeding, seatbelt compliance, inattentive driving, to name a few, into the new year. Their involvement in community activities is one of the many focuses of this division throughout the year that keeps the community and roadways safe.

Nationally, the Isleta Traffic Division was awarded the largest grant of the twenty-six law enforcement grantees. They rank second under the Indian Highway Safety Program in grant performance and their grant application was approved for a major grant purchase which will be showcased in the near future.

IHSP also asks everyone to keep checking for upcoming carseat clinics that will be held in January, 2026.

CONGRATULATIONS



Officer C-Jay Smith completed the final phase of Drug Recognition School, where he and several other candidates from New Mexico traveled to San Francisco, CA to

conduct their final evaluations alongside the California Highway Patrol. Each Officer is required to conduct 12 evaluations on 12 different individuals to determine what type of drug(s) they could be impaired by. Each evaluation consists of a systematic and rigorous 12-step process. After each evaluation, officers are then required to complete a report that has to be approved by DRE instructors before they are entered into the National DRE Database. The last part of the final evaluation consists of a final test that lasts up to 6 hours in which each officer is tested on their overall knowledge of the DRE program, how to complete an evaluation, and other pertinent information. This is a pass or fail test which determines whether or not the officer is qualified to become a certified Drug Recognition Expert.

Officer Smith was carefully selected based upon his professional qualifications and investigative experience. Becoming a DRE allows Officer Smith to become a part of 2% of officers nationwide who are certified DREs. New Mexico currently has 73 certified DREs representing 31 agencies and nine New Mexico State Police districts, all working together to improve roadway safety statewide.

THE ILLICIT NARCOTICS ISSUE

Detection of drugs is a high priority throughout the United States and is an ever constant problem. The problem is not only with adults but our youth. We, at the Isleta Police Department, ask everyone to be aware of the drug usage and trafficking problem. The problem is everywhere, but when it strikes close to home, it is time for everyone to become more educated. Parents, it is particularly important for you to be aware of your children's activities, acquaintances, friends etc. We need to prevent tragedies which we know have occurred. Our children have so many influences from social media, school, friends (peer pressure) etc. Know your children's friends and family. There are predators who entice young children and youth, and once hooked the chances of getting back onto the right path are minimal without adult and professional

intervention. Remember Narcan is not a "save all" remedy to bring anyone out of an overdose because with street drugs you never know what you are getting. There are known cases where the "miracle Narcan" failed and an overdose death resulted. Following is information from the DEA (Drug Enforcement Administration)

DEA Launches Fentanyl Free America Initiative to Combat the Synthetic Drug Crisis

WASHINGTON – The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration is intensifying its fight against the deadly threat of synthetic opioids with the launch of Fentanyl Free America, a comprehensive enforcement initiative and public awareness campaign aimed at reducing both the supply and demand for fentanyl. This effort underscores DEA's unwavering commitment to protecting American lives and communities from the devastating impacts of fentanyl, which claimed nearly 50,000 lives last year according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Through intensified enforcement operations and heightened intelligence, DEA is applying unprecedented pressure on the global fentanyl supply chain, forcing narco-terrorists, like the Sinaloa Cartel and CJNG Cartel, to change their business practices. This has led to encouraging signs of progress. DEA laboratory testing indicates 29% of fentanyl pills analyzed during fiscal year (FY) 2025 contained a potentially lethal dose, a significant drop from 76% of pills tested just two years prior in FY 2023. Additionally, fentanyl powder purity decreased to 10.3%, down from 19.5% during the same time period. These reductions in potency and purity correlate with a decline in synthetic opioid deaths to levels not seen since April 2020.

Aside from producing less potent fentanyl, the cartels have increasingly diversified their operations in an attempt to minimize their risks and maximize profits, an evolution driven by opportunity and greed.

As of December 1, 2025, DEA has seized more than 45 million fentanyl pills, and more than 9,000 pounds of fentanyl powder, removing an estimated 347 million potentially deadly doses of fentanyl from our communities. DEA intelligence indicates a shift in cartel operations, with increased trafficking of fentanyl powder and domestic production of fentanyl pills. The seizure of more than two dozen pill press machines in October further highlights this trend.

"Fentanyl Free America represents DEA's unwavering commitment to save American lives and end the fentanyl crisis, we are making significant progress in this fight, and we must continue to intensify efforts to disrupt the fentanyl supply and reduce demand," said DEA Administrator Terrance Cole. "DEA is striking harder and evolving faster to dismantle the foreign terrorists fueling this crisis, while empowering all our partners to join the fight to prevent fentanyl-related tragedies. Together, we can achieve a fentanyl free America and create a safer future for generations to come."

DEA remains at the forefront of the fight to disrupt trafficking networks and strengthen the government's response to this epidemic. Fentanyl Free America represents DEA's heightened focus on enforcement, education, public awareness, and strategic partnerships. The goal of the campaign is clear: eliminate the fentanyl supply fueling the nation's deadliest drug crisis. Since 2021, synthetic opioids have claimed nearly 325,000 American lives.

The Fentanyl Free America campaign also emphasizes the importance of public engagement. DEA encourages everyone from community leaders, clergy, educators, parents, physicians, pharmacists, and law enforcement to take an active role in raising awareness by protecting others through education; preventing fentanyl poisonings by understanding the dangers; and supporting those impacted. Free resources including posters, radio advertising, billboards, and social

media resources are available at dea.gov/fentanylfree.

DEA's efforts are part of a larger whole-of-government strategy to dismantle transnational criminal organizations and protect U.S. communities from fentanyl.

DEA Warns of Threat Posed by Nitazenes and Bromazolam



DEA warns the public about an emerging threat posed by nitazenes and bromazolam in illicit drugs entering the U.S.

NITAZENES: AN EMERGING THREAT OF A DIVERSE GROUP OF SYNTHETIC OPIOIDS Nitazenes are synthetic opioids similar to fentanyl but can match or surpass the potency of fentanyl. When combined with fentanyl, the effects of both drugs are compounded, which significantly increases the chances of a fatal overdose. Similar to other synthetic opioids, nitazenes can only be properly identified in a sample after laboratory testing. Users will not realize they are buying nitazenes until it is too late. While nitazenes are a dangerous class of synthetic substances, the current magnitude of the threat is relatively small compared to that of fentanyl, which dominates the U.S. opioid market. Since January 2020, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) forensic laboratories have analyzed 1,048 drug exhibits that contained some type of nitazene. During the same time frame, by comparison, DEA has analyzed approximately 36,000 fentanyl powder exhibits, and approximately 24,000 fentanyl tablet exhibits. Chemical suppliers mainly located in China introduce new nitazenes or analogues when the currently used ones become riskier to produce due to regulatory actions and drug scheduling, or users look for novel substances that are not yet illegal. Source: DEA Nitazenes are most likely being shipped as finished substances in small amounts in mail parcels from vendors

in China to distributors or end users in the United States.

(U) Bromazolam: An Uncontrolled Benzodiazepine is Frequently Bought from Foreign Websites for Use in Counterfeit Pills (U) This DEA Bulletin is based on preliminary reporting and may be subject to updating as additional information becomes available. (U) Statement of Analysis Bromazolam is a growing presence in the United States illicit drug supply, according to data from the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) (see Figures 1 and 2). The increased supply of bromazolam is likely driven by suppliers who reach customers through open web vendor platforms. Bromazolam is not specifically controlled in the United States, unlike other drugs in the benzodiazepine class that are mostly Schedule IV and approved for treating anxiety and insomnia. In 2024, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recommended that bromazolam be added to the list of drugs controlled by all signatories of the 1988 United Nations (U.N.) Convention against Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances. If the U.N. and member nations accept the FDA recommendation, the addition of bromazolam to this list is likely to deter many Chinabased vendors who have previously demonstrated quick takedowns of offers to sell drugs and chemicals following U.N. counterdrug convention updates. However—as with cannabinoids, designer fentanyl precursors, and nitazenes—bromazolam is just one analogue of many benzodiazepines. (U) Details Bromazolam is most commonly used as an active ingredient in counterfeit Xanax tablets. Legitimate Xanax and generics contain the benzodiazepine alprazolam. More than 1,400 DEA drug exhibits, seized between January 2019 and January 2025, contained bromazolam. According to DEA forensic science data, more than a thousand of these exhibits containing bromazolam were in tablet form. Protecting Elders: The Safety of COVID and Flu Vaccines

Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 and influenza is very important for older adults. These vaccines help protect people from getting very sick, going to the hospital, or even passing away from these diseases. Staying up to date with vaccines helps keep elders, families, and the whole community safe.

Some people worry about feeling sick after getting a vaccine. It is normal to have mild side effects like a sore arm, tiredness, or a low fever. These are signs that the body is building protection. Feeling a little sick after a vaccine is not the same as having the actual disease. The vaccine cannot give you COVID-19 or the flu. These side effects usually go away in a day or two.

Getting vaccinated is one of the best ways to protect yourself and others. Elders are at higher risk for serious problems from COVID-19 and flu, but vaccines make these illnesses much less dangerous. By getting vaccinated, you help protect your family, your friends, and your community.

Staying healthy helps everyone, and vaccines are a safe and effective way to do that. Afterschool FALL Session

Greetings! We here at B'eeh K'oo-ee Wellness - Prevention Program would like to share highlights with the community of our Isleta Youth Wellness Program Fall afterschool session that took place September to December 2025. We had a total of 23 participants that were involved in a variety of experiential learning activities and group development activities.



FALL Session Highlights

The youth enjoyed an overnight camping and adventure ropes course in Flagstaff, AZ and at the Mountain Center in Santa Fe, NM. They went to McCall's Pumpkin patch to pick pumpkins and were able to carve them. They played Tiwa games and listened to some of the traditional stories told by a community elder.

Youth were able to visit George Waquie's Farm in Los Lunas, and participate in the Pueblo Crossroads in Sandia Pueblo. The Tribal Opioid Response provided the group with a presentation on "Isleta Together Against Drugs" and had an open discussion on the harms of substance in the community—the message was keeping Tiwa culture strong.

The youth were able to make home made pizzas and build stem projects, and swimming at the Isleta Rec Center was a great afterschool activity. As an incentive trip the group attended the Moana Live at Popejoy Hall on the UNM Campus on November 4th, and saw Zootopia 2 on November 26th.

On November 22nd, we had a gathering with the IYWP youth and their families to celebrate the annual Friends-giving dinner.

Isleta Youth Wellness Program (IYWP)

The IYWP uses a positive youth development approach through experiential learning that aims to reduce risk factors and increase protective factors. Experiential activities are used and designed to challenge participants to develop positive problem-solving skills, and develop effective social interactions.

We guide youth to develop life skills through the foundation of the four guiding principles of Tiwa Culture, *Outdoor experiential education, Service ethics and Prevention education through awareness*.



Services are provided year round through seasonal sessions for youth ages 9 - 17 years. We have open enrollment for the 11 & younger and 12 & older age groups, each age group has separate sessions Monday—Thursday and on weekends.

Afterschool sessions in the Spring and in the Fall are 5pm - 6pm and Summer sessions are 9am - 3pm, these sessions also include school breaks. Transportation is available for youth within the Isleta Pueblo boundaries.

In November and December, the 12 & older age group were able to learn how to make moccasins from Shawn Chavez (San Felipe Pueblo) and Daryl Lucero (Dept. of Cultural & Historic Preservation) to celebrate Native American Heritage Month. The group also completed a scavenger hunt held at the Pueblo of Isleta Cultural center and learned more about the history of the Tiwa people, presented by Felicia Bartley (Dept. of Cultural & Historic Preservation).





The Isleta Head Start and Child Care Center invites you to apply for our Child Care Stabilization Grant, offered in partnership with Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) by way of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The stabilization subgrant award program plan represents a collaborative, multistep process designed to identify the needs of child care providers and ensure timely administration and access to ARP Act child care stabilization grants funding.

This is an unprecedented opportunity to directly support our child care sector by enabling you to decide how to best allocate your supplemental grant fund. Suggestions for allowable use are as follows: increasing wages for child care support staff, upgrading sanitation equipment, providing relief from copayments for families, health and safety quality training for staff, employee bonuses, and expanding center hours and accessibility for essential workers. As this is a Tribal Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) Grant, it is necessary that you serve at least one Native American Student in your program. The list above are just a few examples of allowable activities: you are strongly encouraged to assess the needs of your program and be as creative as possible when allocating any funds awarded to you. Additionally, it is your responsibility to maintain orderly and accurate financial records throughout the duration of the award.

Why is It Important to Know the Names of My Medications?

Knowing the names of the medications you're taking is very important for your safety and overall health. Here's why:

1. **Emergency Situations**
In emergencies, it is important to know what medications you're on to avoid harmful interactions or duplicate treatments.
2. **Avoid Drug Interactions**
If you see different doctors or use multiple pharmacies, knowing your medications helps prevent dangerous drug interactions or duplication of treatments.
3. **Correct Use**
Knowing the names helps you:
 - Take the right medication at the right time
 - Avoid Mixing up medication that may look alike
 - Follow the proper instructions (e.g. take with food, avoid alcohol)
4. **Communicate with Healthcare Providers**
Doctors, MA's, PA's, Nurses, Pharmacists and Pharmacy Technicians will ask what you're taking. Knowing the names helps you give accurate information and get the best care.
5. **Track Side Effects or Allergies**
If you have a reaction, knowing the medication name makes it easier to figure out what caused it and avoid it in the future
6. **Refills:**
You'll need medication names to:
 - Request correct refills
 - Verify prescriptions
7. **Empowerment**
Understanding what you are putting in your body helps you take control of your health and asked informed questions.

If it's overwhelming, you don't have to memorize everything – keeping a written or digital list of your medications (with names, doses, and why you take them) can be just as helpful.

Early Medication Refill(s)

We know that life can be unpredictable, and there are times when you may need to get your prescription filled earlier than usual. Whether you're planning a vacation or have experienced a lost or damaged prescription, it's important to understand our policy to ensure a smooth and timely process.

Early refills are for chronic medications only. This policy applies exclusively to your chronic, long-term prescription medications. Over-the counter (OTC), controlled substances and weight loss items are not eligible for early refills under this provision.

Two early refills per year

You are permitted a maximum of two early refills per calendar year for chronic medications. This can be for travel or lost or stolen medication.

After the annual limit

After you have used your two early refills for the year, you will have two options:

Transfer: You may transfer your prescriptions to another pharmacy. In this case, you will be responsible for any co-pay or out-of-pocket expense.

Wait: You may wait until your next refill is due to have it filled at IHC.
